Where Do I Start?

- "Omg, those engagement lists are great but they're a million pages long and so overwhelming, I couldn't look at them for a week..."
- "I wanted to print it but it was like 40 pages!!"
- "...I was too stressed out to open the doc"
 - -Real feedback from kallahs like you. You're not alone! Lol

Relax. You don't have to read this all at once!

- 1. Read the "Mazal tov" message and *Engagement Hashkafa*
- 2. Check out your Outline List of Kallah Obligations
- 3. Book kallah classes at Mikvah.org/instructors as soon as you have the wedding date. (And for many, to consult and work out a wedding date!)
- 4. Check out important guidelines for the wedding preparation at mikvah.org/wedding.
- 5. Buy a notebook and sefer for kallah classes.
- 6. Once you have your wedding date, book hair and makeup
- 7. Call Ten Yad to find out if you are eligible/how to receive their services. Then go shopping with what they give you and make a registry or shopping list for remaining items.
- 8. If financially applicable, apply for food stamps and/or Medicaid (see: *Useful Phone Numbers*). Make sure you have health insurance if you are moving to NY or USA after marriage

- 9. Gown hunt: (unless you know exactly what you are getting/are buying/are doing custom-made) if you're on a budget start with Ten Yad (free), move on to gemachs (~\$250), or consignment / rental. Mrs. Raitzes (rentals start ~\$600 can make anything so it helps if you know exactly what you want, which you'll get a better idea of as you try on gowns)
- 10. Start looking for a shaitel
- 11. Over Shabbos (because who has time otherwise) read the books suggested in Recommended Reading
- 12. Lastly (in the week before your wedding), schedule your mikvah appointment, making sure to say you are a kallah

The "MZT You're Engaged" Message

It's so fun to be a kallah, enjoy it!!! It's also a super stressful and draining time, so it makes sense if you think it's NOT at all fun.

And the most important thing I can tell you is to not talk about your chosson especially not to other kallahs. Don't compare stories, don't answer questions like "was he the first guy you dated, how did he propose, how long did you go out for..." it's nobody's business. It sounds so obvious but it's so important, you're in a vulnerable place now and the last thing you need is a thoughtless comment.

Also remember that the process you went through in dating is different and unique from everyone else's, so don't worry if they are "head over heels" and you're not, or if you're the one in la land and your friend seems out of it... whatever you are feeling now is valid and fine.

Keep in touch with your mashpia or whoever you were consulting but don't give in to the temptation of talking to even your best friend... It's practice for your marriage imyh:)

and of course, now is when to add in davening, tzedakah etc and daven for clarity during this time and that your chosson should be your bashert - from shoresh neshama (bc your davening can change the reality).

And may you have lots of mazel so that both ruchnius and physical prep go smoothly!

dach it is not right to discuss other shidduchim one went on.

Even after one is married one should not discuss with whom else he/she went out. It is not right to discuss the private life of other people, even with your own husband.

WHAT IS THE TERM "SHOMER N'GIYA" THAT IS USED A LOT LATE-LY. IS THIS A LEVEL?

There are three different types of behavior when we are dealing with members of the opposite gender: There is behavior which is tzniusdik; there is behavior which is not tzniusdik; and there is behavior which is pritzus. The halacha clearly states that touching is forbidden before the wedding. This is pritzus mamash.

It has gotten out of hand because of lack of knowledge. Those who think it is a madreiga, it is because they are confused. But according to halacha this is an issur. It is not a "madreiga" to be "shomer n'giya." It is a complete prohibition for boys and girls to touch.

CAN YOU OFFER GUIDELINES FOR THE "PROPOSAL"?

The proposal must be done in a Yiddishe and Chasidishe way. It used to be that the proposal was, "Let's write in to the Rebbe for his brocho," or "Are we ready to write to the Rebbe?" The same manner should be continued today, by saying, "Let's go to the Rebbe," or "Are we ready to go to the Rebbe?" That is how the shiddach should be finalized.

In no way does the "proposal" include copying the non-Jewish or secular customs. Bringing a bottle of champagne is goyish. Doing any "romantic" act is Goyish.

WHAT CHASIDISHE GUIDELINES SHOULD I GIVE TO THE CHOSSON OR KALLAH ONCE THEY ARE ENGAGED BUT NOT YET MARRIED.

According to halacha only when you get married can you act close, as man and wife. Before that you are strangers, even after the L'Chaim. The attitude that a chosson and kallah should build up their feelings towards each other during the engagement is not correct. Feelings will come after they are married. The Rebbe said that a chosson and kallah could meet once week to keep up the connection, so that they should not feel so strange. But there must be limits. In the Hagada it says, "Kol HaMarbe harei zeh meshubach - All who increase are praiseworthy." Here it is just the opposite. What is allowed is allowed, but we may not stretch the Rebbe's words.

During the time when they do get together (it is not a "must" that they see each other once a week) they should not go to any of those types of places listed above that were inappropriate before they got engaged. When they spend time on the phone it should be made up in advance how long they will converse.

Also, chosson and kallah should not shop together for anything connected with the bedroom or her clothing and sheitlach. Needless to say, it is forbidden for them to discuss anything in the area of Taharas Hamishpocha.

The Rebbe says that if there is too much closeness when there shouldn't be, then when closeness is allowed, they will be distant.

WHAT ABOUT CHOSSON OR KALLAH LEARNING THE "FACTS OF LIFE" FROM NON-JEWISH SOURCES?

There is a tremendous chisaron in this, for "our ways are not their ways" and the secular attitude in this area is generally not in keeping with that of Torah. When a person starts his married life based on the Yetzer Hora, he will always be confused. By preparing ourselves to begin a beautiful life not according to Torah, but rather, according to secular values and knowledge, we are harming ourselves. We are taking away pleasures that we know are according to Torah and should be without guilt; we will be confused about what are our natural needs and what are our needs based on non-Torah sources.

It would be our wish that our children would ask uswe would not have to bring up the subject - but not always do our wishes come true. Sometimes we have to tell them even if they don't ask. It is very important that we should tell them the Torah way, the way our parents and grandparents told us, and we can tell them that throughout the generations people were happy following the derech of Torah. We see an example from the many baalei teshuva who before had no limits and now that they are frum are "limited." But they are happy with the limitations. Having limits does not take away happiness and pleasure. It is a confusion to think that way.

ARE THERE GUIDELINES CONCERN-ING THE VORT/L'CHAIM?

The Rebbe's guideline is not to spend a lot of money. Spending the amount of money that people spend these days (serving meat, etc.) is completely against the Rebbe's ratzon.

A simcha is not matir pritzus - does not give permission for pritzus. There should be a separate entrance for men and women. Just because there is a L'Chaim, it does not mean that men and women are allowed to push each other.

commitment you have entered into a relationship and must be ready to accept all that it entails. Do not jump into anything or take any risks. If you would like to risk your own life that is your concern, but to risk someone else's life is unforgivable. You must realize that your decisions after engagement don't affect just you but someone else as well.

Step #4 - The Engagement Period

The Rebbe always stressed (Igros 4 p. 365), that the duration of the engagement should be short and that the wedding should be held as soon as possible. The time of the engagement is called by the Rebbe "yokor mikol yokor." During this period, you are going to prepare and set yourself up in gashmius and ruchnius to enter the marriage in the proper state of mind. The Rebbe says (Igros 4 p. 62) that the foundation of a structure must be made out of the right materials or it will not last. The right materials are Torah, mitzvos and chasidus.

In the secular world, the concept of being engaged is a very different one. The wedding does not take place right away, and may very well be delayed for several years. To a certain extent, there is no concept of commitment. It is just a mutual agreement to date only each other and to eventually consider actually getting married. There is no such concept in the Torah world. This is not a time to become better acquainted and spend all of your time together. Until you are sharing your daily lives together it will not be possible to have a relationship. To attempt to become closer during this time can be both dangerous and frustrating. Casual and lighthearted behavior, which after marriage will be the norm, might have a negative effect during your engagement. A joke, a tease, or sharp comment, which may go unnoticed after marriage, can cause tremendous pain at this time.


There are strong opinions as to how often you should see each other. The Rebbe said regarding this matter, "once a week is appropriate," and "the less, the better." If a situation arises that there is a need to see one another more often, you should discuss it with your mashpia or mentor. Focusing on strengthening yourself spiritually and keeping your time together to a minimum will be very beneficial to your relationship once you are married. Anything confidential shared during these times should not be discussed with anyone other than your future mate. Sharing this information with others is an act of disloyalty.

Halachically speaking, you are not related to each other whatsoever; any physical contact is absolutely forbidden. The laws of niddah are one and the same for a single girl and a married woman. The spiritual repercussions for violating these halachos are very severe and may have a tremendous effect on your children and future relationship chas veshalom. The Rebbe says (Igros 15 p. 113) that distance in a relationship is caused by being close when it is not allowed. "When you're close when you should be distant, you end up being distant when you should be close."


The word for a man in Hebrew is Ish and for a woman Isha. The hei in the Isha, and the yud in Ish represent the manifestation of Hashem in the union. If halacha is not properly observed right from the beginning, you are, in effect removing Hashem from the union. When you remove the yud and the hei from the Ish and Isha, all that remains is aish, fire. Without Hashem standing between these two fiery beings and bringing them together, they will inevitably consume each other.

In order for your marriage to be based upon Torah and chasidus, you must use this time to strengthen yourself in these areas, so that right from the beginning you will be fully prepared to incorporate them into your marriage. The way you set the tone in the beginning of your marriage will have a profound effect on the way it will be for the rest of your life. Be prepared. This is what your efforts and energy should be used for during your engagement. Once you have accomplished this you will be ready to make your home a proper dwelling place for the Aibershter's brochos.

woman gives up much more in a marriage than a man (physically, and also psychologically, as symbolized by her giving up even her name, her very identity—and, when she becomes pregnant, her body, her sleep, her freedom...). The task to be accomplished by the man in the shanah rishonah is to give the woman the assurance that she is his absolute top priority and thus to give her the security to cheerfully give up virtually everything for her husband and future family.

CHASSIDUS SAYS that a husband and wife are *mashpia* (giver) and *mekabel* (receiver). A healthy connection between them produces healthy children.

But what does it mean to be a mashpia and what does it mean to be a mekabel? It is a very vast and rich subject. In this article, we will discuss just one aspect:

To be *mekabel* you have to have a certain degree of bitul. You have to make yourself extremely vulnerable, to surrender yourself, to the *mashpia*.

When we were teenagers, Reb Yoel Kahn became our teacher. But he was a teacher unlike any other. And so, for the first time, we lost our arrogance completely. For the first time, we felt like students, like *mekablim*.

When he would talk we would become completely absorbed and receptive, with no other thought in our minds than to understand what he was explaining, no other hope than that he should continue speaking. When he finished explaining as only he can, and the class was over, we had trouble re-adjusting to just being teenagers again.

We trusted him completely, and were putty in his capable hands.

ABSOLUTE SECURITY

For a wife to feel like a wife, she has to be able to surrender completely and she can't do that if the husband doesn't provide absolute security.

Of course, it's not just financial security. She has to be confident that no matter what happens, he is there for her; any problem she will have will not be hers alone. The role of a husband/mashpia is to take full responsibility for everything that happens in the home and in the family. A husband can never say, "I'm doing my part, let her do hers," because he is responsible for helping her do her part as well. Only he can inspire her to do her part by making her feel she is his first priority, that she can trust him completely and feel secure that he will share her burdens.

In some ways the mekabel makes the mashpia; in other ways the mashpia makes the mekabel. It seems like a paradox. The student makes the teacher by being receptive and by surrendering to the teaching?

But it's true. Even a mediocre teacher discovers new talents when a student really wants to know. A student's hunger reveals new capacities in the teacher.

A husband might argue, "If she was more of a *mekabel*, I would be more of a *mashpia*."

But it is the responsibility of the husband/mashpia to enable the wife/mekabel to be as receptive as she needs to be. Rabba would make a light-hearted comment in order to stimulate students' interest and minds before beginning his lesson. Why would it be the teacher's job



to stimulate the students? Shouldn't it be the student's job to come to class already motivated, interested and ready to learn?

It seems that even the most motivated and dedicated student is a little overwhelmed by the role and the responsibility. They take their education seriously. A mashpia therefore has to relax the students and encourage them to not be afraid of what they're going to experience by being totally open to the learning; to surrender, to trust, like a true mekabel.

There's a natural instinct in a wife to make herself completely vulnerable to her husband, completely dependent on the goodness and decency of her husband. But being that trusting is an awesome undertaking. It is therefore the husband's responsibility to provide the security, the confidence, and the strength so she can be as trusting as she needs to be and wants to be.

The husband who hasn't given his wife that assurance that he is there for her forever leaves the wife with a need to protect herself and withhold at least something about her own life-like a back door through which she can escape if she should need to.

But withholding doesn't work, you see,

If I can rely on you only 99% then I can't rely on you.

because the nature of a *mekabel* is all or nothing. There can be no partial *mekabel*. You've either surrendered and absorbed, or you haven't. Just as there is no such thing as partial security. If I can rely on you only 99% then I can't rely on you.

This is basically the content and substance of the ma'amar that every chosson says before the chuppah. His behavior at the badeken in some way is the chosson's assurance of his total devotion, thus encouraging the kallah to go willingly, nappily, to the chuppah despite all she will give up.

The modern craziness of thinking that a marriage is a 50-50 proposition never nade any sense, not for the *mekabel* and not for the *mashpia*. The whole concept s problematic because you can't surrender only 50% and you can't be only 50% eliable. Each one has to give 100 percent. This doesn't mean they can't divide the thores between them in whichever way works for them. This has nothing to do with who cooks and who takes out the garbage.)

WHY GET MARRIED?

Why should a husband be willing to take uch responsibility, become unconditionilly devoted and responsible, forever?

Because without a wife he's not a numan being. When the Torah says hat Adam was created male and female, and then he was divided into two peole, are we to assume that the division nade them normal? Or were they normal refore, and division is always artificial and unnatural?

When the Torah says that "thereore should a man leave his father and nother and cleave to his wife, and the two will become one," it becomes obvious that being separate is unnatural and undesirable.

Our true nature is to be one. Only then do we receive blessings from Above. The Torah is telling us that the reason we can be one is that we were created that way. Removing all things that separate us automatically results in oneness. But this oneness is so precious that the Aibershter wants us to achieve it through our own effort, not as a free gift from Above. And so He separated Adam into two distinct people, male and female, who then have to find each other and become one again.

Why do we have a *mechitzah* even between husband and wife? So the husband won't become distracted when he should be thinking about Hashem? No. It is because Hashem says, "When you're sitting next to your wife, don't talk to Me."

That is the way Hashem is. He is not jealous of your *shalom bayis*. He wants your *shalom bayis*, He wants you to focus on others at the right time and place. Avrohom Avinu was talking to Hashem when he saw guests coming, people who were not Jews. Hashem said, "I won't keep you."

The objective for the bachur getting married is to become more of a mashpia. In contrast to the mekabel, who needs encouragement, the mashpia needs confidence that what he has to offer is valuable. His care. His support. His leadership. His taking responsibility.

He has to behave in such a way that she enjoys following his lead. He must be responsible but never rejecting or scornful, so if he feels they cannot afford something, he can say gently but firmly, "I wish I could do this for you right now..."

There is a way to be responsible with out being dismissive of her feelings, her dreams. A husband has to always be in sympathy with his wife, knowing that being a mekabel is much harder than being a mashpia.

to the husband about shanar

During the shanah rishonah, the first year of marriage, the entire obligation of the husband to the exclusion of all else is vesimach es ishto, to make his wrife happy. He is exempt from social military, and financial responsibilities (to the extent possible) because he must vote himself to making his wife happy, This doesn't mean going to amusement parks, restaurants, vacations, and partying for a year. Rather, it takes about a year for the security that he's offering his wife to really settle in to her bones. By the end of the year, her reliance and dependence on her father has shifted to her husband, gradually but definitely. Now, in a moment of crisis, he is her first thought, like her father used to be.


In the olden days when marriage was really sacred, the wife's security was instantaneous. If he marries me, he's there for me, it's for keeps. Today we need a little more assurance. It takes time to build the trust, to create a willing mekabel.

Since every match was made in Heaven, Hashem obviously believes that you can be a *mashpia* and she can be a *mekabel*. It is really amazing that G-d entrusts us with this, but He does. Take confidence in the Aibershter's trust in you and pass it on to your wife.

Chassidus teaches us that when you feel like a man it helps her feel like a woman. You take responsibility. You be trustworthy. She will be the wife she can be

A lot of new husbands worry about taking responsibility. "What if I can't find a job, what if I can't support her? he worries.

It doesn't necessarily mean she has los respect for you. The worse things are, th



more blessed you are to have a good wife who is there to support you in your struggles, to care about you, to daven for you, despite your situation, despite, even, any weaknesses you may have. She doesn't expect you to be Superman, as long as you don't use your financial failures to justify neglecting her or abusing her.

Let's not get caught up in the psychobabble. Let's treat our marriages in the Jewish fashion, in the *chassidishe* fashion. Then we'll never need any interventions or secular self-help books.

Stop worrying about the details and be a mentsch.

Post Script: It is never too late to do what should have been done during shanah rishonah.

Basic House Set Up

Basic house set up - see registry list:

- Bedroom: Furniture. Lamp. Linen. Hangers. Full length mirror. Bed frames, mattresses, mattress covers, blanket, pillows, alarm clock (for shab), air conditioner/fan, floor rug, curtains
- **Bathroom**: Curtain and rings. Pads, bedika cloths. Toothbrush. Mouthwash. Floss. Shampoo. Toilet paper. towels and hand towel
- **Living/dining room**: Furniture. Bookshelves. Couch. Picture frames. Rebbe pic, paintings of all the Rebbeim (there's a great painting gmach in Baltimore)
- Salt. Certain seforim and chitas to move. Tzedakah, pushka. Hanging pushka for kitchen or hang up a cup

Notes About Shopping

- This needs to be said first Stores are open even after your wedding... if you don't need it
 to get married, don't stress out to buy it now!! Get the bare minimum basics (listed above
 under basic house set up, under kallah obligations), the rest can be a shopping trip with your
 new husband or buy as you figure out what you need.
- Remember that some stuff depends on your personal preferences like lifestyle and living space... as you figure all that out, expect (and be pleasantly surprised if you don't end up with) a LOT of buying and returning the first few months!
- White nightgown make sure it is fully tznius for you Amazon has an option <u>here</u> (check stock of <u>this one</u>)

- **Toiveling dishes** 1 part oil to 2 parts baking soda removes stickers without having to use strong-smelling chemical like Goo-Gone

- **Linen** Beyond Bedding, a basement on Kingston near Judaica World, they have really nice things and have similar prices plus you can see it on display. Linen in Boro Park is more expensive (except for stores like the Chasunah Depot)

- **Corelle** heads up their square dishes are wayyyy bigger than their round ones! Small square plate is like the size of a big plate. Soup bowls hold double the amount. Etc
- **Cutlery** if you're buying your own, manufacturer websites like <u>oneida.com</u> may be cheaper
- For small things (not good quality pots and pans but like peelers, cutting boards, even serving bowls etc) It's probably cheaper to go first to Home Goods and Amazing Savings and then fill in the rest at the bigger stores like Target
- Amazon gift registry is best option for a registry. Can connect to other stores too

Basic Registry List

Basic list to get you started. Nothing is a must so don't feel like you have to check it all off!

If you are making a registry for people buying you gifts, choose things with a variety of price ranges so people can buy cheap things (or bundle together a lot of small things like measuring cups and bowls into a baking themed gift) or splurge/chip in for a big one. Remember you can return anything anyways but know your crowd and make your registry accordingly.

Try to buy LESS rather than MORE (it's a tough balance bc now is when you have ppl willing and ready to spend on you lol) but it takes a while until you figure out your own cooking/household management style... (for ex you hate Pyrex and love disposables / you think Pyrex is the easiest and don't own a single "real" serving bowl... turns out you host all the time and need gorgeous Shabbos dishes / you never end up hosting and will never need shabbos china, etc)

Notes on Jewish Home, Mazel Tov and Made In Heaven

The Talis:

- Represents Ohr Makif that wife gives the husband
- Each tassel has 8 strings x4 = 32 = 32. Kallah is giving whole heart to Chosson <3
- Represents light that contains power of creation Hashem's name is mentioned 32x during creation. Through marriage, couple emulate Hashem in the ability of creation
- Chosson begins wearing Talis at wedding just like it says Hashem was wrapped in a Talis at Matan Torah

Ufruf:

- Chosson is like a king and King has to write his own Torah. Through being called to the Torah, shows he has similar status
- Nuts thrown at Chosson: טוב = 17 שנוד. Chosson forgiven for all sins and they're transformed to state of good
- Torah אמונה פשוטה is the idea of נעשה, which represents אמונה פשוטה, with will help a person overcome life challenges that he may encounter.
- Torah is the יסוד of the world. Before building a Jewish home we build a bound with the תורה.

Mikvah:

- Like being reborn. Represents water in womb leave with new spirit
- The word ביטול = טבילה. Represents total ביטול to Hashem
- Represents water of Gan Eden, place where love between man and woman is flawless
- Immersing in water which is compared to Torah

Week before wedding:

- Chosson and Kallah like king and his queen
- So holy, need extra protection from מזיקין
- Before Yitzchak's wedding, Midrash says he hid in Gan Eden to hide from evil forces

DAY OF:

Fasting:

- Pure of all sin, just like Yom Kippur
- just like Adam and Chava who got married clean of sin (married before חטא עץ הדעת)
- Also, since seeking forgiveness from sin, we fast because first sin involved eating
- Adam and Chava were in perfect harmony *before* sin. We want that in our relationship.
- Breaking away from Gashmius allows us to focus on Ruchnius aspects of marriage uniting in soul. Shows that Chosson and Kallah both value more than just physical in the
 relationship
- Bnei Yisrael fasted before Matan Torah
- Custom of early Chassidim to fast the day before a beloved Mitzvah

Mincha before Chuppah:

 Adam was created in the afternoon - he davened the first Mincha. Chava was brought to him soon so applies until this day to Daven Mincha before the Chuppah

Wearing white:

- On Tu B'av all girls wore white
- Kohanim wore white in Bais HaMikdash, and Kohen Gadol on Yom Kippur
- Like parchment of Tefillin
- All sins are forgiven = pure
- White is the *only* color that is revealed in this world the same as it is above, it's not a
 man-made color. We wear white to show that marriage is established by heaven decided from above
- All other colors are best visible and site their truest shade when on a white background
- White has no leaning or similarity to any other color

Kabbalas Panim:

- Some say custom from when Eliezer gave Rivkah's family delicacies
- Chosson says Torah to show that marriage is founded on the basis of Torah.
- All Neshamos of Rabbeim are invited when saying maamer "Lecha Dodi"

Kesubah:

• Begins with letter "Beis" just like Torah. Torah is like the Kesubah between Bnei Yisrael and Hashem

Veil:

- Sign of modesty (like Rivkah)
- Shows that Chosson is not only attracted to physical beauty but also spiritual qualities which never fade
- Symbolizes husband providing clothing for wife

 Kallah covered so can't see ring. When married, accepts everything husband gives her with faith

Chuppah:

- Represents Mishkan made of tapestries and beams where the Chosson and Kallah (Bnei Yisrael and Hashem) began new life together
- Symbolizes house (that's why it's outdoors)
- Open on all 4 sides like Avraham's tent
- Adam and Chava got married under a Chuppah
- Symbolizes mountain over heads of Bnei Yisrael at Matan Torah
- Allows for Kidushin in private domain
- It's Makif. Represents special "Sovev" powers that Chosson and Kallah receive

Under stars:

- Children should be as numerous as the stars
- Under heavens because heavens are source of Bracha (Debating 26:15)
- Heavens reveal Hashem existence: when people gaze at stars and orbits, easily recognize Hashem
- On earth, different places have different characteristics (climate, type of land etc) = ממלא,
 vs Heaven where all is same = סובר

What to think under Chuppah:

- Rebbe Rayatz: "constantly think G-d fearing thoughts under the Chuppah; that you should have G-d fearing children, and upright blessed generations."
- Thoughts of Chosson and Kallah impact their whole life together!
- Some say to daven that your husband and children should always be yiras shamayim
- Some people have in mind each Rebbe's name with their mothers name for each of the 7x going around under the Chuppah. Here is the list:
 - Shneur Zalman Ben Rivkah
 - Dovber Ben Shterna
 - Menachem Mendel Ben Devorah Leah
 - Shmuel Ben Chaya Mussia
 - Shalom Dovber Ben Rivkah
 - Yosef Yitzchak Ben Shterna Sara
 - Menachem Mendel Ben Chana

Escorts:

- Alter Rebbe: "Chosson and Kallah require shushvinim to escort them to go alone because of embarrassment; they are in need of someone who will assist and support them"
- Specifically married couples who can encourage them
- Adam was escorted by מלאך גבריאל and מלאך מיכאל
- By מתן תורה, the 2 לוחות "escorted" Hashem

- Kallah is brought to Chosson just like:
 - Chava was brought to Adam
 - Bnei Yisrael were brought to Hashem at Matan Torah

No knots:

About to be 100% bound to wife

Nothing in pockets/no Jewelry:

- Symbolizes that each is accepting partner for who they are without possessions
- Kittel reminds of death and nothing in pockets reminds Chosson that will leave world empty handed
- No Jewelry just like Kohen Gadol didn't wear gold on Yom Kippur
- Chosson starts walking with right foot to represent starting off marriage on the "right foot"

Candles:

- =Fire at Matan Torah
- "Ish" and "Isha:" when there is love and harmony between man and woman, then Hashem's name rests with them. But if not, then there is "Eish"
- Ner = 250. 2 candles = 500. Man has 248 limbs and woman had 252. Symbolizes man and woman uniting
- Also 500 is the Gematria of "פרו ורבו"

Kallah circles Chosson:

- Chosson is like a king
- Represents Moshiach's times when men and women will be equal and woman will also be able to protect husband
- Protecting Chosson from outside desires
- Represents אור מקיף

Circling 7x:

- As soon as married, 7 relatives are forbidden to Chosson
- Kallah is davening that 7 Nivios and 7 shepherds of Bnei Yisrael protect their marriage
- Committed devotion for every day of the week. 24/7
- After circles, Kallah stands on Chosson's right: symbolizing that she will always be on his right side to help him
- In Tehillim: "נצבה שגל לימנך." The word שגל means a queen. Last letter of each word spells.

The ring:

- Changes status of Kallah from single to married
- Like the Torah; endless, never finishes
- Just like Torah is the ring that **forever** bonds Bnei Yisrael to Hashem, so too the couple's bond should be everlasting

- Like link in a chain; couple becomes link in chain of humanity
- Symbolizes giving authority over household from now on, life is shared
- Protection of husband surrounding wife
- Represents space before creation. Hashem created a space b4 creation so too here, represents space before a new creation
- Represents space you have to make for your spouse for a happy marriage
- Will serve as reminder to wife at all times that she's married
- Represents both:
 - Sovev encompassing shape
 - Makif needs to fit finger
- Through placing <u>ring</u> on <u>finger</u>, shows unification of <u>spiritual</u> and <u>physical</u> aspects of marriage

Ring on finger:

- On *right* hand. Right represents love (τοη)
- 7th finger to the right facing Chosson (יסוד שבמלכות)
- 7th finger: wedding is reenactment of the 7-day creation
- Giving ring = unity of Hashem's name. This name of Hashem represents the marriage of the זכר and נקבה elements of creation:
 - Yud = wisdom of creation (1st letter in creation)
 - Hey = Chosson's hand (5 fingers)
 - Vov = Kallahs finger (shape of vov)
 - Hev = Kallah's hand
- The phrase "הרי את מקודשת לי has **32** letters.
 - The name אלוקים appears 32x in creation
 - 32 = 'Lev' represents Chosson giving his heart to Kallah and that they love each other with their whole heart
 - Beis = ישרא<u>ל,</u> (first letter in Torah) Lamed = ישרא<u>ל,</u> (last letter in Torah.)
 Encompasses all of Torah. Torah is marriage between Bnei Yisrael and Hashem

Breaking glass:

- Represents first Luchos broken at our wedding with Hashem
- To be Yotzie the מלאך המות if anything bad was supposed to happen to the couple (ח"ו)
- Unlike ceramic, glass CAN be re blown (תחיית המתים)
- In the Beis HaMikdash, Shlomo had a special gate for Chasanim made of glass.
 Breaking glass symbolizes the destruction of the Beis HaMikdash along with this gate

Dancing:

- We dance in circles symbolizing the Makif powers which unite the Chosson and Kallah
- Way of expressing pure joy :)

Sheva Brachos:

• It says that when a person gets married, that gain from 7 benefits:

- Full human stature
- Joy
- Good
- Bracha
- Torah
- Protection
- Peace
- Earliest hint for Sheva Brachos is when Rivka's family blessed her before marriage

Mikvah Checklist

Most mikvaos provide the basics (if you're using one out of town, call and ask what they provide) but it's good to create your own kit so you don't have to rely on your room having what you need, or you may not want to use those things. Buy travel-sized items or containers and keep the mikvah kit separate from your regular toiletries. After each time, make sure to refill what you've used.

*not necessary for chafifa

Don't forget to bring cash!

- Mouth
 - Toothbrush
 - Toothpaste
 - Unwaxed dental floss
- Face
 - Strong makeup remover
 - Cotton pads for liquid makeup remover
 - Tweezers (also for splinters)
 - Contact lens solution/case
- Head
 - Q-tips
 - Spare earring to clean earlobes (you may not always come wearing earrings!)
 - Alcohol to clean ears and belly button (every mikvah has)
 - Hydrogen peroxide (every mikvah has)

- Send out a Google sheet link for friends and family to fill out names for davening in correct categories like healing, shidduchim, kids, etc. Print (daven for others at kabolas panim, not under chuppah)

Prepare for Wedding Night

First night:

- Bedika cloths
- Lubricant (KY although widely suggested is not the healthiest. You can use coconut oil refined has no smell - either melt some under hot water or it melts in your hand)
 - (people have posted differing comments on this. Someone said coconut oil promotes yeast infection because it changes the ph balance which is very delicate in the vaginal area. Someone else said that coconut oil actually helps heal skin there. Do your own research and if you are having yeast infection issues, don't use)
 - Reader comment: My Kallah teacher suggested vitamin E oil. Make sure to get one that is natural. search nature's bounty vitamin e oil on amazon. There is a \$7 bottle that lasts a while
 - Reader comment: before using any oils (almond, coconut etc) first spread some on your belly or thigh and wait a day to see if you react. Just in case you are allergic when it's applied, even if you're not allergic when eating
 - Note that all oils WILL STAIN YOUR SHEETS
- White sheet (ask your kallah teacher)
- White towel (ask your kallah teacher)
- Tznius nightgown socks
- Thick pad not tampons
- Tichel
- Sleep tichel
- Ponytail for under shaitel, shaitel, velvet headband
- Phone charger (with kallah teacher/rav number saved)
- GOOD makeup remover and q-tips for all the heavy wedding makeup
- Negel Vaaser
- Optional: Tzedakah box with coins

- Clock in the house or a watch
- Shabbos light switch covers
- Urn Put up hot water for coffee
- Wine for havdalah (corkscrew if necessary)
- Besamim / havdalah candle
- Becher

Once You Are Married (Pregnancy, Birth & Shalom Bayis)

(**Don't read this now. Don't freak out!!** Just know that it's here, for when you need it. Obviously, these things are way beyond the scope of this list, so here are some resources just to set you in the right direction.)

Start taking folate vitamins (better than folic acid) and take them regularly in your childbearing years.

If you're worried about trying to get pregnant:

- Don't worry at all until a year AFTER you've already figured things out. (If you've been married for less than a year and have no good reason to stress (re your age/health), stop stressing.)
- Taking Charge of Your Fertility by Toni Wechsler will help you understand what's going on
- If you think you should be worried, reach out to your mikvah.org-certified kallah teacher for further resources as to the best course of action.

If you think you're pregnant:

Buy a pregnancy test (the cheap strips <u>online</u> or from dollar store work just as well as the <u>expensive brands</u> like First Response sold on Amazon. Also you will want to take more than one.) Follow the directions on the package (each brand might be slightly different). Best time to take it is first thing in the morning.

Am I pregnant?

The first sign of pregnancy is a missed period.

The way to know for sure is to take a test. However, you can be feeling symptoms even before a test shows a positive. (The more expensive texts like \$10 each from Amazon will be more sensitive, the cheap ones like a pack of 50 strips for \$10 can show a positive a week or two later. Tests work by detecting HCG levels in your urine which is a hormone that rises during pregnancy so it's possible to test "too early" for the test to detect it. You can be getting negative results while actually being pregnant.)

Some common early signs that can show up even before a test:

- Aching or tender breasts
- Sensitivity or gag reflex when brushing your teeth or swallowing pills
- Nausea, not necessarily just in the morning
- Appetite changes (hungry but not wanting to eat the opposite of morning sickness)
- Being nauseated from food especially raw meat like chicken
- Feeling hormonal or not like yourself
- Achy or tender in your lower belly
- Bloating
- Changes in vaginal discharge you'll see this in your underwear
- Some women say they just "know it"

As you see, your whole body starts to change, possibly even before you're aware of it. Much like motherhood itself, our bodies have intuition before our brains catch up.

When you imyh find out you are pregnant:

 - It's like kallah classes, but for motherhood: an all-in-one crash course to transform you from anxious to empowered and prepare you for the most important role of your life... Because you shouldn't have to learn on the job.
 - Sign up or sign up for the waitlist here
- Consider not telling anyone who you will also be prepared to UNtell if (G-d forbid) you
 have a miscarriage. For that reason, many women wait til at least after the first trimester
 to share. Conversely, think about telling someone who would be a support to you if they
 would celebrate, they would also support you. The Rebbe's instructions: wait until the 5th
 month to publicize (this does not mean family/close friends).

- Miscarriage: 1 in 4 women will have a miscarriage. It is very common, normal, and not your fault. It is not shameful and your body is not broken. 2 or more in a row is considered a medical issue and should be brought up with your doctor.
- If you'd like a doula, book one earlier rather than later (at least 5 months in advance)
- When to book a doctor's appointment? Right away, even though the first appointment won't be until at least 8 weeks. This is so that you officially have a provider in case you need emergency services / have a miscarriage early on, etc
- Sonograms (many hospitals require at least 1) / finding out gender: ask your ray
- Go follow <a>@MotheringMindset on instagram to learn how to parent from birth :)
- Mixed reviews on What to Expect When You're Expecting (one comment said it gave her anxiety by outlining every possible thing that could ever go wrong, one comment said it was very helpful)
- Good books to read:
 - o A Labor of Love, by Rachel Broncher (on pregnancy and birth)
 - Your Self-Confident Baby, by Magda Gerber
 - Elevating Childcare, by Janet Lansbury
 - o Momma Natural (recommended by Rivky Boyarksy, RN/Kalla Teacher
 - The Baby Whisperer Solves All Your Problems, by Tracy Hogg (read after baby is born, or right before, like don't spend 9 months reading up on sleep schedules)
 - The Happiest Baby on the Block (helpful after baby is born for how to soothe babies)
- In the 9th month, ask rav for shailos about giving birth on Shabbos copy and paste this
 list for him to answer! (how to light candles, make kiddush and havdalah, calling doctor,
 calling Uber/paying for cab, bringing your bag with you, bringing phone with you, what
 muktza can you do adjusting bed, calling nurse while in labor or after giving birth, etc)

Sign up for WIC!

If you live in Crown Heights you can go next door to Empire Kosher with all your documents and within an hour you'll walk out with a card. Tip: go in the morning as it gets busier toward the afternoon. As part of WIC you'll get money to buy cheese, cereal, produce, milk, etc

mothers who are part of The Bridge Project receive \$1,000 a month for the first 18 months of the program and \$500 a month for the last 18 months, all on a biweekly basis

In order to fill out the interest form for The Bridge Project, you must meet all of the below eligibility requirements:

- Be 18 years old or older
- Be 23 weeks pregnant or less with your first child
- Have an annual household income under \$52,000
- Live in New York City

Hospital Packing List: (don't overpack - space is tiny!)

- Tichels
- Robe with long zipper, or comfy outfit nursing accessible
- Makeup for visitors or taking pics
- Naot / comfortable shoes or slippers
- Warm socks for labor (many women's feet become cold)
- Nursing bra remind doula to remove during active labor so you can do skin to skin immediately
- Essential oils for smelling (besamim is a segula)
- Bag of toiletries (toothbrush and toothpaste, shampoo/conditioner, consider skipping deodorant bc you'll be cuddling with newborn and they'll smell it)
- Hair towel (optional, hospitals have towels)
- Flip flops for hospital shower
- Books, magazines or books loaded onto your phone
- Phone charger **with long wire!!** so it reaches your hospital bed
- Music, earbuds
- Bottle of witch hazel (pink bottle, alcohol free) to soak pads with. Soothes much better than anything hospital provides
- Lots of snacks with fiber, dried fruit
- Frozen real meal to eat immediately after giving birth! (it will defrost by then)
- Dollar bills for vending machine
- Water bottle to refill
- Outfit to bring baby home in (a visitor can bring this for you) something loose or with a side zipper (not front zipper or buttons) bc of umbilical cord stump
- Nice baby outfit (hat, outfit or blanket) if your hospital offers baby photos (session is free and you receive a gallery link to purchase from or just screenshot lol)
- Real jewelry be cautious so it doesn't get lost but it's nice to get a pic while wearing your rings and holding those tiny hands
- Pacifier
- Chocolates for nurses around 10 to hand out. Give it right when they introduce themselves at beginning of shift bc they tend to leave at end of shift without telling you
- Foldable canvas bag to take home hospital goodies (like, grandma underwear)
- Outfit and shaitel to go home in

Spiritual Birthing Checklist / Reminders for Doula

- Shir Hamaalos card for your robe and for baby's bassinet
- Dollar from Rebbe (if you have), images of Rebbeim like the accordion baby book
- Chitas
- pushka and coins for staff to give
- Recording on your phone of Rebbe saying Modeh Ani to play when baby is born
- Page of Aleph Bais (or small chart) to put in bassinet and show to baby
- Ask doula to help you keep your hair covered
- Wash negel vasser after giving birth before nursing
- Nurse from left side first, closer to heart (segula for child to have binah)

A Note On Shalom Bayis

Just as when you got engaged, you should not have been discussing your chosson, his proposal, etc... DO NOT DISCUSS YOUR MARRIAGE WITH YOUR FRIENDS. Don't compare what your husbands do or don't do, help or don't help, eat or don't eat. Your relationship with your husband is private, personal, sacred, special. It's a growing process, which means there will be growing pains, but you are growing together - and stronger together.

Find a mentor or ask your kallah teacher for a referral, if you need to speak to someone.

• The Rebbe on shalom bayis: <u>Eternal Joy</u>

If you think something is wrong or you're not sure if you are being abused:

- Not everything is supposed to be swallowed "for the sake of shalom bayis". Not
 everything is your fault or your job as "eishes chayil" or "akeres habayis". IF YOU FEEL
 LIKE SOMETHING IS *OFF* IT PROBABLY IS.
- PLEASE reach out to your kallah teacher (or healthy parent, mentor or someone else who can HELP not your newly married friend). You can also anonymously call Shalom Task Force (718-337-3700 or 1-888-883-2323). DO NOT SUFFER IN SILENCE. YOU ARE WORTH IT (even if he says you're not). YOU DESERVE TO BE HAPPY. You don't get points for "sticking it out" and suffering in silence if you are miserable, and it doesn't make you a failure, loser or nebach if your marriage doesn't seem off to a magical start. GET HELP.
- Not sure if it's normal? <u>Checklist of warning signs</u>. Also read *I'm So Confused, Am I Being Abused*? by Lisa Twerski
 - Lisa has an interview inside **ShanaRishonaSummit.com**
- Go on birth control immediately ask a ray
- Do NOT read a book like "The Surrendered Wife" and try to implement it. That book is meant for normal, healthy men who are good guys. You cannot and should not implement its methods with someone who is in any way abusive, unstable or not fully healthy.

Tips on Cooking for Two

- There are incredible presentations on ShanaRishonaSummit.com to help you with this!
- Make a recipe whatsapp group with your friends!
- Buy chicken and chicken cutlets/breasts on sale. Clean/cut up, and freeze in portion sized quantities. (Chicken in individual sandwich bag. About 1 ½ chicken breasts is serving for two.) Defrost chicken overnight in fridge, or in cold water takes about an hour. Defrosting chicken cutlets in **cold** water (warm breeds bacteria) takes about 20 min.
- When you make soup, freeze extras in portion sized containers the <u>plastic deli</u> <u>containers</u> (get on Kingston) in 16oz is about 1 bowl, 32oz is 2 bowls. Or, for more freezer space, portion out into ziploc bags and freeze flat so you can stack up
- Pasta, large shells, fettucine or spaghetti make half box at a time. Small pasta like penne, elbow macaroni, small shells, etc measure 1 c dried pasta per person.
- Make extra and eat leftovers for lunch the next day
- When vegetables start going soft cook them. Roast, put in soup or freeze for later
- View Marketplace and Empire Kosher specials at <u>watsonsale.com</u> new specials every Tuesday
- It will save time and money (not to mention "what should I make for supper tonight??") if you make a menu at the beginning of the week. Even having a weekly plan is helpful ex Mon is always dairy, Tues is always chicken, Wed is pareve, Thurs meat, Sun leftovers.
- If you make a menu you can take it a step further and shop the weekly specials and cook with what's on sale (eggplant is on sale make eggplant parmesan for dairy night), or in general be able to use up all of something. Ex package of corn with more than 2 pieces make corn on cob one night, use the rest in a soup at the end of the week.

• Honey Mustard Chicken Stir Fry

Cut chicken cutlets into 2-inch strips. Season with salt and pepper. Heat 1-2 T oil in large frying pan and fry 1 large onion, diced, for 10-15 minutes or until golden brown. Add chicken strips and cook for 5 minutes. Add vegetables, if using - works well with pepper strips, zucchini or anything you want to add. Add 1.5 T each honey, soy sauce, and mustard. Cook for 10-15 minutes (stirring occasionally) or until sauce reduces. Serve over orzo or rice.

• Two-Second Teriyaki Salmon

- Wash salmon. Place in baking dish or on silver foil. Spread with <u>Mikee Teriyaki</u>
 <u>Sauce</u> and bake, covered, at 350 for about 20 minutes or until done.
- Mustard and Dill Salmon (lazy version of Salmon Primavera from Kosher by Design)
 - Coat salmon with either honey mustard or equal mixture honey + mustard.
 Sprinkle with toasted breadcrumbs and fresh dill. Bake at 350 for 20 minutes covered.

• Stuffed Shells (Dairy)

You can find any recipe on Google but this is what I do: Preheat toaster oven to bake 400 (for some reason I think it's less strong than oven). Cook half box of shells, al dente. Make mixture of 1 egg, 1 c ricotta or cottage cheese (if cottage, whip well to make creamy), 1 c mozzarella cheese, salt and pepper, mix well. In 8 inch round foil pan, use half jar marinara sauce or 1 can tomato sauce (mix LOTS of spices into tomato sauce), line shells up and fill with stuffing. Bake covered for 40min-1 hr until done. Can also follow the recipe on the box. You can also fill the shells with stuffing while raw, add a little more sauce and water (it should cover the shells), and bake for an extra half hour

• Easy Crunchy Chicken

 Spread mayonnaise all over chicken. Cover with flavored bread crumbs. Bake at 400 for 1 hour covered and additional 20 minutes uncovered.

One-Pan Chicken and Potatoes

In 8 inch round foil pan, smear chicken with honey, garlic and salt. Surround with
 2-3 diced potatoes (or halved little gold or red potatoes) dressed with a bit of olive
 oil, salt, garlic and paprika. Bake at 425 uncovered for an hour.

Pan Seared Shnitzel (tastes fried but without all the work)

In a large frying pan, saute onions. Coat chicken cutlets with flour and then sprinkle spices (salt, black pepper, garlic pepper, or use Montreal steak spice). You can also first mix the spices into the flour. Heat oil on high, fry shnitzel on one side for 30 seconds, flip over and fry another 30 seconds. Cover tightly, remove from flame, and keep closed for twenty minutes. Do not lift lid even to peek!

Red and Yellow Salmon

In a large saucepan, saute 1-2 diced onions and 2-3 cloves garlic. Dice about 6 plum tomatoes (the softer the better - great way to use up mushy tomatoes) or 2-3 large regular tomatoes. Add a bit of water (so it doesn't burn) and simmer on low until tomatoes become soft and use fork or masher to mash down even further. (Or skip this step and use 1 can crushed tomatoes.) Flavor with turmeric and cumin. Put salmon in pan so it is covered by sauce and cook about 20 minutes on medium heat, covered. Serve over rice or rice pilaf.

Popcorn Cauliflower

- 2 heads cauliflower, cut head into medium sized florets and discard stems
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tsp sugar
- 1/4 tsp onion powder
- 1/4 tsp garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp paprika
- 1/4 1/2 tsp turmeric
- o 6 8 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1. Preheat oven to 450
- 2. Line a jelly roll pan or baking sheet with parchment paper
- 3. in a large bowl, combine the salt, sugar, spices and oil. Add cauliflower florets and toss to evenly coat.
- 4. Place in a single layer on the prepared sheet
- 5. Roast uncovered for 30-35 minutes until the largest piece can be pierced with a fork. If the tops are starting to get too brown, toss the cauliflower during the baking process.

SALADS

- Canned Salad (for when you're out of everything)
 - Chickpeas, corn, hearts of palm, pickles, red pepper, purple onion. Dress with olive oil, a drop of vinegar and lemon juice, any spices (salt, pepper, parsley, garlic, onion). You can put this salad away dressed and it doesn't get soggy, it's marinated so it's almost better.
