Key Talking Points for Students:

- We deserve to learn the truth about climate change, not just what the fossil fuel companies want us to hear. We need accurate and unbiased information to understand the real challenges and build a better future.
- It's unfair that our education is being influenced by big oil companies. We need to learn about the science of climate change, not their marketing spin.
- We want to learn how to fight for a better future, not just accept what we're told. We need to understand the power of the fossil fuel industry and how to challenge their influence.
- We demand education that prepares us for the future, not one that's stuck in the past. We need to learn about the solutions to climate change, including a just transition away from fossil fuels, and how we can make a difference.
- We believe that all students have the right to learn about the climate crisis and how to address it. This includes understanding the role of systemic issues, including the influence of the fossil fuel industry.
- We want to learn about the social and environmental justice implications of climate change, and how to build a more equitable and sustainable future for all.
