### **Step 4: Use a Simple Lesson Routine**

#### **1. Introduce Vocabulary**

Point to pictures and say the words aloud.

#### **2. Practice Speaking**

Ask simple questions:

- "What is this?"
- "What do you see?"
- "Where is the woman going?"

#### **3. Practice Reading or Writing**

- Label pictures
- Match words to images
- Write short sentences

#### **4. Review and Repeat**

Recycle vocabulary often using games, flashcards, or conversation.

#### **Step 5: Adapt Activities to the Learner's Level**

##### **Beginning Learners**

Focus on:

- Naming objects
- Basic verbs
- Yes/No questions

##### **Intermediate Learners**

Focus on:

- Describing pictures
- Storytelling
- Verb tenses
- Opinions and discussion

## **Additional Teaching Strategies:**

### **Using Pictures to Develop Vocabulary by Level**

#### **Beginning Literacy / Low Beginning Level**

Goals: Build foundational vocabulary with concrete nouns, basic actions, and everyday concepts.

Picture-Based Vocabulary Activities:

- Labeling objects in a picture (e.g., items in a kitchen or bathroom).
- Matching words to images (e.g., food, clothing, parts of the body).
- Picture dictionaries: Student-made or printed.
- Picture Bingo or Flashcards to reinforce word recognition.
- Yes/No or This/That questions using images ("Is this a banana?" "This is a bus.")

Vocabulary Focus:

- Everyday nouns (food, clothes, rooms, furniture)
- Basic verbs (eat, sit, walk, sleep)
- Colors, numbers, days of the week
- Family and common people (mother, teacher, doctor)

#### **High Beginning / Low Intermediate Level**

Goals: Expand vocabulary to include more actions, places, and basic descriptive words.

Picture-Based Vocabulary Activities:

- Describe a picture using short sentences ("The boy is running.")
- Sort images into categories (e.g., fruits vs. vegetables, indoor vs. outdoor activities)
- Sequencing picture stories to describe routines or events.
- Find the difference between two images using descriptive vocabulary.
- Picture-based sentence building ("The woman is wearing a red dress.")

Vocabulary Focus:

- Everyday verbs in present tense
- Simple adjectives (big/small, happy/sad, colors, weather)
- Community places (bank, post office, park)
- Daily routines (wake up, go to work, cook)

#### **Intermediate Level**

Goals: Develop ability to describe, compare, and narrate using visuals.

Picture-Based Vocabulary Activities:

- Describe and compare two scenes ("This city is crowded. That one is quiet.")
- Use picture prompts for short paragraphs or oral stories.
- "What's happening?" photos to practice present continuous and past tense.

- Picture storytelling: Students write or say what happened before and after the picture.
- Vocabulary webs based on an image (e.g., picture of a grocery store → foods, jobs, money)

Vocabulary Focus:

- Verbs in multiple tenses
- Descriptive and comparative adjectives
- Expanded topic-based vocabulary (jobs, transportation, health, school)
- Prepositions of place and time

High Intermediate / Advanced Level

Goals: Develop abstract vocabulary, infer meaning, and use pictures for discussion and analysis.

Picture-Based Vocabulary Activities:

- Photo prompts for opinion or debate (e.g., image of pollution → “What should we do?”)
- Infer meaning from subtle visual clues (emotion, setting, culture).
- Use editorial cartoons or infographics to learn topic-specific vocabulary.
- Image-based presentations: Students select an image and give a short talk or story.
- Image analysis: Students interpret themes, emotions, or messages.

Vocabulary Focus:

- Abstract nouns and concepts (freedom, responsibility, diversity)
- Figurative language and idioms from visual context
- Academic or workplace-related terms
- Vocabulary for discussion and expressing opinion

These provide a constant supply of topical pictures in a wide range of styles, color, black and white, photographs, and stylized images. If using ready-made picture stories in the form of cartoon strips and comics, delete any text that appears.
