Sneakers\* (link to a fan created modernized film trailer, I'd only watch a few seconds of the trailer or jump around the trailer for a few seconds if I was going to watch this film) is an old school spy caper film from 1992 with a veneer of (then) modern technology and surveillance gadgetry thrown into the mix. It features a tremendous all-star cast including Robert Redford, Sidney Poitier, Ben Kingsley, Dan Akroyd, River Phoenix, Mary Mcdonnel, David Straithairn, Donal Logue, a young Stephen Toblowsky, and a cameo from James Earl Jones. This film was probably fairly entertaining when it was released in 1992 and in some ways has grown a little finer with age (the way a few films do). In that way, a film is somewhat comparable to alcohol. Although a lot of alcohol grows stale with age, some alcoholic beverages grow finer. Sneakers is

a prescient film in the sense that it points to the burgeoning Internet and the ever growing surveillance state years before America On-Line and the world wide web became global cultural phenomenons.

The film was written and produced by the same duo who wrote the classic 1983 film *WarGames*. *Sneakers* does not nearly reach the iconic status of that classic of film Americana, but it is an also entertaining and just slightly more mature offering that in many ways is within the same vein.

The film stars Robert Redford as Martin Brice, a man who has been on the run from the law since the Vietnam era when as a graduate student he was hacking the bank accounts of the Republican party along with his young friend and accomplice Cosmo. They were students who were hacking to redirect Republican Party funds to more noble causes in the hope of changing the world for the better. His friend Cosmo got caught while Brice narrowly escaped capture and Brice has been on the run ever since under the guise of an alias, Martin Bishop.

In 1992 Bishop and his misfit crew of hackers, tech, and espionage experts run a business where they test the security systems of industrial enterprises to let them know in what areas their security systems could be improved. However, this racket isn't too lucrative for Bishop and when a \$175,000 dollar offer from the National Security Agency (NSA) comes along to retrieve an electronic box from a burgeoning star mathematician, Bishop and his crew jump at the chance for this large payday. Complicating matters, they decide this even though working for the government risks once again entangling Bishop in his sordid past that he has been running away from for decades. And mix in an old love interest and this film has all the makings of an evening's worth of interesting entertainment.

What makes this film work when viewed in today's present is how quaint it is while still retaining a sense of nimbleness. *Sneakers* points to the future in a prescient way but in a way it can't quite accurately capture due to the limitations of 1992. And it speaks to issues that are very important to us today, such as cryptography and one of it's baseis, the inability of computers to quickly and efficiently find factors for very large numbers (thus allowing modern encryption systems to exist). The burgeoning field of Quantum Computing may hold the key to breaking even this layer of cryptographic protection, which (if proved out) would make *Sneakers* an even more ahead of it's time film.

The film is ably directed by Phil Alden Robinson (Field Of Dreams), who keeps the pace moving along well enough and skillfully imbues Bishop's crew with a cool and enjoyable sense of camaraderie. And he (and the writers) keep the viewer guessing. And to mix metaphors, like an

old clunker of a car. Give this film a few hard taps with a wrench or your clenched fist like you were thwacking a carburetor, and this ole' film will show you that it still has a few thrills left in it yet that still hold up and probably would still surprise any casual viewer. Like the old folks in this cast, *Sneakers* is a fairly mature, fairly entertaining film that stands as a marker in 1992 along with other films from different eras (such as 1998's *Enemy Of The State* and 2008's *WarGames: The Dead Code*) of how quickly and all-encompassingly the government and private sector surveillance dragnets have spread and encroached on all of our lives.
