## Introduction to Creative Writing (Fiction, Non-Fiction, and Poetry) Exercises

- 1. Write a short (2-3) paragraph imitation of Kafka's "Before the Law." The imitation must address Walla Walla but have nothing to do with Whitman College. Bring two typed printed copies to class. (Due 9/1/11)
- 2. The Whitman campus is beautiful! So: Find the ugliest spot on Whitman College and write a brief but thorough one-paragraph description. Be sure to use as many sensory details as possible. Be sure too to be specific, interesting, and lively, but also to withhold significant placemarkers -- you'll be reading this thing aloud in class and it'll be our job to figure out the location of your spot.
- 3. The Whitman campus is so beautiful. Find the most amazing, most wonderful, most beautiful spot on campus and write a brief but thorough one-paragraph description. Be sure to use as many sensory details as possible. Be sure too to be specific, interesting, and lively, but also to withhold significant placemarkers -- you'll be reading this thing aloud in class and it'll be our job to figure out the location of your spot. Remember: you want to erase yourself and be, as much as it is possible, a kind of inhuman, dumb, recording machine. You want as accurate a picture as you can of the place, and you want to focus on telling details: your goal is to have your peers guess the EXACT LOCATION of your spot on the first guess! (Due 9/13/11)
- 4. Optional additional exercise: Take exercise 2, pick your four favorite phrases (ffp), then take ffp #4, follow it w/ fffp#1, then follow them w/ ffps 2 & 3: you now have the first stanza of a poem. Trim it, make it coherent, add another couplet, and bring to class. (Due 9/13/11)
- 1. Take a notebook wherever you go and record (1) 3 snatches of conversations from strangers that you find particularly fascinating (be attuned to oddities of syntax or phrasing: sometimes things are fascinating not so much b/c of their content but rather because of how they're said). (2) 3 observations, drawn from life, that point out something that is seemingly ordinary but actually tremendously weird. **E-mail these to me no later than 10 am on 10/18/11**. They need not be sent as attachments -- just put them on the body of the e-mail -- but be sure to include your name and the class section on the subject line. (Due 10/18/11)
