- Also interesting to see the brand collaborations in action

- Collections and categories help narrow in the search

<u>svgl app</u>: A unique part of an app that allows you to quickly copy and paste logo assets as native vector/svg. If you quickly need a social media company logo or program logo this is a great resource to quickly grab whats needed.

Color

Realtime Colors: A robust design tool that helps with creating color palettes for website, apps. Their overview videos help illustrate it best. Website Overview 1.0 & Website Version 3.0

- Seems like a great way to test out colors for accessibility and style.
- The new font piece allows to implement type scales in real time
- The ability to export code out in a variety of ways seems great for dev friends

<u>Pigment by Shape Factory:</u> A simple website to explore color pairings and palettes.

- Scroll endlessly to find color inspo, click in and see shades, and color info (hex, pantone)
- Drag the pigment and lighting sections up or down to mess with all colors at once
- Click the paint palette to pull up all colors and filter by a specific hue. <u>Video reference</u>.

iColor Palette: A search type engine to find Pantone colors based on hex codes and vice versa.

• Good way to avoid the Pantone subscription (\$90 a year or \$15 monthly)

<u>The Color Palette Studio</u>: A purchasable tool that lets you test and build brand color palettes for the web and apps.

- Looks to be a one time fee to get their tools, though they do have some freebies
- Found this TikTok that explained it's usage pretty well.
- If you're new to web design or less familiar could be worth the purchase.

Photoshop Gradient Assets: Various gradient packs that are free and easy to install.

• Lots of other assets from this artist on their Behance.

- The site also gives some decisions and descriptions of why type scaling is important.

<u>Dimensions.com</u>: A pretty robust set of standard sizes and comparisons for various shapes and products.

- Came across this looking for the height and size of pint glasses, been cans, and weizen glasses.
- There's a nice organization to the content into <u>object types</u> where there's whole sections like <u>beer glasses</u>, <u>picture frames</u>, and <u>trash cans</u>.
- Then it also goes as far as specific people, places, and products on the <u>browse</u> page.

#### **QR Generator:** Quick and easy generator for .pngs

- They used to be free to download a vector (svg) version but now that's behind a paywall.
- Adobe Express OR generator is an option that allows for vector/SVG download

- Can be odd with faces but still does a great job up-resing just about anything
- One time fee of \$99 to use indefinitely, then there's major updates that you can buy one off.

Topaz Labs Suite: A wide array of other AI based image quality programs

 I personally haven't used any of the other programs but they're always improving and seems to have some great options for niche items.

### Searching and Discovering

**Adobe Fonts** 

Featured Type: A curated creative showcase of the finest typefaces on the internet

<u>Free Faces:</u> Nicely designed and showcased free fonts across the internet, could be better than just looking at Google Fonts or elsewhere, seems like a good starting place for discovery.

Font Brief: Using more personality to filter fonts

Fontstand: an app platform to find and test high quality fonts

Variable Fonts: A solid repository of available variable fonts, with foundry details and testing.

Font Gauntlet: An interesting tool to upload variable fonts and mess with all of their settings.

<u>Future Fonts</u>: Fonts in progress that can be tested or bought from various foundries. Some solid artists like <u>Ryan Bugden</u> are on there.

Pixel Surplus: Various free fonts and package, a "resource for creators"

<u>Font Squirrel</u>: Older site for some filtered free fonts, better for smaller projects on the side. Also has a sneaky good tool to turn <u>any font file into a webfont</u>, doesn't always work with copyright.

<u>Type Scale</u> — A useful guide for developing a good web hierarchy for font sizes and scales.

### Purchasing

<u>Creative Market − Fonts</u>: More individual artists selling usually single weight, highly unique fonts. Great for more quirky and stylized looks. ★

MyFonts: A go-to for purchasing and licensing fonts, check the <u>Special Offers</u> tab to find decent deals and help narrow the search if you're in a bind.

### Type Foundries

#### All Around Solid

<u>Commercial Type</u>: Well refined known foundry with very large families spanning extreme widths and styles. They also launched <u>Commercial Classics</u> to re-create vintage fonts.

<u>Klim Type Foundry</u>: Well known and well designed font families, not a ton of options but all their fonts are solid and commonly used. Tiempos, Founders Grotesk, are quite common. You can <u>test</u> a good set of their options too!

<u>Pangram Pangram:</u> More stylized, and more commonly used by designers but a lot of very great font families. They seem to turn out fonts regularly and also have a <u>font starter pack</u> that's affordable for the sheer amount that's included, which is also high quality mockups in addition to a large library of fonts.

<u>P22 Type Foundry</u>: Mostly hand done and serif fonts with some very stylized options. There's a whole <u>woodblock collection</u> that's pretty neat.

<u>Grilli Type</u>: Solid sets of sans and serif fonts, with plenty of weights and styles. Some known fonts include <u>GT America</u> (Gotham/Helvetica eque), <u>GT Super</u>, and <u>GT Ultra</u>

<u>F37® Fonts:</u> Great robust set of more stylized fonts. Seems like a great set for logo and wordmark designs. Each individual <u>font page</u> is also very robust with lots of testing areas and even combinations that work well together.

<u>Colophon Foundry</u>: Great mix of highly stylized and large family sets. Value Serif, Central Ave, and Brick are some favorites.

<u>LLineto</u>: Common larger scale foundry with lots of excellent font families and some interesting one off stylized fonts.

<u>Hoefler & Co</u>: One of the most well known in the font game, Gotham, Knockout, and Chronicle just to name a few. Their <u>discovery page</u> has nice visuals of the fonts in use.

<u>New Glyph</u>: Solid set of fonts with varying weights. Good options for <u>student discounts</u>, trials, and <u>licensing</u>.

<u>Luzi Type Foundry</u>: A swiss based foundry with fun stylized fonts mixed with well designed sans serif options. Also additional resources like a newsletter and various articles round out this solid resource.

Connary Fagen Inc.: Clear and well layed out site with a nice set of font pairings.

Nouvelle Noire: Great mix of Sans, Serif, Modern and more stylized.

<u>Dalton Magq</u>: Great for variable fonts, and older classics also most of their fonts are in the Adobe Font psystem. Good case studies on their <u>homepage</u> as well.

Eliott Grunewald: Stylized and vintage looking fonts like Herbus and Moore. Trials available as well.

Production Type: Good mix of widths and styles, the "Lab" fonts are unique and experimental.

<u>Emigre Fonts</u>: Classic foundry with go to fonts you've seen around.

Storm Type Foundry: Larger selection of Sans and serif typefaces, and a whole tab for Blackletter fonts.

<u>CoType:</u> A few strong sets with multiple weights. Mostly used in larger brand sets. Couple cool free fonts: <u>Betatron</u> and <u>Gridular</u> that are more futuristic and experimental.

#### **Smaller Sets**

<u>Hoodzpah</u>: Agency that specializes in custom type, but also has a really nice set of shoppable fonts. Solid set of good scripts (<u>Redondo Ave Script</u>, <u>Beverly Drive</u>, <u>Palm Canyon Drive</u>)

<u>Taylor Penton Fonts</u>: An independent type designer focusing on the hand drawn aesthetic. Offers a <u>type club</u> and full set of fonts for ~\$250.

<u>Holy Smokes</u>: Mostly retro and stylized fonts and sets of fonts, the <u>groovy</u> and <u>rowdy</u> bundles are pretty rad. The rest of <u>the shop</u> and design from this artist are pretty awesome!

<u>Dinamo</u>: Cool designed site, good set of monospaced fonts, most typefaces have full collections. Also has a <u>student discount page</u> for full collections! Other interesting things to poke around with on their site. You can also trail a smaller 'unlicensed' set of their fonts here.

<u>InHouse Type</u>: Cool set of typefaces ranging from clean and simple to stylized.

Signal Foundry: Good mix of font styles and a couple that are highly stylized

Very Cool Studio: Around 10 unique well constructed fonts, Gooper is pretty rad.

#### Superior Type:

MCKL: Foundry and Agency, the small set of fonts they do have tons of weights

HAL Typefaces: A set of 6 very unique, highly stylized and good quality fonts.

<u>Schick Toikka</u>: Small set of well known fonts, good for logo design.

Coppers and Brasses: Double and Triade are more stylized, other solid sans options.

Labor and Wait: Great small set of stylized fonts, the stencil seif 'Esperanza' is my personal fav.

Sharp Type: Smaller selection of well designed fonts.

R-Typography: Wide variety of font styles and a few that are very unique. Their stories page seems very insightful with in depth articles about the buildout of their fonts.

All Caps: 8 Solid font sets with multiple weights, this quirky font Bandit seems interesting.

Blacketra: Couple very nice fonts, Haltrix, and Gandur are great

Nikolas Type: Highly unique serif fonts

More Stylized

Oh No Type: Distinctive styles with a beautiful presentation and quirky vibes. \*

A2-Type: Good selection of styles weights and monospaced fonts.

VJ Type: Great for logo design, interesting scripts and serifs.

<u>Yeahright Type Studio</u>: Woodblock styling, nice bold scripts and sans serifs, bundle options too.

Nufrom Type: Small selection, highly stylized

Florian Karsten Typefaces: Good sans serif sets and bitmap stylized fonts

<u>Suitcase Type</u>: Good selection of slabs, and rounded fonts with large families.

Primary Foundry: Nice set of stylish fonts

House Fonts: More stylized unique fonts good for signage and large scale to show off all the detail.

<u>Type Everything</u>: Good for rounded type, scripts, and vintage looking font, also has procreate brushes.

<u>Laïc Type</u>: Cool unique letterforms and experimental fonts.

Letters from Sweden: Interesting mix of serifs

<u>Tropical Type (Creative Market)</u>: Highly stylized fonts with lots of interesting ligatures.

Sudtipos: Great for scripts, hand drawn, and high character fonts, based out of Argentina. 👉

Laura Worthington: A go-to for hand drawn script fonts, some are packaged with sans serifs that can be paired with the scripts.

Mostly Digital

RP Digital Type Foundry: More unique set of digital fonts ranging from experimental to elegant sans serifs.

XYZ Type: Good for mono-spaced and web friendly fonts.

<u>Typotheque</u>: Wide range of fonts, mostly larger families and a good source for webfonts and language support.

**Darden Studio:** Mostly sans and serif options

ReType: Decent selection of fonts, not layed out the best, lots of weights with each font.

Okay Type: Four type options with some interesting weights.

### Learning & Education

Font Review Journal An in depth analysis and thoughtful review of new and old fonts.

Fonts in Use: Tons of printed examples of fonts in use with the callout of the fonts being used.

<u>The Typewolf Checklist</u> A purchasable (\$399) course with the goal of achieving flawless type on every design project. Various fonts and other materials are included in the price.

The <u>Font Pairing guide from Connary</u> has a nice overview and explanation of what to look for in pairing fonts like contrast, fit, and layout.

One of the best logotype designers Rob Clarke has an excellent portfolio site.

# Photography

### Free Options

Unsplash: The place to start for free images, great source for textures too.

Pexels: Slightly smaller set of options, but just as high quality.

<u>Internet Archive Book Images</u> (From Flickr): Still figuring out how this works and how to find images, but basically there's thousands of scanned open source book illustrations and images for common use.

## **Paid Options**

From most to least expensive:

<u>iStock</u>: Best option for the price. Plenty of Getty Images are also placed on iStock for 90% the cost. With credits most images come out to \$10-\$20. Great spot for <u>vector illustrations</u> as well.

Adobe Stock: Decent competitor to iStock, similar credit method, slightly more expensive but integrates into the Adobe system well.

Textures.com: More for 3D art, but plenty of high quality textures. You can download some for free (with an account) otherwise the credit method works well.

Storyblocks: With a subscription, all of their assets are available, at \$30 a month its a lot but another resource that isn't the "Big Guys"

<u>Depositphotos</u>: another subscription based "unlimited access" type of site.

Stocksy: Some decent stylized still life images, and looks to have illustration too.

Pond5: Video, Music, SFX, Aftereffects, Photos, Illustrations, PSD, and 3D Models

Asylab: Up to date device mockups for Apple, Google & Samsung. Also have clothing tags, building logos

- Displayed in order of release date, helpful for the latest devices

<u>Identity: Chermayeff & Geismar & Haviv</u> from Standards Manual — The book features over 100 case studies from the firm's previous and current clients, including Chase Bank, NBC, PanAm, PBS, and many more. Also included are interviews with Tom Geismar and Sagi Haviv, plus written contributions from Milton Glaser, John Maeda, and others.

<u>Parks</u> from Standards Manual — The book showcases nearly a century of art, cartography, and printed materials in a compelling visual history of America's national parks and evolving graphic design styles culminating in Massimo Vignelli's iconic design system, the Unigrid.

<u>Paul Rand: A Designer's Art</u> (eBook Link) — Known as the godfather of modern branding, this is the best of Paul Rand's books. It probes deeply into the process of graphic design: why it's important; the impact it can have; what works, what doesn't, and most importantly, why.

<u>The Secret Lives of Color</u> by Kassia St. Clair — Tells the unusual stories of seventy-five fascinating shades, dyes and hues.

<u>The Designer Says</u> — A fun little book of quotes, quips, and words of wisdom. Great lil gift, and fun to have on a desk or close by.

<u>Cosmos</u> The Infographics Book of Space — Astronomers Stuart Lowe (@slowe) and Chris North use cutting-edge infographics to illuminate the most amazing places and objects that modern science has laid bare.

<u>A \*New\* Program for Graphic Design</u> by David Reinfurt — A do-it-yourself textbook that synthesizes the pragmatic with the experimental and builds on mid-to late-20th-century pedagogical models to convey advanced principles of contemporary design for a general reader.
