

Name of Course: Creative Writing

Course Overview:

Students will improve in clarity and sophistication of their writing through a series of instructional lessons, guided practice, and free writing assignments. They will identify, analyze, and create Imagery, mood, characters, conflict, figurative language, dialogue, symbolism, irony. They will create an original children's story and a play.
