Course Description

Designed to develop the fundamentals of communicative competence in colloquial Spanish. The emphasis is on listening, comprehension, and conversational skills. Early reading and writing skills are introduced, as well as fundamental aspects of culture. Equivalent to two years high school Spanish.

Learning Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Comprehend native daily spoken Spanish in selected social situations.
- 2. Communicate in selected social situations.
- 3. Recognize and utilize basic grammatical structures.
- 4. Comprehend reading of selected written passages in Spanish.
- 5. Compose original sentences that incorporate the material acquired through reading and speaking activities.
- 6. Identify an additional 400 vocabulary words and relate them to selected social situations.
- 7. Identify, select, and give examples of appropriate social levels of speech.
- 8. Compare and contrast general aspects of culture and daily life of Spanish speaking population with that of students.
- 9. Develop appreciation for historic, political and artistic individuals.

SPAN 1 Student Learning Objectives (SLOs) for 2020

Upon completion of this course, students will demonstrate knowledge of the history, politics, literature and arts of the countries and people who speak Spanish.



Assessment:

In questions embedded in the final exam, 80% of the students will be able to demonstrate their knowledge of the cultural aspects of the Hispanic world.

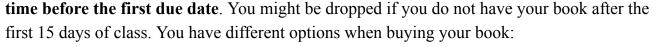

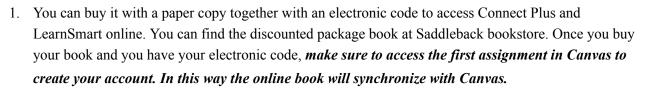

- 2. Another option is buying the book in the online version without a hard paper copy. Time commitment

This course is worth five units. **Plan on studying and writing fifteen hours a week**; your time commitment will vary based upon your own level of experience with the language and the web technologies. It is your responsibility to keep up with the class. Please have this in consideration and plan your schedule accordingly.

You are expected to submit your work and begin your readings based on the assigned due dates

Homework

Textbook and Lab Manual exercises are designed to enhance and reinforce the information studied in each chapter; they will give you the necessary practice of vocabulary and grammatical structures along with essential practice and evaluation of your reading and listening comprehension. The exercises in the textbook will be your homework (tarea). After completing each activity, press 'submit' to see errors (not all activities will provide feedback). All assigned chapter activities must be completed by the due date to receive full credit (grade is based on completion, attempt as many times as you want). Students can complete assignments late but grade will be lowered by 5% each late day.

Blog & Voice Recordings:

The Blogs are to be typed being mindful of punctuation and accents. The Blog instructions will be posted on the "Blog" on Canvas. Both the Blogs and the topics of the recorded voice activities are meant to help you to synthesize the vocabulary, grammar structures and topics covered in the chapter and to really communicate in the language. Review yours and other people's blogs and voice activity contributions to prepare for tests. Everything in this course builds on itself and is meant to prepare you for the next step including the written portions of the exams and the topics that will be on your final speaking exam.

Partnered Chats:

The Partnered Chats are to be done with a partner from your course or a(n) (online) tutor. These chats will help you connect with classmates and will allow you to practice and prepare for quizzes, exams and final exams.

Laboratory:

Your lab work is worth 10% of your total grade.

You must complete 24 hours of work by Wednesday, May 13, 2020 to receive that 10%. There is no partial grade. There are two options for students to complete 24 hours:

Option 1: 12 hours of traditional lab manual and workbook type activities + 12 hours of film report credit (4 film reports worth 3 hours each = 12 lab hours) = total of 24 hours (You can choose to do more hours of traditional lab manual and workbook type activities and less movie reports: an example is 15 hours of lab work and 3 film reports)

Option 2: 24 hours of traditional lab manual and workbook type activities (no film reports) = total of 24 hours (Pass grade for lab)

NOT an option: Only watching films for lab credit is not acceptable. Students must do at least 12 hours of typical lab activities as would be found in a lab manual or workbook. Turning in 6 or 8 film reports is not acceptable.

Film Reports are due by Monday, April 6, 2020

You will be able to access the activities on Canvas and Connect and they are labelled as Lab Activities. Plan on spending about 2.5 hours each week to reach 24 hours by the end of the semester. You can spend more time on a chapter than on another, but the total time at the end of the semester should reach 24 hours. You can complete the hours on the lab Learnsmart's activities or the lab workbook, or both. BEWARE: The lab activities for each chapter have a due date. That means that if you do not complete the lab activities for lesson 1, for example, you will not be able to access them later on, that means you will have to make that time up on the next chapters (like 5 hours on chapter 2). Understand that the last lessons of lab activities will not take you 24 hours to complete them, so you will not be able to make all 24 hours on the last 2 chapters. Please plan ahead and work weekly.

Quizzes, Exams, Final Speaking & Written Exams

Quizzes and exams are on Canvas, at the end of the list of activities to complete each chapter. Be sure you are well prepared for each of these assignments before you click to open them because once you do, you must complete it. If the quiz is left idling, it will time-out and lock you out. There will be 3 exams. The Final Written Exam will be comprehensive of the entire semester. No make-ups will be given. You will also take a 5-minute Final Oral Exam at the end of the semester to showcase what you have learned. This exam involves a conversation with me; therefore, you must have a webcam to take the test on Skype. Final Oral and written

exams are mandatory. A student not taking the Final Oral AND Final Written Exam cannot pass the class even if the amount of points would be sufficient. There is zero tolerance for cheating and plagiarism. Penalties range from an "F" on a test to expulsion from class. I don't allow any use of online translator websites!

Since Spanish is a course that requires participation in order to fulfill the objectives of the course, your active participation is mandatory. To be successful, you must: (1) Login to Canvas & Connect at least 3-4 times a week to engage in learning activities. (2) Record mini-conversations or speaking assignments by due dates, (3) Submit written assignments, quizzes & tests by all of the submission deadlines listed each week on Canvas.

If a student doesn't login to participate for over a week, it is the same as being a "no show" at an on-campus class and the student may be dropped. Your instructor may check any of the following: when you logged into Bb & Connect, how long you were on, where you clicked, what work was completed, and how long it took you to complete it. Logins to check your grades or leaving the site open and idle will not count as participation in the class. Each chapter students will: read the chapter and other readings; view tutorials and complete homework assignments; participate actively in class discussions; write blogs; record speaking assignments; take quizzes & tests.

Required Technology

Internet Connection

Although Canvas has been carefully crafted to accommodate low bandwidth environments (Minimum of 512kbps), we recommend a Broadband/DSL connection to most effectively view the online videos and create your own.

Computer

In addition to an adequate internet connection, you will need a fairly recent Mac or PC (preferably not more than three years-old) with a current operating system to complete some of the course activities.

Lastly, if you are going to be working with a tablet, make sure you submit your homework using a computer, tablets have been given problems in the past with Connect assignments.

Webcam and Microphone

We may be in different places across the state (and maybe even across the world!), but I still want to see you and listen to you and your Spanish, and you want to see me and listen to my Spanish!

This means you will need a camera and microphone. Most computers have integrated cameras and mics, but please check your computer to ensure both work and to familiarize yourself with the settings. I'm happy to meet with you to help you test your camera, microphone, and speakers!

Don't forget that you may contact Professor García or myself via email for instructions on course access and getting started in your course.

Online Attendance, Absence, and Participation

Online courses turn the idea of attendance on its head. Online, you can "attend" class in your pajamas at 2 am in the morning, or sitting by the pool on a sunny day. Attendance is not marked by your body being in a class, but rather by your



participation within the class activities.

Here are the rules we will follow in the online part of the course:

Check in and interact in the course at least once a week.

Participate in all discussions!

Connect with your professors beforehand if you're going to be disconnected from the course for more than a week.

This course follows a weekly schedule. With most assignments, we will provide feedback, which opens another opportunity for revision, learning, and growth. Working within our weekly schedule allows both you and us to plan our time (please see the Submission Policy for more details on late work).

Participants are expected to submit assignments on or before the assigned due date, which, in turn, allows me time to review your work and provide meaningful feedback. Due dates have been designed in the course to ensure time is provided to allow you to produce your best work.
