- Existing workload demands are not sustainable for the current WFAP leadership members.

- Presented current numbers
- Outstanding numbers:
 - Grant expenses, Book Fair income, Teacher Appreciation expenses

- Hoping to end the year within \$2,000 of our goal
- Unfortunately, we are still not getting contributions to the Annual Fund (about ½ the amount pre-Covid)
 - Only 180 total donors (average \$65 per donor)
- Are reducing the expected amount we can cover next year to \$14,000 vs. \$16,000
- This means that we will need to make cuts to the student activities/trips/programs/learning opportunities we can support next year which is not ideal.
- We were able to fully fund field trips for all students this year.
- Expenses for transportation, activities, shows, experiences are going up. These trips cost more.
- We used some of our reserves to cover expenses for this year.
- We will still provide money equitably across the classes moving forward.
- It is hard to plan for future expenses without knowing all the factors.
- We had a number of successful fundraisers this year (BBR, Craft Fair, Lucky U, Book Fairs, etc.)
- There may be opportunities for other fundraisers
- Were not able to do more this year because of budget revote work

Opportunities to Promote WFAP

- Need school staff/teachers/administrators to talk up/communicate what the WFAP does and the difference/impact it makes
 - It is more than fundraising
- Ask teachers to connect directly with their families and possibly recommend people who may be able to help lead events (tap into people's areas of passion).
- Missed opportunity to connect with incoming K families because WFAP did not get notice of Meet and Greets in time
- Chris Ford talked up the WFAP at the 3rd grade transition night
- DAML hosting events in August for incoming families and WFAP has been invited to present there
- Chris mentioned that Houses used to hold socials with House Reps in the past
 - Small community events are important
- He also said House Reps used to have 'Welcome Meetings' with teachers/teams at the beginning of the school year to see how they could work together. The feeling of houses being "families" has been lost a little with the change in house structure along with external/societal changes over the last few years.
- Get information into each team/teacher summer communication

ABS PreK-2: Becca Ashford

Pre-K (Danielle) is continuing with pyramid model coaching and working on problem solving strategies in their classroom during explore time. They are also ending the school year learning about rainbows!

Starlings (K)- No report sent

Explorers (K) students had a fabulous time at the Audubon center learning about Critter construction! Thanks to WFAP for funding their adventure! Students have also been learning about seasonal changes and they've had a blast observing frog eggs and tadpoles in the outdoor classroom area.

Harmony (1-2) wrapped up their final WIN rotation the week before break. Students are publishing their animal research reports and preparing other work they feel proud of throughout the school year for a celebration of learning in early June. First and second grade mathematicians have been studying geometry. First graders will start a fun, hands-on measurement unit soon. All classes have been talking about trust and honesty in their weekly restorative circles with Ms. Nicole.

Horizon (1-2) is preparing for their reading picnic. It is on Thursday, May 9th. Families join on the back hill and the students share their writing for the year! They had an amazing time at Shelburne farms last month! They will end the year with a science unit on erosion!

Synergy (1-2) had wonderful experiences with the Planetarium Lady and their trip to the Echo Center. Thank you WFAP for supporting these 2 events. Classrooms are completing a variety of end of the year activities.

All - Throughout the month of May teachers are meeting with students one on one to assess their progress in literacy and math using benchmark assessments. All teams are going to WCS to see the Sterling play next week. Second grade classrooms just received their portraits lists for the annual staff portrait project. Swift

Swift students completed their argument writing unit by writing summative pieces on a topic of choice, from dress codes in schools to self-driving cars. Science and social studies classes are wrapping up with summative tasks and projects related to current events, the Stock Market Game, human body systems, and natural selection.

About 60 of our students are actively researching choice topics related to their upcoming trip to Boston, and our Home Team students will begin their own research on choice topics next week. This independent project will culminate with our 8th grade challenge community presentations and an open house for families on June 11th.

We are all very excited for our bi-annual Swiftville simulation and economics unit, in which every student will be actively involved in either running a business, working for a business, acting as a member of Town Council, or working for the Swiftville Federated Bank. We will be inviting our 3rd and 4th grade friends to visit our town when businesses are open on May 23rd and 24th, as well as all WCS faculty and staff.

It's a busy time with a lot going on, but it certainly makes the end of the school year fly by!

Clover

Clover house has been super lucky to enjoy a bird banding learning opportunity arranged by our fabulous Mady Corkum, and facilitated by Vermont Audubon. Humanities has been learning about Westward Expansion, primarily focused on the Lewis and Clark Corps of discovery expedition. Science just finished up a study of the human body and cells, and is moving on to earth's spheres. We have been enjoying taking nature walks as the weather has improved.

Summit

Summit House is looking forward to visiting WCAX tomorrow (Friday) on a field trip to see how evidence is collected and used in the "real world". We also just wrapped up the Stock Market Game where students spent the year investing 'fake money' in a stock market simulation game!

Sterling


Harbor
