MUSEUM MONDAY: Dry Tortugas National Park, Florida

Objective(s):

 Students will access the virtual Google Arts and Culture tour of the Dry Tortugas National Park in Florida and explore this historic and tropical place!

Resources/Materials:

An internet-ready device Paper and pencil for any notes

Activity:

Have you ever been to a museum or national park where only 1% of it is available? We're heading to the Dry Tortugas National Park in Florida, where 99% of the park is underwater! Use an Internet-ready device to access the tour:

TINKER TUESDAY: It's Fluffy Slime Time!

Objective(s):

Using household objects, students will create fluffy slime.

Resources/Materials:

- → 1/2 cup White Washable PVA School Glue (Like Elmers!)
- → 3 cups Foam Shaving Cream
- → 1 tbsp Saline Solution
- → 1/4-1/2 tsp Baking Soda
- → Food coloring (optional)

Activity:

- → I'm sure you've made slime before! Maybe sticky slime, sparkle slime, or neon slime, but maybe not FLUFFY SLIME! I'm going to direct you to the Little Bins for Little Hands site for the step-by-step instructions on how to make the slime, but I wanted to share a few quick tips before you go!
 - I know I sound like a broken record, but always make sure you have an adult's
 permission and supervision when you do any kind of experiment or recipe. You want
 adults to know what you're doing, and help, but you also don't want to take
 ingredients and use them without permission.
 - 2. Just like any other recipe, make sure you have all the ingredients you need to make the slime, and make sure you have enough of it. Read the instructions at least twice!
 - 3. Spread some newspaper underneath your bowl just in case.
 - 4. Squirt some saline onto your hands before you pick up your slime to knead it; it will help it stick less.
 - 5. Store your slime in a clear sealable container, but remember that fluffy slime depends on the air in the shaving foam to stay fluffy, and that goes away after a day or so. The slime will stay, but the fluff will go!

Objective(s):

Students will do an everyday activity but outside.

Resources/Materials:

Whatever supplies you need for that activity

Activity:

Today's GO WILD WEDNESDAY seems very simple, and it really is, but it can work wonders. - Make sure you put on sunscreen!
- Try to stay outside for as long as you can, but 30 minutes is a good number.
- If it's chilly, bundle up! You don't have to wait for it to be warm.

"I don't have any activities to do outside!" Nice try! There's a bunch of things you can easily do outside instead of inside, but there is one rule: NO SCREENS.

- Read a book
- Do your school work (not on a device!)

- Eat a meal or a snack
- Play a game
- Talk with a family member
- Listen to music
- Call a family member or friend to chat (voice only, no FaceTime, see below!)

Screens aren't ideal for your activity (your eyes probably need a rest, and staring at a screen outside is kind of beside the point!), so leave the devices inside for the most part.
