<u>Westbury-on-Trym Transport and Place-making group – summary report of the survey of people using the village</u>

This report summarises responses to a survey of users of Westbury village. The survey was conducted by the Westbury-on-Trym Transport and Place-making group between July and September 2021. 288 people responded, 278 online and 10 on paper. The survey was publicised through noticeboards, BS9 and Voice magazines, and through most village organisations. The survey questions and more information on the context for the survey are appended at the end of this report.

Passage Road	- Passage Road is unsafe for children to walk to WOT CofE Academy. There needs to be a crossing installed on this road near to the school. The whole road should be made double yellows, the speed limit should be reduced and the road made one way at school times		
Chock Lane	 Cars race down chock lane to avoid the village. This is the only 'level' (ie no steps) route to the school from the eastfield area without a huge detour through the village. Eastfield Rd and the top of Chock Lane are dangerous. Especially for school children attending Westbury CoE and Bristol Free Schools. A specific crossing should be put in place along with pavement at the top of Chock Lane. The painted part of the Chock Lane simply is not safe or sufficient! A selection of free format comments on comparing the three street environments - Canford Lane footpath/sidewalk has a "café feel" about it as well as the pedestrian precinct. The High Street and Westbury Hill have a "rushed feel" about the environment - Canford Lane is a pleasant, safe and welcoming place due to easy access from wider pavements and convenient short stay car spaces as well as an attractive mix of shops, amenities and banking services, etc. The High Street is reasonable in the small sections around the War Memorial, but the section from Lyons Solicitors is not good or safe due to the narrow pavements and traffic volume and speed issues outlined in 5b. This area of the village also has a generally unkempt scruffy appearance, empty premises, weeds, etc. Westbury Hill is OK and has some useful amenities with convenient parking nearby but could be better if pavements were a little wider (but not as wide as those in Canford Lane). - Canford Lane has wider pavements and the precinct which is a
pleasant environment. High Street and Westbury Hill have narrow pavements, not very easy for mobility scooters and traffic often very heavy in these areas - Canford Lane accommodates the high volume of through traffic better because of its openness, however speeding traffic is a frequent problem. High Street and Westbury Hill are completely blighted by

Traffic flows	- unfortunately, since time immemorial, Westbury village has been an historic crossroads for traffic travelling north/south or east/west. In the 1930s, the "great and good" of Bristol approved building Falcondale Road as a "Westbury Bypass" for traffic travelling noth/south, or the reverse. Unfortunatly, similar arrangements have never been considered for traffic travelling east/west. I doubt if this will ever be adequately addressed and the "adaptive" residents of Westbury will just have to lump it!	
	- sadly the village is unavoidably situated on a number of arterial routes all served by Waters Lane and for which there are no easy alternatives for avoiding the village without blighting another community, although it might be argued that Doncaster Road would be better equipped than Waters Lane for the volume of traffic prevailing. The immediate benefit to the village of the pre war Falcondale Rd bypass is now long forgotten, but perhaps closing off Passage Rd at the Greystoke Ave junction and no left turn into Henbury Rd further down would be a worthwhile experiment, as would making Canford Lane outside the park a one way street, West bound only?
