Close Reading Questions for "Mending Wall"

By Robert Frost (page 1002)

Set up ONE paper for both partners with the proper MLA heading and provide a title.

- Lines 1-4: The first line tells us there is something that doesn't love a wall or something that can break down a wall. The next 3 lines tell us what that thing is. What is it? (key words – two can pass abreast)
- 2. **Lines 5-9**: This section tells us another way the wall can be broken down. What is it? (key word hunters)
- 3. There are two people in the poem: The narrator and the neighbor. These two people are a foil of each other. What is a foil? (look it up in the "Glossary of Literary Terms" in the textbook, unless you already know what it is!)
 - a. Provide at least four characteristics of each person.
 - b. Provide lines from the poem which resembles what each person feels about the wall/fence. (provide at least one line for each person)
- 4. **Lines 23-26**: One person tries to convince the other to take the wall down. Why is there no practical need for the wall?
- 5. Line 24: How could this line be representative of each person?
- 6. Line 27: What need does the neighbor see for the wall?
- 7. Lines 38-42: What is the narrator's opinion of his neighbor?
- 8. Which person would you rather have as a neighbor? Why?
- What are the basic themes or metaphors of the poem? Think about both perspectives presented to you through each person and come up with two themes or metaphors.
- 10. **Title**: The phrase "mending fences" means to repair relationships. But Frost uses "mending *wall*" instead. What could be the reason he used wall instead of fence?
- 11. **Meter**: What is meter? (look it up if you don't know) How do you find meter? (look it up if you don't know) What is the meter of this poem?
- 12. Literary Elements: Find examples of alliteration and assonance.
