Goals	** To expose students to traditional philosophical debates.  ** To develop skills in thinking and writing carefully about abstract topics.  ** To subject our fundamental beliefs to philosophical scrutiny.  NOTE: This course counts as a "writing intensive course."
Topics to be covered:	<ol> <li>Do we really know anything?</li> <li>Are we anything beyond our bodies?</li> <li>Do we have free will?</li> <li>Does God exist?</li> </ol>
Readings	Readings will be announced at the end of each class.
Attendance	Attendance is expected. You should attend all classes. To be explicit, that includes all of Heller's lectures and all of your TA's discussion sections. For each unit, we will deduct points from your exam grade for poor attendance.
	If you miss two classes you will lose ½ a plus/minus grade. If you miss three classes, you will drop down a whole plus/minus grade. If you miss four classes you will lose ½ plus minus grades, and if you miss five or more classes, you will lose 2 plus/minus grades. Attendance resets for each new unit.
	Absences will be excused for good reasons (like illness or family emergencies), not for bad reasons (like sleeping through an alarm or attending a concert). Unfortunately, even excused absences will hurt you, in so far as you are less likely to learn the material.
Grades	<ul> <li>There are 4 exams, each with two parts.</li> <li>Part I will be 20 short answer questions (one to two sentences). This part is in-class.</li> <li>For the first three units, Part II will be a take home essay of approximately 1000 words.  The take home essay will be due one week after the in-class portion of the exam and will be submitted via Turnitin on Blackboard.</li> <li>For the final exam, Part II will be an essay written during the exam period.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>For each exam, the part you do better on will count as 2/3 of your exam grade, and the part you do worse on will count as 1/3 of your exam grade.</li> <li>Each exam will be worth 25% of your course grade (any slight variations will only be to help the student).</li> <li>There is no extra credit. None. Not any. Zippo.</li> </ul>

## **Academic Integrity**

Syracuse University's Academic Integrity Policy reflects the high value that we, as a university community, place on honesty in academic work. Instructors must wait to assign a final course grade until a suspected violation is reviewed and upheld or overturned. Upholding Academic Integrity includes abiding by instructors' individual course expectations, which may include the protection of their intellectual property. Students should not upload, distribute, or otherwise share instructors' course materials without permission. Students found in violation of the policy are subject to grade sanctions determined by the course instructor and non-grade sanctions determined by the School or College where the course is offered, as described in the Violation and Sanction Classification Rubric. Students are required to read an online summary of the University's academic integrity expectations and provide an electronic signature agreeing to abide by them twice a year during pre-term check-in on MySlice.
