Traffic Solution / Suggestions

Description

Hull Street - State Designation Contact the State of VA and ask what the designation is for Hull

Street. Certain designations prohibit particular actions (e.g. stop signs,

speed bumps, etc.)

2 Hour Parking Study where 2 hour parking is appropriate and install signage and

enforce

Allow Hull Street parking at all

times

Remove all "no parking" signs from Hull Street and allow parking 100% of the time. Do not restrict certain times as is currently done.

This will slow and calm traffic.

Another Garage in Manchester Do an assessment on another public parking garage in Manchester.

Where should it be located? What is the cost? How will it be paid for

and sources of funds

Stop Signs Stop signs were accessed 15 years ago. Perform a new assessment

and determine where 2 and 4 way stop signs would be appropriate.

Pay Stations Perform analysis of the use of pay stations for street parking, utilizing

the least costly approach (e.g. QR codes, apple pay, etc. which is currently used in the VCU area and downtown). There is funding in

the budget to study and create a plan for Manchester

Enforcement Implement enforcement of parking (exceeding hourly limits, illegal

parking in ADA spaces, ADA ramps, fire hydrants)

Pedestrian Cross Walks Determine where crosswalks are needed and implement. Determine

where flashing lights equipment can be installed when pedestrians approach the intersection (Forest Hill near the park has one of these

devices).

Corner Restrictions Determine which corners need restrictions for parking and currently

are dangerous to drivers and pedestrians as parked vehicles are

blocking the view for safe entrance into the road

Satellite Parking for Construction Create places outside of Manchester (less dense) where construction

workers can park their vehicles and be shuttled into work zones.

More Stop Lights A stop light is schedule for 5th and Hull in 2025. Determine where

other stop lights can be installed to calm and slow traffic.

Permit Districts Study to determine if permit districts are wanted, needed and

workable. Create guidelines, days, hours, number of cars per household. Requires City Council approval. Permit costs are \$25 per

vehicle and \$35 per visitor permit.

Map out Manchester Map out Manchester and determine which area "permit parking" would

be appropriate and the various parking time restrictions for business/retail areas. Manchester requires a hybrid solution for

parking

Glenda Kotchish	Time limits on parking and blocking of views because there are no curb and crossings paint	Tickets and study parking
Brent L. Graves	In Manchester there are several narrow streets as well as poorly built streets, marginal sidewalks and poor road infrastructure in some areas.	Improvements should be made to the existing ill-conceived infrastructure that was put into place 50 to 100 years or more ago.
Sam McDonald	crowded streets, cars blocking ADA ramps and corner visibility, illegal parking, storing vehicles on streets	better parking enforcement and group ideas
Joe Yates	Developers need to require tenants to pay for parking and park under their buildings.	Limit the time an individual is allowed to park on the street.
Darl ("Deuce") Jewell	Insufficient street parking for high density apartment residents and their guests. Concerns about public safety access because of illegal parking (e.g., parking in front of fire hydrants).	Enforce legal parking ASAP. Conduct a traffic study to assess volumes.
Samantha Lewis	There is an abundance of parking in Manchester, but a lot of it is reserved for apartment buildings or private businesses. Cars are parked too close to intersections, stop signs, and alleyways.	Initiating conversations with private apartment owners/business owners about sharing parking -ex: neighborhood people could pay for a spot in an apartment lot but may not live in the building; allow patrons of restaurants/breweries to park in empty business lots after a certain time.
		Construct bump outs/bulb outs to prevent parking too close to intersections and alleys. Signs alone do not work if there is no enforcement or infrastructure that will stop people from parking there. Signs are routinely ignored in the Fan, especially and other neighborhoods- be sure to ask for
