- 15. Read the rest of the scene and notice this: Macbeth speaks of blood as a metaphor for guilt. Lady Macbeth speaks of blood as just blood. Who do you think is right—in the context of this play? *In other words: will their actual deeds be their undoing, or will it be their guilt?* Why do you think this?

Explain your idea about this in two or three complete sentences.

16. How have honor, ambition, guilt, and fate intertwined to bring Macbeth and Lady

Macbeth to the situation we find them in at end of Act 2, scene 2? Write a paragraph or two that explains how you see these themes demonstrated in the words and actions of the play so far. Use at least two short quotations in support of your ideas.
