#### **Course Description**

In Honors French III, students continue to develop the oral and written language skills acquired in French I and II. French III extends the students' knowledge of the language by exploring French literature, politics, history, and daily life more in depth. Readings, skits, short stories, role-playing, video presentations, and comprehension games are used to reinforce skills. Prerequisite: French II. In this course, the learner will acquire knowledge by integrating the four skills of reading, writing, listening and speaking. Therefore, the use of French in the classroom will be our primary goal. Since students need as much practice as possible to become fluent, concentration in class and oral participation in FRENCH is absolutely necessary. An effort to use the language at all times is expected.

#### **Course Goals**

The learning goal for students in this course is to develop Intermediate-Low to Intermediate-Mid fluency and control of language in all communicative skills to function in a variety of situations and for multiple purposes with ACTFL: WORLD-READINESS STANDARDS FOR LEARNING LANGUAGES.

The five "C" goals areas (Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities) stress the application of learning a language beyond the instructional setting. The goal is to prepare learners to apply the skills and understanding measured by the Standards to bring a global competence in their future careers and experiences.

#### INCLUSIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT STATEMENT

If possible, we encourage students to speak directly with their instructor about any suggestions or concerns they have regarding a particular instructional space or situation. All classroom participants—including faculty, staff, and students—who observe a bias incident affecting a student may also file a report (whether personally or anonymously).

#### 1. ATTENDANCE POLICY

Attendance will be taken during a 1st period homeroom every day. Students should be in class when the tardy bell rings or risk being marked tardy to class.

Students who have more than five (5) days of unexcused absences during the school year will be considered truant. The legal penalties for truancy include referral of students to Juvenile Court and referral of parents to State Court. Any Georgia resident who has control or charge of a child who is convicted of violating mandatory school attendance requirements will be subject to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00, imprisonment not to exceed 30 days, community service, or any combination of such penalties per absence.

#### 2. PENALTIES FOR LATE WORK & POLICIES ON MISSED EXAMS, MAKE-UP EXAMS OR QUIZZES

It is the student's and parent's responsibility, not the teachers', to arrange for make-up work. Students should ask their teacher for any missed assignments on the first day they return to school. The number of days allowed to complete make-up work will be determined by the principal or his/her designee. The days allowed to make up work will not exceed the number of days absent except under extenuating circumstances approved by the principal or his/her designee. Students assigned Out-of-School Suspension (OSS) will be allowed to make up work upon return to school. The number of days to complete make-up work is commensurate to the number of days of OSS (i.e.., 3 days of Out-of-School Suspension = 3 days to make up work missed)



#### 3. REGRADING POLICY

Students who fail a quiz or test (<70%) will need to do remediation and will be able to retake the quiz or test once.

### 4. REQUESTS FOR INSTRUCTOR FEEDBACK ON DRAFTS AND REQUESTS TO REVISE

The teacher will provide timely feedback on all major assignments/projects.

### 5. TECHNOLOGY POLICIES:
