Dear Third Grade Families,

Over the past week, your third grader read a variety of biographies and has now chosen one notable individual to research further. They read for deeper understanding and studied character traits. Over the coming weeks, they will conduct research using various sources, create timelines to mark the most important events in the life of their chosen person, and present what they learned to their classmates. To celebrate, we will hold a **Biography Wax Museum on Wednesday, April 20, 2022 from 8:10-9:10 am.** *Other classes will be invited to tour through, but as of this time, we are not able to accommodate parents and outside visitors.*

Your child will need a **costume** to help them "become" the person they studied. (Homemade costumes are the best--please do not feel the need to buy anything!) They will also be responsible for bringing in an **artifact** that represents their person and explaining to their classmates how it relates to the person they studied.

Students' costumes, artifacts, Wax Museum performance, and class presentation will be graded using the attached rubric.
