


Composition Activity: Tonic & Dominant Chords

Theory & Practice II: Tonal Harmony


Directions: Compose a 4-bar composition, following the steps below. The MuseScore file for the model composition is available [here](#) if you would like to use it as a template.

1. **Set up the Staff:** Select a key and meter. Set up your staff paper using the model below with a grand staff on the bottom for a chordal accompaniment and a single staff above for the melody.
2. **Compose the Chords:** Compose a 4-bar chord progression using only I and V chords. You may have 1 chord per measure or experiment with different harmonic rhythms. Label the Roman numerals and the chord function below the staff.

3. **Partwrite your Chords:** Notate the chords in 4-part SATB or chorale style voicing using smooth voiceleading. End with a PAC, IAC, or HC. See the model below:
