### **Biographies**

Bishop Heinrich Bedford-Strohm	Heinrich Bedford-Strohm is currently Presiding Bishop of the Lutheran Church in Bavaria and has been Presiding Bishop of the Protestant Churches in Germany from 2014-2021. Since September 2022 he has been moderator of the World Council of Churches. He is Extraordinary Professor at the Theological Faculty of the university of Stellenbosch/South Africa and Honorary Professor at the University of Bamberg/Germany where he held the chair of Systematic Theology 2004-2011 and was founding director of the Dietrich Bonhoeffer Research Center for Public Theology. His research interests are in social ethics, digital ethics, ecclesiology and ecumenical theology.
Prof. Dr. Patricia Mbote	Director of the Law Division of UNEP Patricia Kameri-Mbote is the Director of the Law Division, UNEP. She leads the Division charged with carrying out the functions of UNEP in the field of environmental law, governance, and related policy issues. Patricia has in-depth knowledge of environmental law acquired in research, environmental law and policy making and implementation at local, national, regional and international levels. Patricia was Founding Research Director of the International Environmental Law Research Centre (IELRC) and was Programme Director for Africa for over 20 years. She is a member of the Senior Counsel Bar in Kenya and has been a Professor of Law at the School of Law, University of Nairobi, where she has taught for over 30 years and served as Dean. She has also taught environmental law at Kansas University, University of Zimbabwe and Stellenbosch University. She served as chair of the Association of Environmental Law Lecturers in African Universities, an initiative started in collaboration with UNEP to build environmental law capacity through training and research; and has contributed to the development of similar initiatives for North Africa and Middle East and for judges. Patricia holds Doctorate (1999) and Master's (1996) degrees in law from Stanford University and a higher doctorate from the University of Nairobi (2019). These have focused on environmental law and its interactions with other areas of law such as property law and women's law. She also holds a Master's degree from Warwick University (1989)

	and was awarded an honorary degree in law by the University of Oslo (UiO) in 2017 for her work cutting across established fields of Women's Law, Natural Resources Law, Human Rights and Law and Development.
Jessica Bwali (Co-Moderator)	Jessica Bwali is an award winning passionate Christian climate activist, journalist and Tearfund's Global Campaigns Associate from Zambia. Jessica has worked as a newscaster, radio presenter and radio producer. Jessica's climate campaigning work has taken her to COP26 and COP27 climate conferences. She was certified as a Climate Activist by The University of Oxford Climate Society and she has been raising her voice against climate crimes by documenting the effects of climate change on people in the front line and she has witnessed first hand devastating impacts of climate change on people in Zambia and around Africa.
Paloma Escudero	Paloma Escudero is currently UNICEF Global Special Adviser to Advocate for Children and Climate Action. Prior to her appointment, Ms. Escudero had already been well known among the UNICEF family as Director of Communications and Advocacy of UNICEF and as Executive Director of the Spanish National Committee.
Kjell Kühne	Kjell Kühne is the director of the Leave it in the Ground Initiative (LINGO) and has been working with NGOs, communities, governments, companies and academia on the five continents towards a sustainable, post-fossil world over the past two decades. He is German, based in Mexico and also feels at home in Indonesia, China, Brazil, among others.
Vanessa Fajans-Turner	Vanessa is dedicated to driving meaningful climate action across the financial sector. As the executive director of BankFWD, she's focused on accelerating the banking sector's alignment with the Paris Agreement. As a principal with Investable Oceans, she works to drive investment into sustainable ocean start-ups across the blue economy. A native of Ithaca NY, she also advises the city's nation-leading sustainability plan to electrify all buildings by 2030 and is never without her ice hockey skates. Previously, Vanessa held sustainability roles at the United Nations and with James Cameron's climate-focused Avatar Alliance Foundation. She's a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and producer of the Emmy Award-winning documentary series Years of Living Dangerously. She has an MA from Johns Hopkins-SAIS and a BA from Harvard.
His Excellency Judge Mohamed Abdelsalam	His Excellency Judge Mohamed Abdelsalam is Secretary-General of the Muslim Council of Elders, Secretary-General of the Zayed Award for Human Fraternity, a Member of Al-Azhar Center for Interreligious Dialogue, graduate of Al-Azhar Al-Sharif University, co-president of Religions for Peace organization and Secretary-General of the Higher Committee of Human Fraternity for a period of 4 years. He served as an advisor to His Eminence the Grand Imam of Al-Azhar Professor Ahmed Al-Tayeb for over eight years. He participated in drafting the Document on Human Fraternity, signed by His Holiness Pope Francis and His Eminence Grand Imam of Al-Azhar Professor Ahmed Al-Tayeb, in Abu Dhabi on February 4, 2019. Awarded papal knighthood - "Knight Commander with Star of the Order of Pius IX" - by His Holiness Pope Francis for his services towards spreading tolerance and interfaith dialogue. He is the first Arab and Muslim to be awarded this accolade from the head of the Catholic Church. Kassym-Jomart Tokayev presented him with the "Astana Medal" in recognition of his efforts in advancing human fraternity and dialogue. In November 2022, the University of Humanities and Law in Kazakhstan (KAZGUU) awarded him an honorary professorship in recognition of his efforts to promote the values of coexistence, dialogue, and human fraternity. Presented the 'Community Service Medal' by the Ministry of Interior of the United Arab Emirates for his commitment and positive impact towards strengthening security in communities. Part of the constitutional assembly charged with developing and amending the new Constitution of the Arab Republic of Egypt in 2012 and 2013. Awarded the Medal of the Constitutional Court by the Supreme Constitutional Court of Egypt in recognition of his distinguished representation of the Egyptian judiciary during his time at Al-Azhar and the Constitutional Assembly.

Dahlia Rockowitz	Washington Director at Dayenu. Dahlia Rockowitz believes in the power of everyday people to demand and win inclusive, equitable, and ambitious climate solutions. She previously worked in both the climate and Jewish social justice movements, planning activist trainings for thousands of committed volunteers around the world at The Climate Reality Project and advocating to the US government in support of human rights and climate justice worldwide at American Jewish World Service. Dahlia studied environmental justice and policy at the University of Michigan, where she also co-designed a massive open online course on how to address and respond to climate change.
Père Matthieu Jasseron	Former wealth manager who became a Priest. Founder of Theostream, the “Netflix of faith”. Sometimes nicknamed "TikTok father", Matthieu Jasseron account @peremathieu has gathered 1.2 million subscribers, 20,000 on Instagram and 50,000 on YouTube, in just over two years of activity on social networks. Theostream makes available videos from Christian YouTubers of all denominations, Catholics, Protestants and Orthodox. The Conference of Bishops in France supports the initiative.
Nikki Reisch	Nikki Reisch is the Director of the Climate & Energy Program at the Center for International Environmental Law (CIEL), where she works at the intersection of human rights and the environment, overseeing legal and policy advocacy on climate change, its causes, consequences, and responses to it. CIEL leverages research and analysis to hold corporations, financiers, and governments accountable for their contributions to the climate crisis, debunk false climate solutions, increase recognition of climate-related financial risk, and accelerate a just and equitable transition away from fossil fuels. Nikki has over 20 years’ experience in environmental justice, corporate accountability, and human rights work. Before joining CIEL, she was the Legal Director at NYU’s Center for Human Rights and Global Justice and a law clerk in the U.S. Courts of Appeals for the Ninth and Second Circuits.
Helena Funk	Helena Funk is a specialist on transformative learning, working for the <a href="#">Oikocredit</a> Support Association in Eastern Germany (Ostdeutscher Förderkreis). Oikocredit is an international ecumenical cooperative for social impact investment. Meanwhile, local Support Association offer activities on Global Learning for Transformation to raise awareness for sustainability and global justice – with a special focus on finances. Helena Funk joined the local Support Association of Oikocredit in 2021 and is based in Leipzig, Germany.
Ellyanne Wanjiku Chlystun	Ellyanne Chlystun-Githae Wanjiku is 13 years old, Africa's Youngest Climate Finance & Biodiversity Champion. She started planting trees aged 4 and has planted over 1.3 million trees. An Eco-Warrior Award Winner, in 2018 she was nominated Kenya’s Youngest Mashujaa (Hero) an honor by the Government of Kenya & is Kenya’s Youngest Climate Change Ambassador. Ellyanne talks about her relentless yet focused passion to make the world a green healthy sustainable place. On various platforms she has shared what drives her and she advises children and governments on mitigation of climate change and desertification. She has pivoted her focus to Climate Finance, influencing policy and law makers for a real paradigm shift & sustainable impact for children. Ellyanne wrote a book about faith from a teenager’s perspective, which will be published shortly.
