PDAILY UPDATES

10/30/25

DHS announced an interim final rule, effective Oct. 30, 2025, ending the practice of automatically extending the validity of EADs for noncitizens who apply to renew their EAD in certain employment authorization categories. Individuals who apply to renew their EAD on or after Oct. 30, 2025, will no longer receive an automatic extension of their EAD. Exceptions include extensions provided by law or through a Federal Register notice for TPS-related employment documentation.

 Center Line Division of Public Safety and Security enters 287(g) agreement with ICE. Learn more and take action.

10/3/25

The state legislature passed a final budget. Thanks to your calls and advocacy, we were able to limit some of the damage and preserve the majority of the general fund dollars for OGM. The office did, however, receive a \$1.5M cut. Thankfully, the prohibition on services to noncitizens was removed. Unfortunately, the E-verify requirement was included. It is still possible that provision could be deemed unenforceable.

9/26/25

Dept. of Transportation issues new interim rule restricting states ability to issue CDLs to noncitizens

8/21/25

State Dept. announces it will review all U.S. visa holders for potential violations that could lead to deportation.

8/19/25

- USCIS announces it will now consider whether applicants "endorsed, promoted, supported, or otherwise espoused" anti-American, terrorist or antisemitic views. It is unclear how these subjective determinations will be made.
- HUD announces it is ending multilingual services

8/13/25

Federal court issues preliminary injunction blocking HHS from sharing personal healthcare data. Michigan's Attorney General previously joined a multistate lawsuit opposing the HHS policy. The Court's Order enjoins HHS "from sharing Medicaid data obtained from the plaintiff states with DHS for immigration enforcement purposes" until the end of the lawsuit or 14 days after "both DHS and HHS have completed a reasoned decision making process."

8/11/25

ICE deports a group of 15 Hmong and Laotian Michiganders who came as refugees

8/7/25

USCIS announces new policy that family-based green card applicants without status may be considered for removal.

Victims of crime who have applied for U visas may now be vulnerable to deportation, as the Trump administration asserts that the "good faith determinations" people receive as a first step in the process do not protect people from deportation.

7/28/25

The Trump administration sued New York City over local laws that limit cooperation with federal immigration enforcement. The administration sued Chicago in February, and Los Angeles in June. Several cities and counties sued the federal government in February over the President's Executive Order calling for the end of federal funding to so-called sanctuary jurisdictions.

7/23/25

The US Department of Education is investigating the University of Michigan and Western Michigan University for alleged Title VI violations for scholarship programs intended to benefit undocumented students.

7/21/25

- The Michigan Attorney General joined 20 states in a lawsuit challenging the recent federal notices on public benefits and DOJ's new order on the "life or safety" exemption. Thanks to this suit, the federal government will not enforce any of these notices/orders in the Plaintiff states before Sept. 4, as the case proceeds. Stay tuned as guidance on affected programs evolves.
- The Trump administration has ended many Temporary Protected Status (TPS) designations, and several of these actions are being challenged in court. Today an appeals court allowed the Trump administration to end TPS for people from Afghanistan and Cameroon, while the case continues in district court.

7/18/25

Michigan's Attorney General joined a multistate coalition of 20 attorneys general in filing an amicus brief opposing the Trump administration's abrupt termination of funding for legal services for unaccompanied children.

7/16/25

The Metro Police Authority of Genesee County (Mundy Township & Swartz Creek) entered into a 287(g) agreement with ICE Enforcement and Removal Operations. They are participating in the "Task Force" model, which gives police officers most of the powers of immigration enforcement agents. This is the sixth Michigan municipality to participate in the 287(g) program.

6/27/25

- SCOTUS announces decision on Trump, et al. v. Casa, the birthright citizenship case, in a way that limits the ability to bring nationwide injunctions. This will have a devastating effect on pending and future litigation against policies from this and future administrations. They did not rule on the merits of birthright citizenship. Because Michigan's Attorney General is party to several lawsuits regarding birthright citizenship, nothing in today's Supreme Court decision changes the citizenship status of babies born in Michigan or the rights of all U.S. citizens to access public benefits and programs. We will be watching the lawsuits to which Michigan is a party in the coming weeks and months and communicating how rights are affected locally.
- Advocates have filed a new nationwide class-action suit challenging the executive order on birthright citizenship.
- DHS terminated TPS for Haiti. TPS designation expires on Aug. 3, 2025, and the termination will be effective on Tuesday, September 2, 2025.

- The Taylor police department is now participating in the Task Force model of the 287g program.
- Coalition of organizations file <u>litigation</u> challenging the end of the sensitive locations policy.
- Trump administration ends the National Qualified Representative Program that provides attorneys for immigrants who are detained, unrepresented, and deemed incompetent to represent themselves because of a serious mental health condition. The contract with MIRC is terminated.
- President Trump signs Executive Orders aimed at defunding so-called "sanctuary" jurisdictions, "unleashing" law enforcement, and reinforcing an already existing federal law requiring English-language proficiency as a requirement for truck drivers.

- The Trump administration cut the National Qualified Representative Program (NQRP). As a recipient, MIRC provided legal representation for individuals with intellectual disabilities or significant mental health conditions when an immigration judge determined they would be unable to represent themselves in immigration court. We will no longer receive reimbursement for representing these individuals, and they will no longer have access to this lifeline. DHS cuts staffing for oversight offices, effectively closing the Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL), the Office of the Immigration Detention Ombudsman, and the Office of the Citizenship and Immigration Services Ombudsman.

ORR shortens eligibility period for refugee cash and medical assistance

- MI House voted on Drive SAFE bills did not pass
- North Lake Correctional facility reopening in Baldwin as private detention center run by GEO Group

3/19/25

- Jackson County Sheriff's Office has entered into a 287(g) agreement with ICE Enforcement and Removal Operations. They are participating in the "Warrant Service Officer" model, which gives legal authority for local law enforcement officers to conduct federal immigration enforcement by executing ICE administrative warrants. This is the first and only Michigan municipality to participate in the 287(g) program. The 287(g) program has been shown to result in racial profiling, be costly for localities, target individuals with little or no criminal history, and harm the relationship between police and local communities.
- CBP conducting a Voluntary Self-Reported Exit (VSRE) Pilot to collect facial images from noncitizens, leaving the U.S.

3/1/25

President Trump signed an Executive Order declaring English the official language of the U.S. and rescinding President Clinton's Executive Order 13166, which required recipients of federal funds to ensure access for those who speak English with limited proficiency. Federal agencies, however, are not required to stop offering services in languages other than English. This action is aimed at signaling who belongs and who doesn't, and limiting access to essential services that we all need to thrive. Michigan state law requires language access for state agencies, and many local governments also provide language services.

2/26/25

President Trump proposes "gold card" visa for wealthy investors

2/25/25

- A long-dormant immigration law is being revived—forcing certain immigrants to register with the government and carry proof of status at all times or face criminal prosecution for failing to do so. More guidance is forthcoming – stay tuned.
 - The registration requirement will force many people in the United States—including those who entered without inspection and have had no contact with the federal government during their years living in American communities—to make a choice between two options that both carry serious risk.
 - Many others, such as immigrants who are already deemed registered—which includes both many undocumented immigrants and many who have legal status in the United States—will face a risk of prosecution if they fail to carry registration papers with them at all times.

2/24/25

- Reports indicate ICE plans to pursue unaccompanied children for deportation, using government data.
- Court blocks immigration enforcement actions from happening at places of worship for certain religious groups who are plaintiffs in lawsuit against end of sensitive locations policy.

2/21/25

Children's legal services funding is <u>restored!</u> For now. Fear this is temporary - <u>advocacy still needed</u>.

2/20/25

DHS rescinds the recent extension of Haiti's Temporary Protected Status; will end August 3, 2025.

2/19/25

- Trump administration pauses immigration applications for certain individuals with parole
- President Trump signs Executive Order aimed at ending federal benefits for undocumented individuals (who already are not eligible, with only a few exceptions authorized by law) - White House fact sheet

2/18/25

Trump administration issues stop work order to MIRC and other providers of legal services for children. 800 children in Michigan, all MIRC clients, will be affected, and 26,000 nationally.

- MIRC recommends individuals who have pending victim-centered relief and who are not in proceedings (and out of status) – carry evidence that this relief is pending on them via a copy of a receipt from USCIS. Victim-centered immigration benefits include VAWA, T- & U-visas, and SIJS.

- The Trump administration has ordered ICE agents to meet a quota for enforcement actions. This will result in more indiscriminate enforcement, racial profiling, and civil rights abuses.

Pentagon sends 1,500 troops to southern border

1/23/25

- A federal judge has blocked Trump's executive order on birthright citizenship for 14 days while he considers whether to issue a long-lasting preliminary injunction.
- Michigan Department of Education issued additional guidance on the "Responsibility to Educate All School-Age Children Regardless of Citizenship and Immigration Status."
- DHS authorizes federal officers from the U.S. Marshals, Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, and the Federal Bureau of Prisons to "investigate and apprehend" noncitizens.
- DHS memo on expedited removal & parole. Per the recent EO, DHS may review and terminate parole on an individual case-by-case basis.

 - Targeting people who cross the border for prosecution, which originally led to family separations
 - Calling for an end to community policing and "sanctuary" cities

 - Ending asylum and suspending entry at the southern border
 - Ending parole at the border (so-called catch and release), CBP One, CHNV sponsorship program and other parole programs
