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Dear Church Family and Friends,

My thoughts from a conference dean's perspective:

All indications point one way toward the future of our denomination: To remain open and active, small congregations, even those already working together, will need to be more flexible and collaborative in their efforts.

This means potentially partnering with other local churches, preferably Lutheran ones, for VBS, confirmation, Bible study and other activities. It may also include the ability to worship on Sundays and have Communion, serve the greater community, partner with the synod and contribute to meeting global needs for essential well-being. (I did not mention calling a full-time pastor because in the future, that may not be a matter of finances, but of rostered minister availability.)

This summer, I served as one of two bridge pastors willing to provide pastoral care to hospitalized or homebound members of congregations in need. Things I realized: Pastors are human too; they and their families have needs which require tending. Pastors experience personal crises and like everyone else, they need to find balance and ways to function consistently, rather than in short or sudden bursts.

There are already a number of vacancies in the Upper Dauphin Conference which mean that several congregations in the area have gone without

rostered leadership or pastoral care for months to years. More vacancies will arise.

What keeps some congregations going is that which typically does: Having a small group of dedicated lay leaders in combination with a dozen or so faithful givers and church attendees.

Not only is there a dire need for pastors willing to serve, but the role of lay leaders and lay ministers has proven vital. For your information, there are currently no pastors seeking a part-time call within our synod except that every interim is functionally that. Most often, they are contracted on a part-time basis; they no longer enjoy the benefits of Portico. The congregation experiences limited office hours, and congregation members may have minimal contact regarding pastoral care.

These parameters aren't always true, they're just often true. I've witnessed this trend for ten years as a seminarian doing supply preaching, while serving as a short-term interim in Western Maryland prior to being called to Halifax, and

whenever I'm among pastor cohorts in groups from various denominations.

St. Peter and Messiah share similarities with this growing trend due to a dwindling number of folks willing or able to lead/participate in church ministries and programs. Working people with families are busy running children to other activities and retired couples are busy with grandchildren, travel or just wanting to be retired.

I'm asking you to prepare yourselves for not only what lies ahead, but to consider the needs of your congregation in the present. Both churches are gradually letting go of things out of necessity or as circumstances change. Each is doing its best to adapt, keep up, function, and prioritize. This is good work which helps energy and commitment flow naturally as people focus on what's important to them.

As your pastor, I'm trying to hold up a mirror to myself and to our churches so that we are honest with ourselves and each other. Let's pray together and take a good hard look at where we could improve at taking better care of each other or things that need doing by noting our assets, beginning with small changes, accepting rather than denying our limitations while moving forward to be the best we can at trusting the Lord and doing good, at Living in God's amazing Grace, at working with what we've been given and choosing (or discovering) what else we have to offer.

Please come prepared to your annual congregational meeting with ideas, feelings of gratitude, a positive attitude and a constructive way of helping your church take its next steps.

LOADS OF LOVE - HALIFAX

Connecting with our community through an outreach of Halifax churches.

Loads of Love is a community effort to break down barriers and find opportunities to share the love of Christ with neighbors.

WHO: Members in our community who are facing poverty meet volunteers with love to share.

WHAT: A free laundry ministry to neighbors without resources to do laundry at home.

WHERE: Halifax Village Laundry, 209 Market Street, Halifax.

WHEN: **6:30 - 8:30 PM.** Last Thursday of the month.

WHY: Being clean is a basic human need. When we are clean, we have dignity and self-worth. Many who face poverty do not have the financial means to go to a laundromat regularly.

HOW: Halifax churches are asked to donate **Tide** Liquid Laundry Detergent, **Bounce** dryer sheets and **quarters**. 4-6 volunteers will meet at Halifax Laundry to assist guests to load up to two washers with laundry. Volunteers will add detergent and quarters. A volunteer and/or guest will transfer the laundry to a dryer where a volunteer will add a dryer sheet and quarters. Guests will be required to remain on site for the duration of their laundry completion.

THE WONDERS of WATERMELON

Watermelon is a staple at many summertime picnics and gatherings around the country. While most people agree watermelon tastes good, a

majority are unaware of the many benefits this wonderful fruit contains.

Watermelon: the disease fighter

Did you know watermelon has more lycopene than any other fresh fruit or vegetable? Lycopene is an antioxidant linked to decrease risk of cancer, heart disease and age-related eye disorders.

Watermelon is nutritious

Watermelon is the perfect sweet treat that is nutritious and tasty. One cup of watermelon contains: 46 calories, 12 grams of carbohydrates, 865 international units {IU} of vitamin A- (equals to .26 milligrams), 12 milligrams of vitamin C, 170 milligrams of potassium, 0.1 milligrams of vitamin B6, zero fat, cholesterol or sodium. Vitamin A is important for skin and eye health. Vitamin B6 helps your body break down the protein you eat, and is also important for the immune system and nerve function. Vitamin C helps strengthen the immune system and aids in the absorption of iron. Potassium is helpful in lowering blood pressure and is important for nerve function as well.

Watermelon hydrates

As its name states, 92% of watermelon consists of water. No wonder it's the most common melon eaten in America and is perfect for staying refreshed and hydrated on a hot summer day.

Many ways to eat watermelon

In addition to eating watermelon as is, you also can try: Lightly grilling (around 2 minutes on each side), throwing in a blender for a refreshing beverage or smoothie, adding to a salad or stir-fry, pickling the rind.

Searching for the perfect watermelon

When choosing a watermelon, look for one that is firm, symmetrical and heavy for its size. There should be a yellow spot on the underside as a result of sitting on the ground and ripening in the sun. If the spot is very pale or white, it may have been picked too soon and will not be ripe.
