PLANS UNDERWAY FOR 16TH ANNUAL MALAD VALLEY WELSH FESTIVAL - FINALLY!!

If all goes well and there are no disasters or catastrophes or pandemics, the 16th annual Malad Valley Welsh Festival will be held the last weekend of June 2022. The main Festival days will be Friday and Saturday, June 24-25, with a Sunday Fireside on the evening of June 26. Mark your calendars and plan to come to ensure that the Festival can continue into the future!

At this point, the planning committee is working to bring in presenters, performers, vendors, and activities similar to those from past Festivals. We are contacting the presenters and performers who had planned to come in 2020, hoping that they are still willing to come, even if two years later. Vendors are already contacting us, anxious to bring treats and gifts of all kinds to the Festival.

Cory Webster, the Festival Bard of 2019, will finally relinquish the Bard's Chair at the 2022 Festival. Poetry and art competitions are in the planning stages. The theme for the Adult and Youth Poetry Competitions will be "TRAILS AND TRIALS."

The Youth Art Competition guidelines state that any art medium is acceptable as long as the work of art includes something symbolic of Wales

(dragons, daffodils, castles, knights, etc.).

ST. DWYNWEN'S DAY (*Dydd Santes Dwynwen* in Welsh) – The Welsh Valentine's Day

In the 4th century, Dwynwen was the prettiest of King Brychan Brycheiniog's 24 daughters and lived in what is now the Brecon Beacons National Park. Dwynwen's name means "she who leads

a blessed life." She fell in love with a local boy called Maelon Dafodrill, but King Brychan had already arranged for her to marry another prince. Maelon took the news badly, so the distraught Dwynwen fled to the woods to weep and begged God to help her. She was visited by an angel who gave her a sweet potion to help her forget Maelon, which turned him into a block of ice.

God then granted Dwynwen three wishes. Her first wish was that Maelon be thawed; her second wish was for God to help all true lovers; her third wish was that she would never marry. In gratitude for the granting of her wishes, Dwynwen became a nun and set up a convent on Llanddwyn Island, a beautiful little island off the southwest coast of Anglesey. The remains of the church can still be seen on Ynys Llanddwyn. There's also Dwynwen's Well, which, according to legends, can predict whether a romantic relationship will be a success or failure. This prediction is based on the behavior of eels that live in the well (not very romantic)

Dydd Santes Dwynwen is celebrated on January 25 each year and is becoming more popular in Wales after many years of being ignored. Lovers exchange cards and gifts, take time out for special meals with loved ones, carve lovespoons, and *cwtch* (a Welsh word for cuddling and hugging) in front of a roaring log fire.
