## Remarks from Carli, Kibak Tile

- Started by Carli's mom 40 years ago in Sisters. Been in Central Oregon making tile since them.
- Fully women-owned and operated. Carli's mom used to have a much bigger factory, but have now settled into a "working studio," selling directly to people.
- Used to work through Anne Sachs Tile and Stone, now sell directly to consumers and designers. Also carried in about 15 boutique showrooms across the country.
- Focus is "making beautiful tile!" Tile can often get overlooked in a house, but it is a great opportunity for artwork. They really focus on tile that's perfectly made for a space. Everything is hand-made and hand-painted.
- Everything is customizable color, pattern, etc. But they also offer things as-is.
- They do commercial, residential...their tile is in Disneyland, Disneyworld, Hard Rock Cafe, celebrities, etc. Really have a wide reach across the country.
- They love getting to see how their product can transform a space into a timeless, "liveable piece of art."
- In the last few years it's been a goal to focus more on local projects and businesses, infusing their tile into the local community.
  - E.g. You can find their tile at The Slow Down State, Inscape Plant Co., local homes, etc.
- The process
  - They silk-screen their patterns on, then hand-glaze each piece
  - Fire them in their on-site kilns overnight, they're ready to go the next morning
  - They can do a lot of different styles modern, ranch, geometric
  - Four women who work here together right now, have a lot of fun
- They're also starting to make stuff like tile tabletops, trivets, tile wall hangings, etc.
- How the community can support them
  - o Know that they're here, and think of them for your tiling needs!
  - They've played around with the idea of doing tile painting nights, they might try again this year

- They also love a swap! Right now they're trading for website design.
- They always love photos of their tiles installed! Feel free to share.
- What's behind the name?
  - It's Carli's mother's maiden name. It's Danish. That's also why you'll see a lot of Danish design infused into their patterns
- How do they market?
  - They don't do much! They have a strong Instagram presence, but mostly word of mouth
- Do they ever do stuff with their broken tile?
  - Yes! Some folks come in to use it for mosaic work, but if you ever want some they often have LOTS leftover so get in touch.

#### C4C

- The Hub is now open, M-F 10-4! Amenities include private offices for C4C and Explore Sisters; drop-in, pay-what-you-can coworking; lounge area; bookable semi-private meeting space; a shared kitchen; 1 gig wifi; rotating art exhibits; after hours event rental; a lending library; and more! ### **Roundhouse Foundation**

- Just closed fall open grants cycle. Had 180 applications come through, up to \$30k/org
- Serve 501c3s, tribal entities, and government entities
- Launched new grants
  - Technical assistance grants for food security (food pantries affiliated with regional food banks)
  - Multi-year funding for regional food banks in rural communities
  - Technical assistance grant for rural fire/EMS, arts and culture, and journalism and storytelling. Can be for conferences, special equipment, etc.
- Will open next Open Grants Cycle in January
- Pine Meadow Ranch's upcoming Open Studios
  - Opportunity to meet their Artists in Residence
  - o Come on August 28th to meet the artists, see their work

#### COCC/SBDC

- Small Business Management Program starts in October, is for growth-phases entrepreneurs in the area. 9 months long, ends with a capstone project that allows you to compete for \$10k. \$1,500 to enter
- STRIVE Startup Training and Resources to Inspire Veteran Entrepreneurs. Free, for veterans and their spouses in the ideation phases of entrepreneurship. Comes with a \$10k potential award at the end of the program. Next one starts next year.
