

Sabbath Day and Strongholds

- The Sabbath day is observed from sunset to sunset and is the seventh day of the week.
- It is the only day of the week that Yahweh commanded his people to assemble in a holy convocation.
- Passover will be held from April 4th to April 8th, and it is a commanded assembly for all True Believers.
- Not keeping the Passover is considered rebellion and may have consequences on the last great day.
- Psalms 25:4 emphasizes the desire to be taught and led by Yahweh in truth and salvation.
- 1 Thessalonians 4:7 references the concept of strangling strongholds in our lives.
- Strongholds are not necessarily demonic possession but rather ways of thinking that create homes for demons.
- Strongholds are built and destroyed by individuals, and casting out demons does not automatically remove strongholds.

The Importance of Holiness and Resisting the Devil

- Resisting the devil is more effective than rebuking the devil in the long run.
- Sitting under an anointed ministry that teaches the word of God is essential for building a wall that the devil cannot penetrate.
- The scripture in 1 Thessalonians 4:7 highlights the importance of holiness, which is often overlooked and even disliked within the church.
- Without holiness, no one can see the Lord.
- Anointing and the word of God are necessary for both the speaker and the hearer to receive from it.
- The secret to overcoming strongholds in the mind will be discussed.

Transforming the Mind and Embracing Selflessness

- The mind needs to be renewed in order to achieve a certain goal.
- The "meeting of the Mind" refers to the union between the mind of Lori and the mind of the Holy Spirit (Yahweh).
- Trinitarianism is deemed a demonic doctrine and believing in it is seen as committing idolatry.
- The Lord our God is one, and there can only be one creator God.
- God calls us to be transformed into the image of Yua (the Messiah) and resemble Yahweh.
- The 30, 60, and 100-fold references should not cause worry. Instead, focus on patterning life after Yua.

- Holiness is the goal, to be like Christ.
- The human mind is seen as a gift.
- Marriages fail because of selfishness and a focus on receiving rather than giving.
- Women should view themselves as servants to their husbands rather than self-proclaimed queens.
- Being a queen means serving, not just carrying the title.
- Selfishness needs to be removed from relationships and friendships.
- Signs that someone is self-centered include having easily hurt feelings.
- Giving one's feelings to the master (God) and dying to self is essential.
- The sermon is relatable and relevant to the audience.

Selfishness and Deliverance

- Selfishness is the root cause of addiction, as it leads individuals to prioritize their own desires over the well-being of others.
- Deliverance from addiction requires a transformation from a selfish mindset to one that prioritizes selflessness and the needs of others.
- Selfish behavior can manifest in various ways, such as neglecting responsibilities, abandoning loved ones, or engaging in illicit activities.
- The desire for deliverance is often motivated by individuals wanting to shift the blame onto external factors, such as the devil, rather than taking responsibility for their own actions.
- Becoming selfless is a crucial step towards experiencing deliverance and living a sanctified life.
- The negative consequences of selfishness can be seen in various contexts, including relationships, work environments, and church communities.
- Overcoming selfishness is essential for maintaining healthy relationships and receiving the word of God in a church community.
- Walking in deliverance requires individuals to let go of their self-centeredness and prioritize the needs of others.
- It is important to distinguish between individuals who are capable of working but choose not to and those who are disabled and unable to work when addressing the issue of selfishness.
- The speaker addresses a live audience, and they anticipate receiving a significant number of emails in response to the content.

Strongholds in the Mind and Questioning Christianity

- The speaker starts by expressing gratitude for the increasing number of viewers on a channel called "fhtv" from 5,000 to 12,000.
- The focus of tonight's teaching is on the "crucified way" and the existence of strongholds in the mind.

- The speaker blames the presence of these strongholds on the lies learned from Christianity, which they refer to as "twistity."
- The speaker recounts their personal experience as a young Pentecostal Christian who had questions about the Bible and was often viewed as troublemaker for asking them.
- The speaker emphasizes the importance of questioning and seeking answers when things in the Bible do not add up or align.
- The journey out of "Babylon" (metaphorical for false teachings or confusion) begins with questioning and not blindly following.
- The speaker recounts being told not to worry about certain scriptures because they were "for the Old Testament."

Misinterpretation of Biblical Teachings

- The speaker notes that one interpretation suggests that only a small portion (90%) of the Bible applies to individuals in modern times.
- The speaker questions the validity of this interpretation, highlighting examples of Old Testament practices such as Sabbath-keeping being observed by the Apostle Paul in the New Testament.
- The speaker criticizes the emphasis on believing in Christ without acknowledging the importance of baptism and receiving the Holy Ghost.
- The speaker shares personal experiences of believing that God's love meant forgiveness before committing sin, leading to a lack of motivation to live righteously.
- The speaker reflects on their own transformation, which occurred when they were put in prison and were taught the importance of God's commandments.

Church's Role in Saving Sinners

- The author emphasizes the importance of not allowing sinners to continue living in sin while attending church.
- The author suggests that bringing sinners to church before they are saved can create a false belief that God accepts their sin.
- The author argues that the role of the church is to bring the gospel to sinners, rather than bringing sinners to church.
- When a sinner expresses a desire to give their life to the Lord, the author encourages immediate action in praying for them to receive the Holy Spirit.
- The author emphasizes the need for sinners to make a commitment to change their old ways and embrace the new way of Christianity.

The Role of Preachers and Strongholds in Christianity

- The main role of preachers is not to save people, but to perfect the Saints and turn them into preachers themselves.
- The discomfort of sinners coming to church is compared to someone going into a strip club, causing the focus to shift from teaching the word of God to getting one person saved.
- The presence of strongholds in one's mind comes from deception and thinking that actions such as living together or smoking are acceptable to God because "Jesus Loves You."
- The preacher mentions a scripture from 2 Timothy 3 that has stuck with them throughout their life, but the exact content of the scripture is not mentioned.
- The preacher distinguishes themselves from other preachers by stating that they are trying to get people out of Heaven and encourage them to be more focused on their earthly duties, rather than just striving for eternal bliss.
- The preacher raises the question about the Thousand-Year Reign and the identity of the 144,000 mentioned in the Bible, but no answers or explanations are given.

The Importance of Correct Doctrine and the Value of Scripture

- The gospel is the coming kingdom of God to planet earth, but it is often misunderstood and not preached properly.
- The idea of an altar-called gospel is emphasized instead of preparing people for the coming Kingdom.
- The speaker expresses a continuous desire for more understanding and truth, leading to more questions every day.
- The speaker references 2 Timothy 3:16, which states that all scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable and valuable.
- The claim is made that if scriptures are perceived to only apply to the Jews or Israel, then they have no value for the speaker.
- The purpose of scriptures, according to the speaker, is for doctrine, reproof, correction, and possibly motivation (not explicitly stated in the text).
- The speaker criticizes the lack of emphasis on doctrine in the Christian church.
- Scriptures are meant to correct and make individuals mad, not necessarily to make them want to come back for the next service.

The Journey of Perfection

- The text discusses the concept of perfection and how it relates to living a righteous life.
- Verse 17 challenges the idea that perfection is unattainable, as the Bible claims that it is possible to become perfect through good works.

- The text highlights the conflict between the teachings of the church and the authority of the Bible.
- Common Christianity is criticized for promoting a complacent mindset and not striving for personal growth.
- Deliverance from strongholds and selfishness is presented as a necessary step towards achieving perfection.
- The importance of replacing negative thoughts with positive ones is emphasized.
- The text suggests that to truly cast out demons, one must commit to a period of spiritual guidance and learning under a preacher.
- Perfection is portrayed as a journey rather than a destination, and being on that journey is already considered perfection.

Misconceptions in Christianity

- The desire to please God is considered perfection, even if one's actions are not perfect. The more one studies the Word, the more perfect their intent and desire become in God's eyes.
- A common misconception in Christianity is the belief that if one has a thought or temptation, they have already committed the sin.
- Using the example of seeing a cow and thinking about steak, it is explained that having a thought does not automatically make one guilty of the sin. It is only when a thought is acted upon or dwelled upon that it becomes sinful.
- Christians who are striving to walk in the narrow way may face thoughts and temptations, but it is important not to give in to the lie that having a thought is the same as committing the sin.
- It is acknowledged that we cannot stop thoughts from entering our minds, but we can choose not to engage in thought processes that lead to sin.
- Believing the misconception that having a thought is the same as committing the sin can lead to a defeatist mindset and hinder one's efforts to obey God's commandments.
- The verse about looking upon a woman to lust after her is clarified. It does not mean that simply seeing a woman or having a passing thought is equivalent to committing adultery. It is only when one actively pursues or dwells upon those thoughts that it becomes sinful.
- The example of looking a woman up on Facebook or continuously thinking about her after she has passed is used to highlight the distinction between a passing thought and actively engaging in sin.

Separation as the key to overcoming strongholds

- The power to overcome thoughts and strongholds lies in the ability to control and redirect the train of thoughts.

- Teaching that merely having a thought or temptation implies already committing a sin is considered a pitiful and demonic doctrine.
- The importance of separation in breaking free from strongholds is emphasized.
- The book Samson, which highlights the significance of Samson's long hair as a symbol of separation, is mentioned and its impending publication is announced.
- Falling in love with separation is presented as the only way to be delivered from strongholds.
- The concept of separation as an essential characteristic of the old Church is introduced, highlighting the fact that modern churches lack this separation and have become similar to the world in various aspects.
- The need to understand and embrace one's own separation from the world is emphasized, as stated in the Bible's instruction to come out from among the unclean.
- The distinction between God's people and the world is highlighted, with a focus on avoiding behaviors and practices that align with worldly norms, such as indulging in drama.

The Importance of Separation and Judgmental Behavior in a Christian's Life

- The text highlights several negative behaviors exhibited by certain individuals.
- These behaviors include running each other down, spreading rumors and gossip, celebrating pagan holidays, eating without regard to the word of God, and dressing like the world.
- The text emphasizes that Christians should not engage in these behaviors and should instead separate themselves from the world.
- The author mentions a curiosity regarding the association between long hair and the desire to change genders.
- The author notes that women tend to cut their hair short while men transitioning to women desire long hair.
- The author connects this observation to the existence of a "lesbian spirit" in society.
- The author suggests that certain haircuts on women are indicative of this spirit.
- The text emphasizes the importance of separation in all aspects of life and likens it to Samson's strength.
- Separation from the world is presented as a way to prevent the world from stealing one's blessings.
- The author mentions the Sabbath as an example of how the world does not observe certain practices.
- Separation is presented as a sign of strength and an expression of love for God.
- The text acknowledges that separating oneself from a judgmental spirit towards others who do not practice separation can be challenging.

- The author asserts that living a separated life does not mean considering non-separated individuals as no longer brethren.

The Importance of Separation and Holiness

- Separation goes beyond physical appearances and includes separating from pride and judgment towards others.
- The concept of separation is not about being "more saved" or better than others, but about being chosen and called by God.
- Yahweh desires a separated people who will let go of strongholds in their minds.
- The speaker emphasizes the importance of using the sacred name of Yahweh and the backlash they experienced when they started using it.
- Loving the name of Yahweh does not mean looking down on those who don't know it.
- The ministry values separation and welcomes anyone called to separate themselves along the Holiness Highway.
- God blesses separation and has blessed their small flock in ways unimaginable.
- Strongholds can be broken through separation and walking in deliverance.
- The speaker references Revelation 3:14 to emphasize Yahweh as the beginning of a new creation and the one new man.
- The listener, Sister Maxine, is specifically addressed and reminded of her calling by God.

New Creation and Getting Rid of Strongholds

- The concept of words and definitions changing over time
- The idea that one's identity is based on personal perception and belief
- The significance of being a new creation in the Messiah
- The notion that God works to transform individuals into a new creation
- The understanding that everyone's journey and growth in the Lord is unique
- The difference between what is lawful and what is expedient
- The importance of recognizing and addressing personal strongholds
- The analogy of God's creation process and the process of getting rid of strongholds
- The significance of Jesus being the light of the world and the notion of day one in one's spiritual journey
- The idea that being called to Jesus is just the beginning and that one is also called to holiness and good works

The Importance of Separation in the Christian Life

- On day one of creation, separation is not required, only faith in Jesus.

- Day two of creation involved separating the waters above from the waters below, symbolizing the separation of the spiritual mind from the carnal mind.
- The entire Bible uses physical events to convey spiritual lessons.
- Creation points towards a new creation in believers.
- If one's new creation does not reflect the characteristics of the original creation, there is a lack of separation.
- Day three involved the separation of land and water, representing further separation in the Christian life.
- The light of God begins a process of dividing the carnal from the spiritual.
- The light will shake and separate everything that can be shaken.
- Jesus came not to bring peace, but war, causing division even within families.
- This interpretation challenges the perception of a loving Jesus portrayed in the New Testament.

Creation and Separation in the New Creation

- The text highlights the process of creation and separation in the new creation.
- Day number three focuses on separating the day from the night, as well as separating the clean from the unclean.
- Day number four involves the creation of the Sun, moon, and stars.
- Day number five emphasizes the separation of animals from the air, including fowl and fish.
- Walking with Christ leads to aspects of one's life being put in their proper place according to God's plan.
- Donald Trump's perceived authority is mentioned as an example of not being easily brought down when walking in authority.
- The ministry has experienced multiple attacks that they have successfully withstood due to their spiritual authority.
- Day six marks the creation of a new, perfect man, starting from a broken, sinful state.
- Separation and transformation lead to a man finding rest on the seventh day.
- Importance of keeping the Sabbath day and putting God first in the process of recreation and transformation.

The Tabernacle of Moses - A Picture of the New Creation

- A Picture of the New Creation
- The Tabernacle of Moses serves as a representation of the new man and the new creation.
- The Tabernacle has one entrance, which is the Eastern Gate, symbolizing the return of God from the East.

- The 12 tribes of Israel camped around the Tabernacle, each with their own banner.
- The tribes of Judah and Zebulon were camped at the bottom of the Eastern Gate, with the banner of a lion.
- The tribes of Gad, Reuben, and Simeon were camped at the Southern Gate, with the banner of a man.
- The tribes of Asher, Dan, and Naphtali were camped at the Northern Gate, with the banner of an ox.
- The tribes of Benjamin, Ephraim, and Manasseh were camped at the Western Gate, with the banner of an eagle.
- These tribes represent the four living creatures mentioned in the Book of Revelation.
- The four living creatures are the lion, ox, eagle, and man.

The Tabernacle and the Four Living Creatures

- The throne is located in the Holy of Holies on the Ark of the Covenant.
- John saw the Tabernacle in heaven, where Yahweh dwelt.
- The four living creatures represent the fullness of Christ.
- The lion represents the king of the jungle, the man represents the king of all creation, the ox represents the king of the field, and the eagle represents the king of the sky.
- The four living creatures are the personification of the perfect man.
- Becoming an Israelite means becoming the four living creatures and vice versa.
- The Tabernacle is the pathway from light to the throne.
- Going through the divisions and separations in the Tabernacle allows one to take Dominion over their life.
- Each of the four living creatures represents a Dominion creature: the ox (Dominion over the field), the eagle (Dominion over the sky), the new man (King of Kings).
- Going through the separation process helps separate oneself from people, places, and things.
- The separating process occurs on days two, three, four, and five.

The Journey with Christ and Steps of Faith

- When starting on your journey with Christ, the first step is Mount Calvary, represented by the Brazen altar. At the altar, sins are confessed and forgiven through the fire of God's forgiveness.
- However, being saved is just the beginning. It is important to also overcome sin and have dominion over it.

- Separation from worldly influences is crucial to becoming dedicated and holy unto God.
- The message of the church includes teachings on holiness, dedication, and the future Kingdom of God.
- After the Brazen altar, the next step is to be baptized in water, symbolizing a separation of the waters. This baptism should not be neglected, as it is important for becoming the perfect man and new creation in Christ.
- Baptism in water should be done in the name of Yua the Messiah for the remission of sins.
- The importance of water baptism is emphasized, with the example of the church baptizing 385 people in one year.
- The Feast of Tabernacles is mentioned as a significant time for baptism, with a hundred people being baptized in one day.

The Importance of Prayer in Spiritual Growth

- The Bible emphasizes the importance of repentance and baptism in the name of Jesus Christ (Acts 2:38).
- The golden altar is the next step after repentance and baptism.
- The courtyard represents Christians who are saved but not yet sanctified.
- The outer Court is a place of darkness and fear, symbolizing the lack of spiritual life.
- Outer Darkness refers to the outer Court, not hell.
- The next furniture in the spiritual journey is the golden altar, symbolizing the place of prayer.
- Prayer separates the land (the fleshly nature) from the water (the Holy Ghost).
- Developing a life of prayer is crucial for entering the 60-fold (deeper spiritual growth).
- Prayer is not an escape from problems but a means to endure and grow in difficult situations.
- Prayer is a relationship with God that goes beyond salvation.

The Importance of Prayer and the Manora in the Christian Journey

- Prayer is essential for Christian growth and separation from worldly influences.
- Developing a consistent prayer life requires setting aside a daily appointment for communion with God.
- Merely claiming to pray without a disciplined schedule is not sufficient for spiritual progress.
- Kneeling during prayer is a symbol of surrender and separation from carnal desires.
- Prayer allows for reflection upon one's actions and prompts godly conviction.

- Day four represents the emergence of light and the introduction of the manora in the biblical creation account.
- The manora symbolizes the separation of truth from false doctrine.
- The manora's light illuminates the path to spiritual maturity and understanding of God's mysteries.

Symbolism and Stages of Spiritual Growth

- The church has a symbol called the "sirl" that represents truth.
- The sirl guides individuals off the broad Highway towards a narrow path of truth and holiness.
- The "manora" is a symbol of truth and is accessed through prayer.
- The manora separates day and night, leading individuals towards perfection.
- The table of show bread represents the 60-fold inner court.
- The hidden Mana is given to those who follow the light of truth and are baptized in Jesus' name.
- Mature individuals receive hidden Mana and do not rely on programs or external activities.
- Consuming hidden Mana leads to spiritual transformation and becoming like Jesus.
- Separation of the clean from the unclean occurs during day five of the spiritual journey.
- Praying for truth is possible after baptism and salvation.
- Finding truth leads to personal growth and development.

The Importance of Wisdom in Teaching Truth

- Teaching the truth is valuable, but it is equally important to have wisdom to teach it effectively.
- Knowledge alone does not make a person wise; wisdom is necessary for understanding and applying knowledge.
- The purpose of gaining knowledge is not to become superior to others or enforce the truth on them, but rather to draw closer to Christ.
- The journey from the beginning to the spiritual enlightenment is not taken by everyone, but those who do embark on it are changed and become new individuals.
- The Old Testament and the Torah are still relevant and applicable for spiritual growth and authority.
- Prayers of individuals who live according to the truth and righteousness have more power and effectiveness.
- It is important to be cautious about who we ask to pray for us, as the prayers of those who are not living a righteous life may not have much impact.

Prayer and Authority with God

- Prayer is emphasized as a way to seek answers and guidance from God.
- Seeking the assistance of others, such as a spouse, can enhance the effectiveness of prayer.
- Having authority with God allows believers to speak with confidence and faith, as demonstrated by Sister Kendrick's declaration about her daughter.
- This authority is not dependent on being perfect, but rather on the desire for perfection in alignment with the beauty of God's holiness.
- The speaker concludes by suggesting that they have spoken for a sufficient amount of time and invites the audience to stand together in praise.
