Aristotiquia and Cacotiquia

There are many people who think that sometimes the stars align in the sky so that the new position adopted stellar influence positively or negatively on their fate.

In fact, the ancient Greeks to what we call good or bad luck now called him "aristotiquia" and "cacotiquia". Aristotiquia means the best fortune, or wealth of the best; and cacotiquia, which is the ugly sister of the previous word, it means just the opposite. Or the opposite may happen: suddenly a bad day you lose an exorbitant amount of money on the stock market, the low your boss fires you and your partner decides to separate from you. Cycle cacótico latter, no doubt.

Greek astrologers thought that a cycle is triggered or another had to be necessarily an external stimulus and spent decades observing the position and movement of the stars to try to find out why.

And although there are still many who attribute their fate to the heavenly bodies, every day we are more than we think in the same way he did Casio (that of William Shakespere) when he said: "The fault, dear Brutus, lies not in our stars, but in ourselves."
