		Say: "Now that we know a bit more about each other's reading preferences, let's move on to our main activity for the day."
		Group Reading Session:
		- Provide a selection of articles, short stories, or excerpts from Filipino literature or contemporary texts.
		Say: "Here are a few options for today's reading. Take some time to explore and choose a piece that interests you. Remember, our focus is on understanding context, cultural references, and thematic elements."
		- Encourage students to read individually and jot down initial thoughts and questions.
		Say:"Take about 20-30 minutes to read silently. Afterward, we'll regroup to discuss our findings."
Interactive Learning and Discussion		- Divide students into small groups based on their chosen readings.
		Say: "Now, let's engage in group discussions. Discuss the context, cultural references, and thematic elements present in your chosen readings."
	60 mins	- Circulate among the groups, facilitating discussions and guiding them towards deeper analysis.
		Say:"Each group will have an opportunity to present their insights, so make sure to take notes during the discussion."
		- Encourage students to ask questions and challenge each other's interpretations respectfully.
Creative Application and Reflection	60 mins	Creative Application: - Introduce the creative application segment:
		Say: "Now, let's channel our inspiration into a creative piece. You can choose to write a short story, poem, essay, or create a visual representation like a sketch or collage."
		- Provide writing materials or art supplies as needed. Say: "Take the next hour to work on your creations. Consider how the readings influenced your work – whether it's in style, theme, or overall inspiration."







Reflection/Sharing and feedback session:

- Facilitate a sharing session where each student or group presents their creative piece.

Say: "Let's wrap up our session by sharing what we've created. Talk about how the readings influenced your work and what you discovered through this process."

- Encourage constructive feedback from peers.
- Conclude the session with a brief reflection on the importance of literature and reading in personal and cultural development.
