Lesson Big Ideas

Navigation is a skill with ancient roots and modern demands. Understanding how and why we use maps and basic cartographic concepts will help students better describe and understand their world.

Content & Context

- Making maps
- Latitude and longitude

Time Required: 2 hours

Lesson Activity

This lesson plan can be taught online or in the classroom. Adaptations for online use



Here are some suggested adaptations for working with your classes online:

- Use a class conference tool such as Microsoft Teams, Google Meet, Zoom, or other.
- Create a discussion board on your classroom's website/portal.
- Have students create individual written responses to reflect upon and complete using the prompts provided.
- Have students work as distance partners over the phone or online to complete their responses after a discussion (i.e., record their Google Meet audio session, type up their answers, etc.).

Activating

- Students have often used general purpose maps (e.g. Google Maps) or political maps (e.g. provinces of Canada). Use the <u>slide show</u> to have students identify 2 pieces of information this map shares with them and their prediction of the map's title (you will need to provide students with this <u>worksheet</u>).
- Discuss in class, using Google Classroom question, discussion boards, or Google Meet why some maps were easier to guess than others, in terms of the title. This is often because we can use prior knowledge and our own experiences to help us guess.
- Brainstorm in person or online to think of as many different ways as you can for how people relied on maps 500 years ago and today.

Acquiring
