Intros:

Julia Greene – MAC NE3 and would like to support work going on in schools

<u>Heather Billings</u> – CET, works supporting schools in two ways, through SMRP Schools Grants providing technical assistance and The Green Teams, providing technical assistance.

<u>Ann McGovern</u> – Manages the SMRP Schools grants and the composting programs. Two announcements:

- 1) Pickup of composters and recycling bins has restarted
- 2) Nov. 18 there is a MassDEP Schools Recycling Webinar

<u>Kathi Mirza</u> – MAC SE2, Years of experience. Created different handouts on school recycling and waste bans. Spearheads MAC tabling on schools recycling & composting at annual conferences to reach facilities managers, school administrators and school committee members and food service personnel.

<u>Amy Donovan</u> - Franklin County Solid Waste District includes 21 towns in the NW corner of MA. Almost all schools including 7 HSs, are composting except for two tiny elementary schools. Anecdote that farmer that sells compost was able to move into the black financially by selling all his compost to th Amy has years of experience. The schools are mostly remote for this school year due to COVID-19.

<u>Fritzie Nace</u> – Winchester Schools. 2012 DEP Grant. They brought composting to two schools by 2nd school has stopped composting. She works out of DPW but disconnect with School Administration, when school principals change, whole policies inside schools change, like discontinuing composting.

<u>Cindy Arens</u> – Lexington Green Teams. All 9 Lexington schools composting, part of a composting contract. There is a disconnect right now during COVID on proper packaging, they are using a lot of single use and plastic wrapping. Lexington is volunteer run and disconnect between volunteers and teachers. Teachers are the institutional piece of the schools, yet the volunteers run the program and put the program in place and keep it going.

<u>Lin Jensen</u> – Lexington Green Teams. Lin added that composting started in 2012, and that right now volunteers can't be in schools.

<u>Rachel Oliveri</u> —Rachel works part-time as schools sustainability director and worked on bringing composting to all 10 schools over time, and maintaining the program. Contract with Black Earth. At this point all schools back with hybrid model minus the high schools due to HVAC issues will come back Jan 1. Right now working with BOH and custodians to figure out recycling and composting in classrooms and cafeteria sorting stations.

<u>Sripriya Narasimhan</u> – Belmont Green Team – Now have composting in all four grades in middle schools. Problems with changes in principals and disconnect with Administration. They want parents and a teacher to take ownership of the program. It would be good if the DPW could have a universal message

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as well as the Administration. Green Team activity coming from the bottom up but there is a need for top down policy and messaging.

Retta Smith – Medford ran a compost pilot this year in the high schools. Seniors through their environmental group formed out of the Center for Citizenship and Social Responsibility worked on the project. Unfortunately the pilot was shut down in early March as a result of the COVID academic. Retta was also working on auditing recycling, trash and composting needs in all schools to develop implementation plans. Improving recycling and introducing composting in kitchens, and custodian buy-in and cooperation were identified issue in several schools.

Joyce Losick Yang – Andover Sustainability Director began working with the school administration when EPA recognized school program began having issue that affected the school contract with Black Earth-mainly compostable tableware that the vendor did not want in the compost and other contamination issues. Andover is requesting a SMRP grant to convert from compostables to dishwashers and reusable tableware—dishes and utensils. Andover is also working on an Andover Schools Recycling and Composting policy that will become part of the Administration's charge to improve ownership waste reduction efforts. Another thing Joyce is watching is the merger of the town and schools custodial contract and how that will effect implementation of programs. Also talked about very successful food rescue programs in all schools – parent leader led.

<u>Jane Ellen Newman</u> – Natick Schools. Jane Ellen began working this past year and her work is supported jointly by the DPW and school administration. She conducted waste audits in 6 schools this past year and through the towns new bans on Styrofoam and straws, they were able to convert trays to compostable and no straws in the schools. Introduced food share in elementary schools. She is working with kitchens to improve recycling. Jane Ellen is interested in waste ban information and identifying responsible authority for school contracted kitchens—Aramark for the implementation of diverting waste ban items. Hybrid Model this fall.

<u>Jillian Wilson Martin</u> - Natick Sustainability Coordinator – Added that she saw the need to work on policy, citing Joyce's comments. There is a need to strengthen policies inside school administrations and accountability for waste bans by food service, contracted or in-house.

<u>Melissa Joyce</u> – Chelmsford. Applied for a SMRP grant to have all schools begin compost programs. Schools are operating remotely this fall—issues with HVAC systems. Melissa also has experience as a Facilities Manager for a private country-day school that had a composting program. Melissa reports to both DPW and Facilities Directors which is a plus for implementation of programs.

<u>Joe Cosgrove</u> – Methuen Envir Planning and Energy Manager. Now a Green Community and also looking at improving waste reduction. Currently working with school administration to inventory and assess school recycling and potential for composting programs.

Issues:

- <u>Waste Bans Education and Enforcement for schools and food service contractors</u>. Some are experiencing issues with getting kitchens (in-house and contractors) to adhere to state waste bans related to recycling.
- Waste Bans Education and Enforcement with custodial staff Most experience issues with getting custodial staff to implement proper recycling throughout the school(s), and with implementing organics/composting diversion. Custodial staff cite union contracts and mandates from school administration
- Adoption of School Recycling, Waste Reduction and Zero Waste Policies The group felt an important step was to have school committee/school administration implement updated waste reduction policies that cite and adhere to state waste bans as an important step toward institutional ownership *inside* school systems. Many members of this school's group are volunteers or in paid part-time positions with their home in the DPW, yet working in the schools and trying to influence decisions made by the school administrators, principals and facilities managers. Right now Andover is working to get the school administration/school committee to pass updated waste reduction/recycling policies to get the school administration to actually own the policies that can create the institutional change.
- Conversion from Single-use Ware to Dishwashers and Reusable Ware in Schools Show both economic and environmental benefits to conversion. More information, case studies, and grants from MassDEP to facilitate conversions. In building of new schools, get in early to comment/influence process to design schools for sustainable materials management: Kitchens with enough room for dishwashers and reusable ware adjacent to cafeteria, room for slurry tanks, compactors for both trash and recycling, room for both trash/recycling/compost receptacles throughout school, providing water bottle filling stations etc.
- COVID Shut Down of Recycling and Composting Programs and More Single Use Many schools/districts are experiencing these shutdowns and volunteer led programs are shut down because volunteers are not allowed in schools that have resumed in-person classes and hybrid programs. More single use wrap and utensils are being used and citing COVID health concerns for use.
- <u>Best Practices and Lessons Learned</u> There was a request for more case studies both of successes and failures on School Recycling and Composting.
