

Feed Ontario Election Platform Tracker 2022

Last Updated: May 9, 2022

Since 2018, food bank use in Ontario has increased every single year. **The upcoming Ontario election is an opportunity for all parties to commit to taking action on hunger and poverty in our province, and turn the tide on food bank use.**

Feed Ontario has created an Election Platform Tracker to assist voters in easily understanding what each of Ontario's four major political parties have promised to do about poverty. In particular, we have focused on our "3 Big Ideas":

- **End legislated poverty:** Increase social assistance rates to \$2000 and reform unfair rules that trap recipients in poverty
- Make housing affordable: Build more social and supportive housing than is currently committed to in the National Housing Strategy, expand the Canada-Ontario Housing Benefit, and strengthen laws to protect tenants
- **Guarantee decent work for all:** Increase the minimum wage to \$20, improve the Employment Standards Act (ESA) to protect workers, mandate at least 5 permanent sick days

We've also included a fourth section summarizing other important poverty reduction measures parties have committed to.
