



A2C (Accelerate to College) English 2020-21

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This 5th period class meets LIVE every Wednesday & Friday 9:00--9:30. (Office hours Monday 11:00--11:30)

Jefferson Community and Technical College must remain flexible to meet challenges that may include epidemics, pandemics, natural disasters, human-influenced disasters, and any and all threats to the College campus, students, employees, and surrounding communities. COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is designed for students needing to demonstrate college readiness in English Language Arts. Its purpose is to enhance each students' reading, writing and language skills, preparing them for college-level English courses. Students who successfully complete this course will be given credit for ENG 096 Introduction to College Writing at Jefferson Community and Technical College and will be eligible for dual-credit English courses. Alternatively, students who successfully complete this course will be considered college-ready in English upon enrollment at Jefferson Community and Technical College after graduation from high school. Students must complete the online Jefferson Community and Technical College application. Students must also complete and sign the Accelerate to College application, and that application must be on file in the Dual Credit Office for credit to be awarded. Each student will receive a student ID number and student email account, and will be eligible to use any of Jefferson's student services. By putting college within reach for enrolled students, this course supports JCTC's mission to transform "lives and communities through educational excellence in an inclusive environment that opens doors for all students."

COURSE FORMAT:

 This course has been redesigned so that you, the student, have an active role in learning English Language Arts.





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- Throughout the course, interpersonal and success skills will be developed through cooperative learning activities that will aid in your success in college-level coursework and contribute to your JCPS Backpack.
- During class time, you will be reading and writing. Your instructor will work with you to be sure that you understand what you are doing, answer your questions, assist you in your learning, and help you monitor your progress in the class.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Read, comprehend and analyze complex literary and informational texts independently and proficiently.
- 2. Use the writing process to create organized and well-developed paragraphs and multi-paragraph writing.
- 3. Follow the conventions of standard written English, including grammar, usage and mechanics.
- 4. Respond in writing to reading.
- 5. Use technology as a tool to produce, edit, and distribute writing.
- 6. Demonstrate a basic knowledge of research skills and documentation.

CRITICAL THINKING SKILLS

This course requires you to think critically. You will practice the skills of Analysis (abstract separation of a whole into its constituent parts in order to study the parts and their relationships to each other), Discrimination (the ability or power to make distinctions among items that are similar, often related to other skills of Evaluation, Applying Standards, and Judgment), Predicting (the ability to foretell based on calculation, knowledge, or inference from facts or experience), Explanation (the ability to make something comprehensible by describing the relevant operation, structure, or circumstances, related to Clarification), Interpretation (the ability to identify the significance of information in relation to a body of knowledge), and Logical Reasoning (the process of forming conclusions based on facts or evidence, often related to Objectivity). Critical thinking skills will be useful both in school and in life.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND MATERIALS

You will be required to read any materials assigned by your teacher, posted to the Google Classroom and/or your teacher's website. We will have several class texts that we will focus on over the course of the





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year. Your teacher will make sure you know what text(s) are needed at the appropriate time.

USE OF BLACKBOARD AND OTHER TECHNOLOGIES

Most assignments and resources will be accessed through Google Classroom and your teacher's website. You will use JCTC's Blackboard for the SafeAssign system for detecting plagiarism.

ATTENDANCE POLICY: Class attendance and punctuality are essential to the learning process. That includes coming to class prepared with the proper materials. Class attendance and participation are critical to your understanding, mastery, and success in this course. Attendance will be recorded daily. All tests must be taken in the classroom. Students are responsible for recovering the missed assignments while absent and will have the number of excused days plus one to complete. Progression (homework, reflections, writing process work, in class work, quizzes, CFAs, etc.) Mastery (final major writing assignments, tests, projects, etc.)

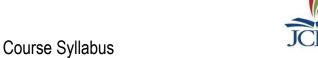
