- **Approval of May Minutes** – No quorum
- **President's Report** – B.K.
 - Welcomes and thanks everyone for coming out in support of the students and families of the district. Please come again and next time please invite a friend.
 - Thanks Principal Bertrand and his incredible team, your parent association, students, and everybody here hosting us tonight.
 - Congratulations everyone on their hard work and contributions this year. Thank you so much!
 - Acknowledged June is Pride Month. There is information on the NYCPS website about support that is offered and how a GSA club can be established.
 - President Kessler recognized Council Member Avi Glickstein for additional remarks in recognition of Pride Month. Council Member Glickstein shared that there is a GSA summit tomorrow at LaGuardia high school. It's generally for middle school and high schools but there are also elementary schools that have GSAs.
 - President Kessler stated that you are aware of unsafe traffic conditions near your school and have concerns about it, please do bring these issues to us. Recognizes families at PS 315 who advocated for changes and a new school crossing guard is assigned at an intersection they were concerned about. It is very important to keep our children safe coming to and from school.
 - The council participated in a beach cleanup for the first time. We volunteered with the organization NYC H2O. Recognized Council Member Zheng Hao Ma for the wonderful suggestion. We picked up a lot of trash, a bunch of District 22 families came out to join us and it was a success.
 - The council has been very closely following the important issue of generative AI in our schools, education technology in general, and screen use in schools. In March, we passed a resolution calling for caution and discussion relating to the use of generative AI in the classroom. We appreciate all who have been in contact with us, sharing their views and concerns. We encourage you to continue to reach out. We want to continue

the conversation and continue to advocate on this important emerging issue in terms of how this new technology relates to education.

- Another issue that we've been closely involved with is advocating for better screening training and services for students with language processing disorders, like dyslexia dysgraphia. Recognizes the advocacy of Council Member Vanessa Cannistraci on this issue. We have a commitment from the Chancellor and Superintendent to work on establishing a literacy center to specialize in that area in South Brooklyn, but we don't have a site. We will continue to deepen our understanding of that issue, learning together and continue to advocate that all students get what they need and students can learn how to read.
- Some great news. We have been told by the Division of School Facilities (DSF) the bathrooms that the Council identified as high priority in our report to the SCA will be renovated before the next school year. Thanks to council members for their hard work under school visits, advocating for those schools and their needs.
- We still have 4 open seats. One for the parent of a general education student, the parent of a district 75 student, a resident of the district to a borough president appointee seat, and one for the parent of an English language learner. Further information is on our website and we strongly encourage qualified applicants to apply.

 - **Question:** What will you do to ensure schools are staffed with at least two school safety officers? **Answer:** I certainly do not want to speak for the Chancellor, but I can tell you what I've heard is that there were graduating classes to get more officers in our schools. At the time, there was a shortage. Truth be told, there are days that sometimes I get emails that schools, instead of 3, only have 2. Instead of 2, only have one. So, we do need more officers. School safety officers in particular. The agents are not only a safety to the students, but to everyone, parents who come and visit. So, we always push for more agents at the front door. I do not want to speak for the Chancellor, but I think he would agree with me, because one of his biggest priorities, he wants students to be safe and seen, and in the word safe, of course, is the actual word safe in the building.
