

## Indeterminate Wind Power/特别娇







## **Project Statement**

This performance will be a 70-minute ongoing public experimental showcase exploring themes of personal and public space, the suggestiveness of "language", the distortion of "collage", variation of "critique" and self-compensation, and the metaphor of "trauma". We aim to create a truly democratic dialogue through the dance, motion, materials, sound, risky, live music, and spatial interaction.

This project synthesizes insights from the challenges of Asian educational systems and the cultural contradiction experienced post-immigration to the States. It integrates personal therapeutic explorations of somatization and amnesia with theoretical frameworks from Paulo Freire's "Pedagogy of the Oppressed". Ginny Jiang explores three central questions: How does language become distorted and misinterpreted? Can individuals construct boundaries while simultaneously shaping personal, others', and public spaces without aggression? How can improvisation manifest unconscious trauma into consciousness, addressing the superimposition and somatization of trauma? This work focuses on listening, responding, translating, and understanding, all in pursuit of reaching a truly genuine state of being.
