Introduction

Do not restate the Abstract or simply list the experimental results. Give a clear scientific basis for your study, as well as any potential applications or extensions. You should also make recommendations for future efforts and/or policy implications.

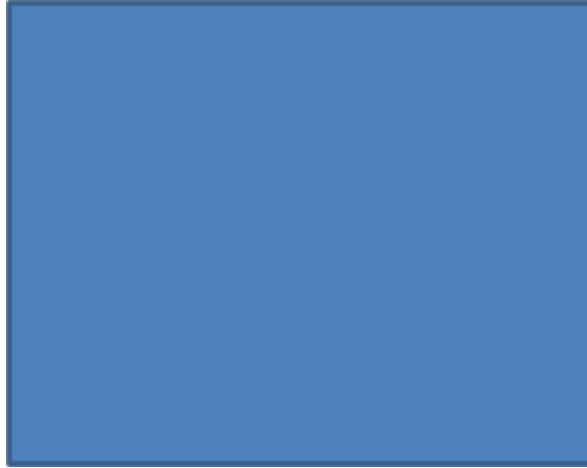


Figure 1. A sample caption for a figure. The same indicators cannot be used for different tables or figures. There should be no repetition of information in the text from captions.
