MINUTES FOR POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MARCH 16, 2025

- 1. Meeting began at 11:45 with some silence. - 2. The minutes from the February business meeting were read.
- 3. State of Society Report was read. The report was approved to be submitted to NYYM. (Report attached.)
- 4. State of Society Report from the Kendal at Ithaca worship group was read:

Query: how does your worship group listen to and respond to spirit in your community?

Our worship group will be entering its fourth year in the Fall. We meet every week. There are between six and 12 people who come to each meeting. Our format begins with half an hour of centering music. There are some residents who come only for the

music and leave before the next hour of worship.

After the music, we enter in to a few moments of silence. We sit in a circle and proceed in round robin fashion to update one another how our spiritual condition has been

during the past week. There it's no discussion at this time. This portion of our meeting is confidential.

We then have a reading from Quaker literature, after which we enter into 20 minutes of unprogrammed worship.

Many readings come from Linda Hill Renner's book Daily Readings from Quaker Writings, Ancient and Modern. We are also reading Rufus Jones's Faith and Practice.

We usually spend a few minutes talking about the authors and Quaker practice.

After the unprogrammed worship, we enter into discussion about the reading, any thoughts which have come up, or what we shared during the round robin.

Members have commented that they like the format, the readings, and especially the 20 minutes of unprogrammed worship.

A spirit of unity and trust has grown within our group.

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Ministry and Council report for March 2025

The 2025 State of Society query has been completed and will be read at Monthly Meeting before sending to New York Yearly Meeting.

Ruth Ann Bradley has agreed to bring regular messages to our meeting. The frequency is to be determined.

The Quaker Basics series begins this month on March 23, continues on March 30, and ends on April 6. They will be at 9am before the Meeting. The topics will be in the PRISM and announced at Worship. If needed, the children will be given activities, but, there won't be a designated childcare person. Soup and Sharing on April 27 will be held after Rise of Service. We will focus on the book the Parable of the Sower by Octavia Butler. This discussion will be led by River Vooris. The subject matter of the book may be disturbing to some children. We will determine how many children might be present and provide care as needed.

PARABLE OF THE SOWER

"God is Change" writes Lauren Olamina, the 15 year old protagonist of Parable of the Sower by Octavia Butler. Lauren is creating Earthseed, a new religion that reflects her understanding of the dystopian world around her, and the values that she believes are necessary for survival. Published in 1993, Butler has been described as prescient for her description of the US society in the 2020s. It is in a state of societal, political and environmental collapse, with wide-spread violence. Readers should be forewarned that the book contains descriptions of death, sexual assault, drug-use, and destruction by fire, and the text can be difficult to read at times. (It is not appropriate for young audiences; parental guidance recommended for teen readers). However, it also provides a road-map for survival in difficult times, and emphasizes the need for faith, hope, community, trust and kindness. Given that we have had two Teachings this year that have quoted the book (mine and Katie Fong's), I am excited about the opportunity to talk about this book with Friends on April 27th, during a Soup and Sharing after the Meeting.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR MARCH 16, 2025


Summary

Contributions and spending are still largely near target for this time of year.

Contributions


\$7,398 in contributions in the first quarter of 2024 (17% of budget) and \$3,385 up to this point in 2023 (8% of that budget).

At 21% of our way through 2025, the following chart shows our contributions (green) and spending (yellow) relative to the total proposed budget (brown), with the blue horizontal line showing the spending/contribution target for this point in the year (\$10,276).



Spending

We have spent 26% of our proposed 2025 budget so far (\$12,962). This includes our first quarterly contribution to NYYM (\$2,435) as per our 2025 budget. The other main spending categories are our building, ministry and music. The total spent compares to the first quarter spending of \$11,380 in 2024 (25% of budget) and \$9,677 in 2023 (24% of budget).

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STATE OF SOCIETY REPORT POPLAR RIDGE FRIENDS MEETING FEBRUARY 2025

The query: "How does your meeting listen to and respond to spirit in your community?"

Our role in helping to organize workshops and outreach in conjunction with the Cornell Farm Workers program to help immigrants in our community in facing current challenges.

Our openness to diversity of spiritual values.

Our partnering with AME Zion Church and other churches to assist the homeless. The increased frequency of our work with other local churches in other areas of common interest. It was further mentioned that "...people worshiping, working, and playing together enhances feelings of community, trust, and respect."

Our adoption of Zoom technology has expanded accessibility to our meeting and its various activities. One person said: "This has made a huge difference in my life!" Another said: "I believe this is a significant accomplishment."

Spiritual Nurture groups continue, with a new group "Spiritual Nurture for All," initiated to enhance inclusiveness (though this new group has not yet formed). Other worship groups under our care include the Kendal at Ithaca worship group and a mid-week worship group. One person commented: "It is meaningful to have a group to share with in confidence and trust in a safe space."

The Pastoral Care Committee is an effort to reach out to people and their physical and spiritual needs.

We are intentional about our community, always attempting to reach out to our own community and the broader community beyond.

Our Sunday morning Quaker Basics discussions were especially mentioned. These programs respond to the spirit and promote understanding of Quaker principles and practices, and have seen high attendance. Sessions offered on membership have also been helpful in this regard.

Monthly gatherings to eat together at local restaurants is a new idea/practice to promote social interaction.

We have welcomed activities in the community such as tai chi classes to be held in the meeting house.

The San Pedro Sister Community project has grown to include many people beyond our Meeting.

A wide assortment of activities beyond meeting for worship promote a sense of community and trust.

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Celebrations such as the Christmas pageant, the Shepherds Play, the Halloween carnival, and memorial services are important to us and reach the community beyond our Meeting. One person expressed how moved they were over the past year during these events, whether actively participating or as an audience member.

Matter and energy; spirituality and action: In action, we can find spirit moving through it.

One of our members is active in leading workshops in the wider world on spiritual growth. We support his efforts, and he has been recently recognized as a recorded minister.

We maintain connection with NYYM and FSRM.

We have connection with and have given financial support to the Global Roots Pre-School for children of refugees in Ithaca.

Youth Committee continues to experiment with new ways to include our young people interactively in our worship. Although our meeting has been drawing more attention from adults of all ages, our community of young people needs continued outreach to stay connected with the meeting in this busy world.

The format of our meetings for worship varies from week to week, allowing for inclusion of different voices and personal leadings. One person said, "Our inclusive style is welcoming, invitational, and values all."

Music is a significant force in helping us center in spirit. We are rich in members with musical gifts.
