"Front Porch" by Brittany Mona' is a 40 x 30-inch mixed media painting that blends acrylic and layered paper to evoke the texture and warmth of a handmade quilt. The composition features a figurative portrait of four African American children seated on front steps, immersed in a moment of joy and connection. The quilt-like background, rich in color and pattern, capture themes of freedom, creativity, and cultural memory. Through playful expressions and vibrant layering, Front Porch captures the essence of childhood curiosity, self-expression, and the beauty of Black communal life.

"Griot" by Brittany Mona' is a 36 x 48-inch mixed media painting composed of layered acrylic, fabric, cardstock, wood, beads, and paper. The image depicts an intimate moment between an African American elder and a child, with the elder gently doing the child's hair. Rich in texture and symbolism, the work captures the quiet power of everyday acts, how knowledge, tradition, and love are passed down through tender, routine interactions within Black households. This piece serves as a visual ode to oral histories, cultural inheritance, and the sacredness of care.

"Saying Nothing New" by Nikki Brooks is a 48 x 54-inch mixed media painting on a wooden panel that includes collage, wood, fabric and paint. The painting depicts an African American woman in a green dress gazing resolutely at the viewer against an orange background with a yellow flaming sun. Sunbeams and strokes of blue extend from the center of the image behind the woman. Layered in front of her are two wooden sticks reaching from the bottom of the painting to the woman's chest and shoulder. One is painted with white text that reads, "FRUIT FROM OUR LABOR CONTIN...." along its side. The other to its left is entangled in a geometric pattern of twine forming a triangle, held up by pins.

"Hemorrhoid and the Wonder in Bedlam" by Locko is a 51.5 x 61.5 inch painting on canvas. The painting features overlapping blocks of color in yellow, blue, red, pink and black, with geometric drawings of eyes and abstracted faces. "Stride of Resilience" by Mentwab Easwaran is a 60 x 30 inch acrylic painting on canvas depicting a woman in profile walking against a flat, light blue background. "Forward and back" by Idris Aguero is a 17.5 x 16 inch colored pencil drawing on cutout paper. The drawings are multicolored and highly saturated. "First Response" by Michael P. Jr is a 18 x 24 x 12 inch copper wire sculpture of two ants. The ants are formed with coiled wire creating the shapes of their bodies. One ant, standing, holds another ant in its mandibles with one arm supporting its body. The held ant is curled with its legs in the air as if injured.

"2 Flies on a Wall" by Michael P. Jr is a 9 x 12 x 3 steel wire and enamel model mounted to a square board. Against a flat yellow background, two small flies made of coiled wire with black bodies, red eyes and silver wings lay curled into each other. One is standing over the other in a mounted position.

"Cordyceps: Cicada" by Michael P. Jr is a 5 x 8 x 7 inch copper wire and wood sculpture. A coiled wire model of a cicada, with its antennae standing upright and its wings flat against its back, rests on a small block of wood. The corner of the block is textured like a branch, with lichen along its edges.

"What can we salvage" by Lucas J Rougeux is a 22 x 30 inch soft pastel drawing on paper. The drawing depicts a cloud of curling smoke and dust that overwhelms the entire image. "Tutto Passa" by Brooklyn Rando is a 13×19 inch digital illustration. The image depicts two faces, one green and one orange, kissing with open mouths. Their skin is glossy and their lips and the ends of their tongues are glittery and textured.

"She Dreamt Her Eyelashes Were Fireworks Above a Story They Couldn't Ban" by Adam Chamy is a 48 by 72 inch mixed media painting on canvas. The painting depicts DC Drag Queer Tara Hoot wearing a green dress and light blue fur stole with pink hair and gold jewelry reading from a book titled "Something, Someday." They sit on a green couch in front of a glass coffee table. An orange striped cat in a pear necklace lays next to their feet.

"The Book of Sodom: a queer codex" by Alexander D'Agostino 17 x 25 x 4 inch mixed media art book with a wood cover. The book lays open for visitors to flip through the pages, which are textured with layers of collaged paper and twine. The pages depict scenes of witches, animals and spellcasting in purple, red, blue and gold, and feature lines of alchemical sigils.

"Fantasizing Floating Flesh" by AnnaMarie King is a 47 x 22 x 2.5 inch mixed media artwork on canvas with draped fabric. The canvas features a swirling design in blue, pink, and red. The fabric drapes along the sides of the canvas and cascades down from the end. It is transparent with a repeating stylized lace pattern.

"Two Sides of One Story" by Ashley Jaye Williams is a 58 x 108 inch acrylic painting on two canvases. In the center of the diptych are two figures with green leafy heads cutting similarly shaped green discs. Behind them is a terraced apartment building, and a sign below it that reads, "I felt like if I sai / d NO... / am not obeying my / BODY." On the right of the piece is the superimposed form of two hands weaving string together, with each end of the string bearing a human face.

"Retired Armor" by C.S. Corbin is a $13 \times 7 \times 20.5$ inch mixed media on stained glass sculpture. The sculpture depicts a human torso decorated with oyster shells around the breasts. Chains and metal decorations hang from the edges of the shells. The body is formed by green-tinted geometric stained glass panes in a metal frame.

"Pride Service" by Connor Czora is a 32 x 68 x 1 inch glazed porcelain and gold luster sculpture with custom ceramic details. The piece is a series of 36 ceramic plates with collaged photographs depicting contemporary attacks on and defenses of queer rights; in one, marchers hold signs saying, "PROTECT TRANS KIDS". Another depicts former Republican Congressman George Santos as his drag persona, Kitara Rayache.

"Our Love Keeps Us Warm" by Fatima Janneh is a 57 x 55 inch knitted artwork made from naturally dyed yarn. The artwork is a white rectangular blanket with two stripes of rainbow colors at its top and bottom. The piece is draped over a metal bar.

"Queer Portrait Series" by Diane D'Costa is a series of four 30 x 72 inch digital prints. The portraits are of queer individuals smiling, gazing pensively and posing viewed from the shoulders up as line drawings against backgrounds in purple, blue and green.

"My Hair Looks Fierce" by Laya Monarez is a 24 x 36 inch oil painting on canvas. The painting depicts six people sitting on an enlarged operation table under surgical lights against a teal background. The figures sit in identical pairs, all with their legs crossed, with one dressed in a suit and the other in a gown. In the center are two women resembling Amanda Lepore with blue eye makeup, red lips and long blonde hair. One the left are two with slick short hair, and on the right are two with long black hair and bangs.

"Whose Acceptance Have You Been After and for How Long?" by Kamille Simone is an acrylic, spray paint, house paint, and graphite artwork on wood. The painting depicts two hourglass shapes in shades of pink and blue against a purple gradient background.
