

or is one of a row of similar houses joined together by their side walls.	
An is a circular house made of blocks of hard snow, especially as built by the Inuit people of northern North America.	
is a very tall modern building, usually in a city.	
A is a set of rooms for living in, usually on one floor and part of a larger building.	
A is a house that is joined to another similar house on only one side.	

is a type of building that people live in, usually staying in one place, but able to be moved using a vehicle or sometimes its own engine.	
A is a very large, expensive house.	
is a small house, usually in the countryside.	
that is the official home of a king, queen, or another person of high social rank.	
A is a house that is not joined to any other house.
