Why Nairobi?

We are meeting in Nairobi because it is a city that embodies the global reality of our movement. Kenya sits at the intersection of regional leadership, civic engagement, and international connection. Nairobi is home to diplomats, activists, organisers, entrepreneurs, and communities constantly negotiating questions of power, participation, and belonging. It is a fitting place to reflect, to challenge ourselves, and to imagine what comes next together.



Getting Here

Visas & Entry

Most visitors will need an [Electronic Travel Authorisation \(eTA\)](#) to enter Kenya. It's done entirely online, costs USD 32, and is usually approved within 1–3 working days – no embassy visit required. Apply before you travel. Your passport must be valid for at least six months beyond your entry date, with at least one blank page.

Pro Tip: Carry both a digital and printed copy of your eTA. Airlines may ask for it at check-in, and immigration may ask again on arrival.

You will also need proof of yellow fever vaccination – bring your International Certificate of Vaccination or Prophylaxis (the yellow card), as checks do happen on arrival.

We strongly encourage booking a travel medicine appointment before departure. A clinician can confirm your vaccinations, review anything you're behind on, and give advice tailored to your itinerary. If you're planning any travel outside Nairobi – coastal areas, safari, upcountry – ask for antimalarial prophylaxis. Malaria risk in Nairobi is low, but rises significantly elsewhere.

US Embassy registration (STEP)

Before you travel, take five minutes to register your trip with the US State Department's [Smart Traveler Enrollment Program \(STEP\)](#). It's free, takes almost no time, and means the US Embassy in Nairobi can reach you in the event of an emergency – natural disaster, civil unrest, or a family emergency back home. It's standard travel practice that's easy to forget and worth doing.

Arriving at the Airport

Most international visitors will arrive at [Jomo Kenyatta International Airport \(JKIA\)](#), East Africa's busiest hub, with direct connections from Amsterdam, Doha, Dubai, Istanbul, Johannesburg, London, New York, and Paris. Most travellers clear immigration and collect luggage in under 40 minutes, though peak arrival windows can slow things slightly.

If you are connecting onward to a domestic destination or safari, you may also pass through Wilson Airport (WIL), which handles regional and charter flights.

Getting Around the City

Ride-sharing apps are your best friend here. [Uber](#) and [Bolt](#) are both widely used, cashless, reliable, and generally safe. Typical fares are under USD 10 within the city, and up to USD 20 for airport transfers depending on traffic.

Many hotels – including the Park Inn – offer arranged car and driver services, which is worth considering for late-night arrivals or if you prefer a fixed pickup.

Pro Tip: Nairobi traffic is real. Peak hours are 06:30–09:00 and 16:30–19:30, but congestion can spill beyond those windows. Always allow generous buffer time – even short distances can take 45–90 minutes unexpectedly. The Nairobi Expressway (accessible from JKIA) is genuinely worth using: it cuts the airport-to-Westlands journey dramatically.

Car hire is generally unnecessary for city travel unless you're planning a road-trip safari or extended upcountry travel, but if you're interested, check out the Service Providers section!

A Note on Jet Lag

Nairobi is UTC+3. From the US East Coast, that's 7–8 hours ahead; from the West Coast, 10–11 hours. Flying eastward tends to hit harder than flying west. Most people find the first two days genuinely rough: disrupted sleep, poor concentration, occasional dizziness. *This will be less of an issue for European travellers, but equally critical for Asian / Pacific Time Zones.*

If you can, try not to schedule anything critical for the morning immediately after you land. Get outside into natural light as quickly as you can on arrival day, stay hydrated, and resist the urge to nap for more than 20–30 minutes in the afternoon. It sounds simple, but it makes a real difference.

Conference Hotel

Park Inn by Radisson, Nairobi Westlands

The AGM's conference hotel is the [Park Inn by Radisson](#), on Waiyaki Way in Westlands – right in the heart of the neighbourhood recommended throughout this guide for dining, nightlife, and general convenience. It's a practical, comfortable base that puts you within easy reach of everything.

What's on site

The hotel has 140 rooms, all air-conditioned, with minibars and soundproofed windows – a genuine plus given the Waiyaki Way traffic. On-site you'll find the Live Inn Restaurant (open breakfast through dinner), an outdoor pool with a poolside bar, a gym, and the Attic Rooftop Bar, which has good views over the city and is a reliable spot for an end-of-day drink.

Booking support

Pro Tip for Light Sleepers: request a room away from the road-facing side when you book or check in.

Money & Connectivity

Currency

The local currency is the Kenyan Shilling (KES), currently trading at approximately 128–129 KES to 1 USD. Cards are widely accepted at hotels, restaurants, malls, and most larger establishments – but carry some cash (around 5,000 KES in small notes is a sensible amount) for smaller vendors, tipping, and informal purchases.

M-Pesa, Kenya's mobile money system, is used almost everywhere – cafés, taxis, market stalls, the lot. It requires a local SIM card to set up, so most short-term visitors find it easier to rely on cards and limited cash rather than registering for M-Pesa.

ATMs are readily available across the city, including at JKIA. Stick to bank-affiliated ATMs rather than third-party machines – better rates and better security. Notify your bank before travelling to avoid your card being blocked, and avoid carrying large amounts of cash at any one time. Standard awareness applies: don't use ATMs that feel exposed or isolated, and be aware of your surroundings.

SIM & Wi-Fi

Safaricom offers the most reliable mobile coverage nationwide. SIM cards (including eSIMs on request) are available at JKIA on arrival – you'll just need your passport. Data bundles are affordable and activate immediately.

Most hotels, offices, and cafés in Nairobi offer reliable Wi-Fi, so you can stay connected throughout your stay without necessarily relying on mobile data.

Power & Adapters

Kenya uses Type G plugs – the three-pin British-style socket – at 240V. American devices run on 110–120V. You will need a plug adapter, and if your device isn't dual-voltage (check the small print on the charger: it should say "100–240V"), you'll also need a voltage converter. Most modern laptops, phone chargers, and camera chargers are dual-voltage and only need an adapter. Hair dryers, electric shavers, and older devices often are not – check before you travel.

The Park Inn has UK-style sockets throughout. Bring at least one adapter from home; they're harder to find quickly on arrival and the hotel gift shop is not a reliable source.

Weather & What to Wear

What to Expect in Late May

Nairobi sits at altitude, which keeps temperatures mild year-round. Late May falls toward the end of the long rainy season – you'll have warm days, cool evenings, and occasional short sharp showers (usually in the afternoon or evening, rarely all-day rain).

Daytime	20–26°C (68–79°F) – warm and generally comfortable
Evenings	14–17°C (57–63°F) – noticeably cool once the sun sets
Rain	Brief afternoon/evening showers likely; continuous rain unlikely
Sun	Can be strong even on overcast days – SPF is recommended

A Note on Altitude

Nairobi sits at approximately 1,700 metres (5,600 feet) above sea level. If you're coming from a sea-level city, you may notice mild symptoms in the first day or two: slight headaches, fatigue, or feeling winded on stairs. It's not dangerous, but it can catch you off guard, especially on top of jet lag. Drink plenty of water, take it easy on your first evening, and don't be surprised if you feel more tired than usual. It passes quickly.

What to Pack

- For AGM sessions – Business casual is standard and appropriate
- Layers – A light blazer, jumper, or jacket for evenings – it gets genuinely cool
- Shoes – Comfortable closed shoes, especially if you're moving between venues
- Rain – A compact umbrella or light rain jacket is worth throwing in
- Accessories – Keep it simple when out and about – avoid flashy jewellery or watches

Culture & Etiquette

A little cultural awareness goes a **very long** way in Nairobi. The notes below aren't an exhaustive guide – just the things most likely to matter during your stay.

Greetings

Greetings matter here and set the tone for every interaction. A handshake is standard in professional settings – unhurried and warm. Rushing through greetings, or jumping straight into business without acknowledging the person first, is noticed and can feel rude.

A few Swahili words are always warmly received, even if you immediately switch to English:

- Habari – How are you?
- Mambo – Hello / What's up?
- Asante – Thank you
- Karibu – Welcome / You're welcome

Meeting Style

Formal meetings generally expect punctuality from visitors. At the same time, local schedules can be more fluid – traffic, competing demands, and different cultural rhythms all play a role. If something starts late or shifts, patience and calm flexibility will always take you further than visible frustration.

Communication

Kenyan professional culture tends to be less direct and more conflict-averse than typical US norms. Disagreement is often expressed subtly rather than confrontationally, and feedback is almost always delivered privately rather than in group settings. This doesn't mean the message is any less real – listen carefully to tone and context, not just words.

Pro Tip: Avoid calling anyone out publicly or offering criticism in a group setting. It will land badly regardless of how gently you intend it - this includes with waitstaff and other service professionals.

Tipping & Dining

Tipping is optional but genuinely appreciated! 10–15% is appropriate for good service, and it makes a meaningful difference for workers who often earn below a living wage.

One thing worth knowing: in many restaurants, errors like incorrect orders or returned food will be deducted from the worker's pay. Order carefully, ask questions upfront, and if something is wrong but usable, consider accepting it rather than sending it back - be prudent!

Where to Eat & Meet

Neighbourhoods Worth Knowing

- **Westlands** – Where the conference hotel is – and by far the most convenient base. Restaurants, cafés, and nightlife all within walking distance. Lively in the evenings.
- **Kilimani / Lavington** – Trendy, immigrant-friendly, excellent café culture. Great for informal meetings or a working lunch in a more relaxed setting.
- **Karen** – Leafy, upscale, and calm – home to boutiques, galleries, and several landmarks. Worth a visit, but allow extra travel time from the hotel.

Recommended Restaurants & Venues

These are all well-regarded and reliable. Listed roughly by proximity to the conference hotel.

- About Thyme (Westlands) – Relaxed outdoor dining, great for conversation and informal meetings
- Hero Restaurant (Westlands) – Contemporary, lively – good energy for evening meals
- Nyama Mama (Westlands) – Modern Kenyan cuisine with playful presentation and local flavours
- The Arbor (Westlands) – Farm-to-table feel, wallet-friendly, easy for groups
- Alchemist (Westlands) – Better for a nightlife experience than a working meeting – a distinctly Nairobi scene
- River Cafe (Karura) – Set inside Karura Forest. Ideal for a daytime escape or informal meeting in nature
- The Carnivore (Lang'ata) – The classic nyama choma experience – unapologetically carnivorous and a Nairobi institution
- Talisman (Karen) – Upscale, consistent, excellent for business or celebratory meals
- Cultiva (Karen) – Farm-to-table, calm atmosphere – great for long lunches and meetings

Local Food Worth Trying

- Ugali – Maize meal – a Kenyan staple, served with everything
- Nyama Choma – Roasted goat or beef, ideally eaten at a nyama choma spot
- Sukuma Wiki – Collard greens, commonly served as a side
- Samosas, mandazi, chapati – Excellent snacks – widely available and hard to resist
- Roasted maize – Street-side favourite, particularly good on a cool evening

Things to Do

If you can add a day or two either side of the AGM, Nairobi rewards the time. Most of the best experiences fit comfortably into a half day – easy to layer around travel or meetings.

Nature & Iconic Nairobi

- Nairobi National Park – Wildlife inside the city limits. Options include the Safari Walk, the animal orphanage, or a full game drive. Consistently surprising, even for seasoned Africa visitors
- Giraffe Centre – Feed giraffes at eye level. Genuinely charming, and a lot of fun
- Ngong Hills – Sweeping views and a brisk hike – great for clearing your head
- Karura Forest – Shaded trails, a waterfall, and a calm escape right inside the city

Culture & History

- Karen Blixen Museum (Karen) – The historic home of Out of Africa author Karen Blixen – quietly beautiful and reflective
- National Museum of Kenya – Accessible insight into Kenya's natural history, culture, and political life
- Maasai Market – Locally made jewellery, textiles, and crafts. Bargaining is expected and part of the fun
- Nairobi Gallery / Kenya National Archives – Good for a half-day dip into Kenyan political and artistic history

Pro Tip: Most hotels can arrange transport and tickets through their concierge. For more structured experiences – guided safaris, day trips, custom itineraries – refer to the Service Providers section of this guide.

Safety & Practical Awareness

Nairobi is a dynamic, welcoming city – and like any large global capital, it rewards basic situational awareness. Most issues visitors face are predictable and avoidable. Here's what you actually need to know.

Where to Stay, Where to Avoid

The conference hotel is already in a good spot. Westlands is central, busy, well-policed, and familiar with international visitors. Other areas that are generally safe for visitors include Upper Hill, Gigiri (the diplomatic quarter), and Karen.

After dark, avoid the downtown CBD, Eastleigh, Eastlands, and informal settlements. These areas are perfectly normal for locals – they're simply not tourist-oriented and present unnecessary risk at night, especially without a trusted local guide.

Getting Around Safely

- Use Uber or Bolt – Or a hotel-arranged driver. These are your default. *Be aware that some drivers may not like taking a trip paid with a card. If you are using a credit card, please confirm it's a card trip with the driver before departing to avoid an argument later.*
- Walking is fine – In secure areas, malls, hotel grounds, and during daylight – but avoid walking alone at night, even in 'safe' areas
- Keep valuables out of sight – Don't use your phone openly on the street. Step inside a shop or café to check messages
- Skip matatus – Public minibuses are fine for locals but a first-time visitor navigating them alone adds unnecessary risk. If you must, only go with a trusted local

Navigating Visible Poverty

For many first-time visitors to sub-Saharan Africa, one of the most immediately striking and sometimes destabilising experiences is the visible inequality on the streets – outside restaurants, at traffic lights, near markets. People will approach your car window. Children may ask for money. Touts and informal vendors will be persistent.

There is no single right response to this, and it is okay to feel uncomfortable. A few practical notes that may help:

Giving money directly to children on the street is genuinely discouraged – not because the need isn't real, but because it reinforces patterns that keep children out of school and on the street, and can attract larger groups quickly. Additionally, there are “cartel” like systems that exploit

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children in this way for monetary gain (and contribute to trafficking). If you want to contribute meaningfully, the best way is through established local organisations, not street-level transactions.

When approached by touts or persistent vendors, a calm, clear "no thank you" – said once, with eye contact, and not repeated – is more effective than engaging, explaining, or apologising your way out of a conversation. You don't owe anyone an explanation for not buying something. Prolonged engagement is usually interpreted as interest.

None of this is unique to Nairobi – it's a reality in major cities across the continent and much of the Global South. Being prepared for it helps. Being kind while also being firm is always the right register.

The Most Common Risks

Petty theft and small-scale scams – not violent crime. The behaviours that make visitors targets are: flashing phones, jewellery, or large amounts of cash; walking while distracted; or being overly trusting with strangers who approach unsolicited. Confidence, awareness, and calm caution reduce risk dramatically.

Phones, Cash & Passports

- Phone snatching – Does occur, most often by motorcycle riders. Keep your phone pocketed on the street, and avoid using it in an Uber if your window is rolled down. Take extra care when taking photos from the back of an Uber.
- Cash – Carry only what you need for the day. Leave the rest secure at your hotel
- Passport – Keep it in the hotel safe. Carry a photo of it on your phone instead
- ATMs – Use bank-affiliated machines only, and stay aware of your surroundings

A Note for LGBTQ+ Members

Kenya criminalises same-sex intercourse (not identity), and LGBTQ+ people – including tourists – must be situationally aware. It is worth stating plainly.

In practice, international visitors in hotel and conference environments are largely insulated from the most acute risks, and Nairobi is considerably more cosmopolitan than much of the country. However, public displays of affection between same-sex partners – holding hands, kissing – can attract unwanted attention such as stares and comments. Discretion in public spaces is strongly advised.

Inside the conference hotel and AGM events, you should feel comfortable and safe. The risk is primarily in public-facing spaces: streets, restaurants, bars, and taxis.

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If you plan to meet someone from a dating app, there is also a risk of blackmail due to people taking advantage of the law to attempt to extort money from you – situational awareness applies here, as well (also for our straight colleagues!).

If Something Goes Wrong

Move to a secure, populated location and contact your hotel concierge first. They are your best first resource.

Emergency number in Kenya: 999 (also 112).

You will be provided with a DAKE organisational contact for the AGM who can assist with anything beyond hotel support.

A few cultural notes that matter for safety

- **Photography** – Do not photograph government buildings, embassies, police, or military personnel – this can lead to questioning or arrest. Do not photograph people without permission; it's a cultural taboo and, simply put, it's rude
- **Police & Security** – Stay calm, polite, and respectful. There are security checks at most major venues - this is normal, proceed as you would at the airport. Avoid arguing or becoming confrontational. If asked for money by an official, you are not required to comply – contact us first before handing anything over
- **Food & Water** – Drink bottled or filtered water. Street food is delicious but riskier for first-time visitors – try it sparingly and with local guidance
- **Out at Night** – Restaurants, hotels, and malls are fine in the evenings. Aim to be back at the hotel by 10–11pm unless escorted. Always use a car at night, even for short distances

Medical Support

Nairobi has excellent private healthcare. The providers below are close to the conference hotel and well-regarded for international visitors. We recommend carrying comprehensive travel insurance, including medical evacuation coverage if possible.

Pro Tip: If you need medical assistance during the AGM, contact the DAKE organisational team first and we will help you get to the right place quickly.

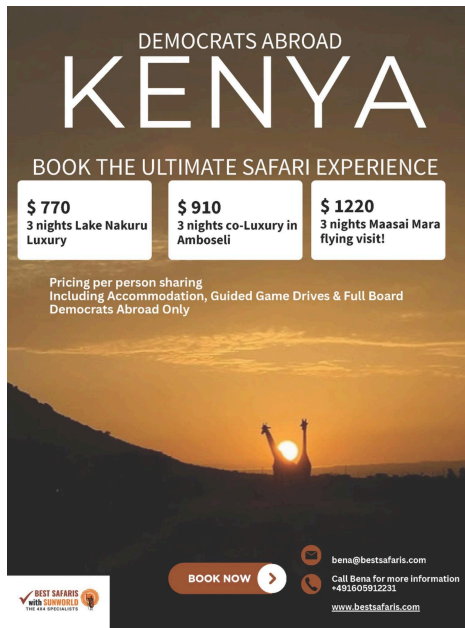

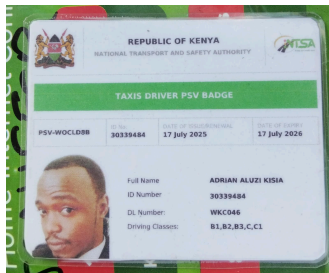
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
