Prerequisites: Before enrolling in ACNT 1371, you must have completed ACNT 2302 with a C or better grade (or approval by the instructor or Dr. Reed Peoples). Basic computer skills utilizing internet, word processing, spreadsheet (Excel), and presentation (Power Point) software are recommended for all accounting courses. If you have any questions, consult with an accounting advisor.

Course Description:

This course is designed to provide an overview of the accounting information system and accounting cycle, financial statement interpretation and preparation, time value of money concept and applications, and revenue recognition criteria. It also provides students an introduction to research and writing. This is a 3 credit hour course that consist of almost 3 lecture hours and 1 lab hours per week during a 16 week semester.

This course is not intended to re-teach students debits and credits or other fundamental concepts of financial accounting. Students who plan to take ACNT 1371 are assumed to have already taken ACCT 2301 before enrolling in this course. Topics covered in ACNT 1371 is intended to solidify, reinforce, and enrich the student's understanding of the accounting cycle, principles of financial reporting, and financial statements, time value of money applications, and principles of revenue recognition. Additional areas include the theoretical accounting environment and related current issues.

Course Objectives:

This course examines issues in corporate financial reporting from both preparer and user perspectives. Upon successful completion of this course, students are expected to:

- Analyze the economics (transactions and events) about the business, understand how financial reporting capture those economics, which means to demonstrate proficiency in all aspects of the accounting cycle. This kind of training will build for you the foundation of how equity and credit analysts use financial reporting for fundamental analysis, which is the cornerstone of investing
- Reason about financial reporting issues through the flow of the data from journal entries to financial statements, and to further reason about financial reporting problems by working backward from financial statements to the initial data that captures the economics of the business
- Apply current GAAP principles to problem solving and case study, develop problem-solving skills and ability for quantitative analysis, which helps you build the mechanism for quantitative fundamental analysis.
- Develop understanding and critical interpretation skill of financial statements – their structures, elements, classification, valuation of significant accounts, foot notes, and interrelationships amount financial statements.

- Evaluate and apply basic revenue recognition concepts, identify issues related to earnings management and its impact of on the integrity of financial reporting; be alerted about the impact of the integrity of financial reporting on the efficiency of capital allocation
- Be aware of the joint effort of IASB-FASB convergence and be able to identify some key elements of IFRS and its impact on US accounting standards and financial reporting.
- Demonstrate understanding and application of time-value concepts in various cases, and develop understanding that time-value of money concepts are essential in a variety of accounting situations.

Course Rationale: The goals and objectives of this course prepare students for (1) completing degree requirements; (2) obtaining or improving job skills; (3) qualifying for a business or accounting job; (4) working as an entrepreneur; and/or (5) fulfilling personal goals.

Instructional Methodology: The objectives of this course will be met by incorporating a variety of instructional methods. These may include lecture, class discussion and practice, problem-solving exercises, quizzes and exams, group activities, student presentations, and online activities and research.

1. **Organize Information:** Organizes, processes, and maintains written or computerized records or other forms of information in a systematic fashion. Competently performing the tasks of organizing information includes understanding and organizing information from computer, visual, oral, and physical sources in readily accessible formats, such as computerized databases, spreadsheets, etc.
2. **Use Problem Solving Skills:** Recognizes that a problem exists (i.e. there is a discrepancy between what is and what should or could be); identifies possible reason for the discrepancy, devises and implements a plan of action to resolve it; evaluates and monitors progress; revises plan as indicated based on findings.
3. **Apply Technology:** Understands the overall intent and the proper procedures for setting up and operating machines, including computers and their programming systems. Demonstrating competence in how to apply technology to tasks includes understanding and using various software products (e.g. Ultra Tax and RIA Checkpoint).

Texas State Board of Public Accountancy: Austin Community College has received the designation of Qualifying Educational Credit for CPA Examination by the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy (Board). This course qualifies as one of the 30 required upper-level accounting courses, however for this course to be counted, **the student MUST have completed a bachelor's degree PRIOR to taking this course.** If this course is completed before a bachelor's degree is awarded, the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy will **not** accept it. To become a CPA in Texas, you must have a minimum of a bachelor's degree that includes 150 hours of college credit, 36 hours of accounting, 3 hour ethics course and 24 hours of business; pass a uniform exam; and have experience working with a CPA.

Pursuant to Rule §511.57(a)(1)(c) from the Texas Administrative Code, an individual completing accounting course requirements for the CPA exam shall have no more than 15 hours of online instruction. This limit applies only to the 30 upper level accounting hours.

It is very important that you enroll in the Professional Accountant - Advanced Technical Certificate and that you see an advisor at the start of your program. Please be aware of enforcement of prerequisites. If you do not have the necessary prerequisites for this course, you will be withdrawn from the course.

For students in this course who may have a criminal background, please be advised that the background could keep you from being licensed by the State of Texas. If you have a question about your background and licensure, please speak with your faculty member or the department chair. You also have the right to request a criminal history evaluation letter from the applicable licensing agency.

To become a CPA in Texas, the Board has a statutory obligation ([Section 901.253](#)) to determine that any person awarded a Texas CPA certificate is of good moral character. Good moral character is demonstrated by the lack of a history of dishonest or felonious acts. The Board considers several areas in evaluating an applicant's moral character. These include

- Responses to questions on the application relating to arrests, charges, convictions, probations and/or deferred adjudications of a felony or misdemeanor other than misdemeanor driving offenses such as moving violations (NOTE: DWIs are not considered misdemeanor driving offenses).
- The Board will access the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) database and the Texas Department of Public Safety – Crime Records Division files using an established fingerprint process for each person who submits an Application of Intent. The fingerprint process allows the Board to receive information on all arrests, charges, convictions, probations and deferred adjudications of misdemeanor and felony offenses that occur in any U.S. state or territory. Records of these activities are reported to the Board for further investigation. If an applicant was 17 years of age or older at the time of the arrest, it should be reported to the Board. You are not required to report criminal records that have been expunged or sealed by an order of the court. You are required to report criminal records subject to a non-disclosure order. Any subsequent arrest will automatically be reported to the Board for further investigation.

ACC POLICIES

HEALTH & SAFETY PROTOCOLS

All ACC campuses and centers have one entrance for students and employees. The college is limiting facility access to faculty, essential staff, and students who are enrolled in Career and Technical Education courses. Each person is required to take the following steps:

If you do not pass the pre-screening, you will receive specific information on healthcare procedures and instructions for what you need to know to be able to return to campus.

5. **Facial coverings/masks** are required for anyone entering an ACC building. You must wear a facial covering/mask at all times. Borderline Grades:

If a student attended all classes and participated in & was well-prepared for class, a “borderline” grade could be moved up to the next grade level. A borderline grade is on the cusp between two grade levels (i.e. 59.5, 69.5, 79.5, or 89.5). I will only consider grades that fall in this category. If the student did **not** attend all classes, did not participate & was not prepared for all classes, the grade would remain at the original level. Final course grades are based solely on the judgment of the instructor and are non-negotiable.

Over the course, you may assess your performance based on total points you have learned to date comparing to the total points allocated to all the assignment to date, then, follow the “Basis for Grading” laid out above. There will be no curve for each exam. There will be no opportunity to raise your course grade by asking for and doing “extra credit” work during or after the end of the semester.

Specific Grading Policy: Please note that regardless of the total points accumulated, students will not be able to enroll in ACNT 2303 unless they have at least a 70% average for this course. Students’ performance for exams reflect the understanding, applications of concepts, ability for problem-solving, and comprehension of topics covered. It is critically important that students strike to achieve better results from exams.

Generally, to receive an Incomplete, a student must have completed all examinations and assignments to date, with a satisfactory grade of C or better, and have personal circumstances that prevent course completion that occur **after** the deadline to withdraw.
