.Political Systems

For this project you will be working with one or two partners to aid in completing some unique project that cohesively brings together the functioning of our three branches of government. There are several portions to this project as you will need to discover the inner-workings of and the relationships between the Judicial, Executive, and Legislative branches. So, your research is twofold: understand how 1) each branch functions on its own and 2) how each branch checks, balances, and works with the other branches. Keep a log of websites you use so that you can cite them as you use them. This project has an immense amount of freedom as you'll be developing your own essential question based around the functionality of and between the three branches of the US government.

Essential Task: Evaluate the extent to which one branch of government impacts the other two branches of government.

Your Essential Question formation: Focus on one, specific action/decision/event/individual from one of the branches of government and figure out how that action/decision/event/individual impacts the other two branches of government.

What makes a question essential? It is a question that...

- makes you think deeply and creates lively discussion-- typically not a who, what, or when question
- can be argued or debated -- there is no correct answer, but it requires considerable research in order to draw a conclusion
- forces you to: provide evidence and supporting evidence, consider alternatives, and justify thoughts
- may be frustrating to find answers to because the answer isn't easy to find-- it should make your brain hurt!!!
- is clear, focused, concise, complex, and arguable
- you can't GOOGLE and find the answer in one or two clicks!

Notes about forming an essential question:

- It's OK that it might take you a bit of time to formulate one.
- Start a list of potential ideas and think about how those ideas might interact with politics (specifically, the branches of government)
- If you're having a hard time thinking of topics for your project, head to major news outlets and see what's happening in America (and the World) to get some ideas.
- Don't be afraid to modify your essential question as you complete more research. There's a good chance that you'll end up having more questions as you complete more research.
- Lastly, you SHOULDN'T have an answer when you form a question... it's OK to have some thoughts on the topic... but you should aim to seek out an answer.

Sample Essential Questions:

- How has the approval of Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh impacted the three branches of US government at the state and federal level(s)?
- How has the death of Ruth Bader Ginsburg impacted abortion laws that are passed by state governments?
- How has Joe Biden's presidency impacted the three branches of government since his election?
- How have laws, mandates, and regulations for COVID-19 impacted the three branches of government?
