


World Punk Atlas: A Map of DIY Punk Spaces

How to Contribute (Desktop Computer Version)



- To add a new venue on the [World Punk Atlas](#), make sure you're logged into Google and simply click on the "Add marker" icon (the pushpin that looks like an upside-down teardrop). It's located at the top of the map, just below the search box.
- Then, click the area of the map where you want to place the marker (you can move it around later by dragging it, so don't worry if your initial placement isn't perfect).
- A pop-up box will appear as you place the pin. Type a name for the new location and use the blank informational fields to include details about the space - you can even upload pictures and videos! *Be sure to check the boxes next to the fields that you want to be visible*).
- Click Save.

Useful Tips

- All the existing entries on the atlas are in a single map layer labeled "Venues." Please do *NOT* create a new layer.
- Avoid making duplicate entries.

- Please use discretion and common sense if you're documenting show spaces that are still active. And do *NOT* create entries for active spaces that intentionally keep a low public profile (for ex. their show flyers say "Ask a punk" or "DM for address").
- Folks are encouraged to edit existing venue entries only for the purpose of fixing simple errors, updating minor details, or contributing additional content (new web links, pics, videos, etc.) that improve the entry. But *please be respectful with your edits* given that many people around the world have contributed their time and energy to this project since I started it over a decade ago (FYI: I routinely save backup copies of the map for this reason).
- This is open to any/all punks who wish to contribute, so please share the map and these instructions with your friends and comrades.

Feel free to hit me up if you're having difficulty posting something on the map, or you just want to say hello. I'm **punkademic** on most social media and my email is easy to find with a quick Google search.
