Clarification Statements

- Similes, metaphors, and some idioms make use of analogy.
- An analogy is simply a comparison of two things that are usually thought of as being different, but
 are similar in some way. They are written in a specific format such as milk: cow:: egg: chicken –
 This reads, milk is to cow as egg is to chicken.
- The intent of this standard is for students to experience the process of inferring and to apply the skill of making reasonable assumptions by closely examining how words are related to each other (based on synonyms, antonyms, multiple-meanings or pronunciations, or figurative language) for the purpose of vocabulary development.
- Know the shortcomings for vocabulary building activities that require looking up words in a dictionary and writing a sentence with the word.
