Bill Number: SB1555

Brief Description of Bill (maximum 100 words): This measure would return us to addressing drug use primarily through the criminal justice system rather than the health care system, a criminal justice system that rarely includes addiction treatment in its jails and does not have enough public defenders or court personnel to prosecute the crimes currently before it. SB 1555 does the following:

- Returns possessing small amounts of controlled substances to a Class A
 Misdemeanor (as it was before Measure 110), punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$6250 fine.
- Makes public use of a controlled substance a Class A Misdemeanor, punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$6250 fine.
- Mandates harsher penalties for certain drug related crimes.
- Changes the law to make it easier to prove intent to transfer drugs.
- Mandates addiction assessments and treatment for its diversion programs, probation, or conditional release. This free assessment and treatment, set up under Measure 110, is already available to anyone. However, not enough treatment beds are available and nothing in this measure would change that.
- Changes the supervision of Measure 110 money (from marijuana taxes) from the
 Oregon Health Authority to the Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission.

(maximum 200 words) Coalition to Fix and Improve Measure 110, which is backed by money from Oregon businesses such as Nike founder Phil Knight and Tim Boyle of Columbia Sportswear, supports SB 1555. It is led by Max Williams, former director of the Oregon Department of Corrections. The Eugene and Salem Chambers of Commerce are supporters for two main reasons: Their businesses have been victims of more theft and break-ins, and customers are being scared away by open air drug use and drug markets.
- 5. What groups are opposing this bill and why are they opposing it? (maximum 200 words) The ACLU, the Partnership for Safety and Justice, and BIPOC organizations such as the Urban League and the Latino Network oppose it, saying it will continue the over-representation of BIPOC in the criminal justice system. The Measure 110 original supporters oppose, saying Measure 110 changes have not had enough time and are just getting going. Many addiction treatment providers have spoken out against it. A couple of Behavioral Health Resource Networks (successful treatment access created by Measure 110) have spoken against it. The public defense community opposes this and is strongly against changing the law (Boyd/Hubble) to make it easier to prove intent to transfer drugs
