Featured Wellness Workshop for Public School Champions

Sharing Leadership, Building Resilience with Future Cain, CEO & Founder of Future of SEL 1:00-2:00 pm, Library/LMC

Our goal at every Summer Summit is to create a friendly and productive space for the hard, honest conversations about demanding accountability and achieving the change we seek for Wisconsin's public schools. And we know the status quo is never going to change itself. We need to create an inclusive, intentional, strategic coalition of student-centered advocates to make a difference.

We were prepared for 2025 but that doesn't mean we're doing well.

This year, we've invited **Future Cain**, CEO & Founder of Future of SEL, to join us in the Summit - and beyond - to support some of the work we need to do to make sure we are taking care of ourselves and each other as we do the heavy work of advocating for public schools at a time when our children and communities are under constant attack.

Session Description: In times of social unrest, systemic inequity, and growing burnout, cultivating a culture of care is not a luxury, it's a necessity. This breakout session invites policy changemakers, educators, and civic leaders to reimagine leadership through the lens of emotional intelligence and community wellness. We begin by focusing inward, exploring how tending to our own mental, emotional, and physical well-being is the first radical act of leadership. Participants will engage in reflective exercises and dialogue to identify what self-care truly looks like in high-stakes environments. From there, we'll expand outward to build actionable strategies that foster belonging, safety, and shared accountability within our teams and communities.

Spotlight on our host partners: GREEN BAY AREA PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Green Bay Area Public School District is located in Northeast Wisconsin and with more than 18,000 students is the fourth largest public school district in the state. With 39 schools and many



wonderful pathways, the Green Bay Area Public School District has a school or program that is a great fit for every child.

Founded in 1856 with the first city-built school known as the Sale School, the Green Bay Area Public School District is more than 150 years old. Our District is rich in traditions from the 100 year-old East and West high schools' football rivalry to the home of City Stadium (the original football field of the Green Bay Packers).

The Green Bay Area Public School District is incredibly fortunate to have a community that is very invested in the success of its students and staff. It is also a great place to live.

The Green Bay Area Public School District and the Green Bay Packers have a long-standing connection, starting back in 1919 when East High School alumnus Earl 'Curly' Lambeau founded the team.

Green Bay Packers Historian and East High School graduate Cliff Christl attributes the start and success of the Green Bay Packers franchise to the East and West High School football rivalry, which dates back to the 1800s and made many football fans in the Green Bay community. The early rosters of the Green Bay Packers were filled with Green Bay East and West High alumni, including Curly Lambeau, Arnie Herber and more.

Many alumni of Green Bay Area Public Schools have gone on to play or work for the NFL, with the Green Bay Packers and several other franchises.

In thriving public schools, every student, including LGBTQ2+ students, deserves to feel safe, valued, and affirmed. Yet many educators and community members encounter moments where they overhear or participate in discussions that call for intervention—whether addressing microaggressions, navigating misconceptions, or fostering an inclusive environment. Often, people are unaware a problem exists, while others feel uncertain about how to respond effectively.

This interactive session will equip participants with the skills, language, and confidence to be stronger allies. Through engaging role-play scenarios and guided discussions, attendees will practice real-world strategies for intervening at various levels, fostering affirming school environments, and building bridges of understanding. Together, we will explore actionable steps to create a more inclusive community within our schools and ensure all students thrive.

Join us for a dynamic, hands-on experience that will leave you feeling empowered to take meaningful action in your school and beyond!

1D: Transformational Community Schools: Success for All (Room 107/107A)

Voucher and independent charter schools have a direct negative impact on public school students, but these costs are often obscured by red tape, a lack of transparency, and a powerful privatization lobby determined to hide the trust costs of voucher scams. This data is not readily available through any state agency or required reporting.




