n her 23 years, Bel Powley has indulged in her share of youthful fashion dalliances. "When I was fourteen, I went through a Gothic stage," says the actress. "Then came grunge—followed by an odd time when my friends and I would only wear fifties vintage dresses." Powley, currently in the midst of a self-described "Scandinavian tomboy" phase, now favors scene-kid labels like Acne and A.P.C., though she has also transitioned seam-lessly to the sort of red-carpet glamour apropos of an ingenue, thanks to her recent star turn in *The Diary of a Teenage Girl*. The film, which was set in the high-waisted and furcoated seventies, was a sartorial treasure trove—something Powley didn't realize until too late. "I wish I'd kept all those bell-bottoms," she says wistfully. "I'm sure they're languishing in a warehouse somewhere."

For the New York premiere, Miu Miu sent her a head-to-toe number inspired by an even earlier decade. "I was like a sixties mod girl—it was a block of black, but then, at either end:
sparkles!"The designer is quickly becoming a red-carpet favorite for Powley, who—refreshingly—prefers to keep styling to a minimum. "I never want to look too done," she says. "I want to stay looking my age—young and flirty."—LILI GÖKSENIN
