The abstract should maintain a maximum of 150 words. The abstract is divided into Introduction, Objective, Method, Result, and Discussion.

Finally, briefly mention the main aim of the work and highlight the principal conclusions. As far as possible, please keep the introduction comprehensible to scientists outside your particular field of research. All content

review articles must not be more than 2000 words.

## **METHOD**

The section must consist of

### **Patient Information**

Specify de-identified patient specific information. Primary concerns and symptoms, diagnosis, medical, family, and psychosocial history including relevant genetic information. Relevant past interventions and their outcomes.

### **Clinical Findings**

Describe significant Physical Examination and important clinical findings. All the diagnostic assessments could be involved.

### **Therapeutic/Nursing Intervention**

Explain the types of therapeutic intervention (pharmacologic, surgical, preventive), administration of therapeutic intervention, and any changes in intervention.

### **Follow-up and Outcomes**

Patient assessed outcomes. Important follow-up diagnostic and other test results. Intervention adherence and tolerability. Adverse and unanticipated events.

## **RESULT AND DISCUSSION**

Describe the results of the intervention. Discussion of the relevant medical literature. The primary “take-away” lessons from this case study. The patient should share their perspective on the treatment(s) or intervention they received. Discussion should relate the results to the current understanding of the scientific problems being investigated in the field. Provide a general interpretation of the case report in the context of other evidence. This should explore the significance of the results of the work, not repeat them. A combined

Results and Discussion section is often appropriate. Avoid extensive citations and discussion of published literature.

Tables and Figures should be self-explanatory and it is not acceptable to repeat extensively the numerals from tables into text and give lengthy and unnecessary explanations of the Tables and Figures.

### **Tables & Figures**

Tables and figures should be embedded in the text. Maximal 4 tables/figures. Tables should be created in open form with a word processor and cited consecutively in the text. Please submit tables as editable text and not as images. Tables can be placed either next to the relevant text in the article, or on separate page(s) at the end. Number tables consecutively in accordance with their appearance in the text and place any table notes below the table body. Be sparing in the use of tables and ensure that the data presented in them do not duplicate results described elsewhere in the article. Please avoid using vertical rules.

To ensure the highest print quality, your figures must be submitted in TIF format with minimum of 300 dpi or higher resolutions. Captions/legends will be placed below figures and adjusted to 8-10 font size.

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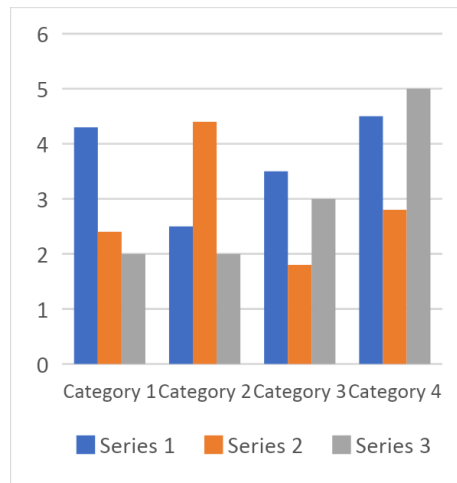


Fig 1. Graphic 1

## REFERENCES

Reference should be cited in the text by author's last name & year. Single author: the author's name (without initials) and the year of publication eg. (Martin, 2009). Two authors: Last name of both the authors and year of publication should be used i.e. (Mishra and Ahmed, 2010). Three or more authors: first author's name followed by et al. and year of publication i.e. (Das et al., 2012). References should be arranged in alphabetical order and further shorted in a

chronological manner using Reference manager (i.e. Mendeley) based on *Publication manual of the American Psychological Association*(2010) 6<sup>th</sup> edition.
