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Course Description

Macroeconomics is the study of the world economy and the economic systems of whole nations, states or regions. We will learn how to use economic aggregates such as GDP, Unemployment and the Consumer Price Index to analyze the performance, growth and dynamics of economic systems. We will study how fiscal and monetary policies are used to help improve economic performance, maximize employment, and stabilize prices. We will study how policies affect international trade and exchange rates. Throughout the course there will be an effort to tie our work to current and past events to gain a better understanding of macroeconomic theories.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- Understand the basic concepts of macroeconomics
- Discuss macroeconomic indicators and evaluate an economy's performance
- Understand the Keynesian System, the AS-AD Model and fiscal policy
- Understand the system of money, banking and monetary policy
- Understand the role of the Federal Reserve Bank
- Identify the limitations of macroeconomic analysis, tools and policies
- Understand the global factors influencing national economies and International trade
- Interpret the news media's coverage of macroeconomic events
