



☐ Topic 1 & 2: Exploring the Americas



COURSE SUMMARY:

This American History course provides an in-depth exploration of the key events, ideas, and people that shaped the United States from its early beginnings through major turning points in the 19th century. Students will begin by examining the development of the American colonies and the cultural, political, and economic foundations they laid. The course then covers the causes and consequences of the American Revolution, as well as the creation of foundational documents such as the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution.

As the nation expanded westward, students will study the concept of Manifest Destiny and its impact on Native populations, territorial growth, and national identity. The course also delves into the Civil War, exploring the root causes of the conflict, key battles, major figures, and the lasting effects on the nation. The Reconstruction era is examined for its efforts to reunify the country and address the rights of formerly enslaved people.

In addition to these major topics, students will explore broader themes such as the development of democracy, the struggle for civil rights, and the ongoing evolution of American ideals. This course provides a comprehensive understanding of how the United States was shaped by conflict, compromise, and the pursuit of a more perfect union.
