Stoke Newington, Pembury and Hoxton are the main areas of concern and the robbery team within the MPS have continued making arrests. - Gang related tensions - current hotspot areas are Manor House, Southwold and Hoxton - Tragic Nightingale murder of a young man named Samson. A public meeting was held in response - Question around the age of the current perpetrators of robberies? if they are under 18, what is the link across to children and families service/ youth justice? - Join up with C+F and IGU has improved - Questions around the summer offer for young people. There is a paper being drafted around what the summer offer is for young people but there is a need to make sure that there is join up in terms of diversion for

 Are we picking up what we are doing in terms of communication and engagement with schools on young people going back into school settings in terms of things like safe travel and peer on peer robbery.

SW to look at the data in Maurice's paper with regards to work being done on under 18s involvement in robberies, although not aware of anything we are doing strategically.

Night time economy

Key updates / issues:

- Brought the end of year figures up to date main two areas being Shoreditch and Dalston. shoreditch up 29% by the end of the financial year, although this has come down a lot from the previous three quarters due to covid 19. Dalston up 11%
- Shoreditch violence fell by 4.3%, would have happened irrespective of covid situation so this is a positive. Drug related offending increased by 32% due to police proactively, Operation Lagana. would have seen a 7% decrease without proactive operations.
- Robbery increased by 82%. robbery started to rise in quarter 2 and remained high until the end of the financial year so this is something we need to focus on down in shoreditch in particular
- Sexual offences increased but number still quite low
- In Dalston, most increase in quarter 3 and down to ASB

- A meeting has been arranged with multiple partners including the police and officers to preempt reopening of NTE. Police counter terrorism officer will also be attending
- Starting some work around drug related hotspot activities. Gillett Square a key area.
- operation continuum up and running, a number of arrests have been made
- Questions around the consistency of recording of the levey funded patrols? Needs to be captured as well as the conditions of the levy contract. Resourcing issue in terms of filling out spreadsheets or forms to capture the activity

Violence against women and girls

Key updates / issues:

- Significant increase in referrals into DAIS up about 50%

Safer Young Hackney

Key updates/issues:

- Many activities have been moved to being conducted virtually - alot of court work being done virtually or on hold until courts are back in operation. About 56 cases being monitored currently awaiting to go to court
- Disproportionality 100% of CYP in custody presently are from BME backgrounds, BME children 3x more likely to be arrested than white children

Key updates:

- Reduction in knife crime with injury for u25 now at its lowest since 2014
- Overall weapons down
- All violence with injury -8% reduction on the year
- COVID has impacted robbery and burglary has gone down
- Question around police understanding of our Domestic abuse data - referrals to Council service up whereas police reports down. This may be an issue of where people choose to go to report. to be picked up outside of meeting
- We need to think about these two data sets and have a clear narrative of what each is doing and what we understand by that

CCG - Neighbourhoods approach/neighbourhood conversations (15 mins).

- Nina Griffiths gave background on Neighbourhood programme and update on more COVID specific work that has taken place
- COVID pandemic has enabled a lot of what is trying to be achieved by the neighbourhoods programme to be expedited and has justified the case for change in terms of neighbourhoods and why we need strong, community based services that wrap around residents and communities. We have been able to draw upson system response to covide pandemic to put in a place a number of aspects of the neighbourhood programme much more quickly.
- Neighbourhood based conversations COVID has enabled us to establish neighbourhood based conversations across the 8 neighbourhoods. Virtual sessions about building local networks and communities and getting a sense of what is happening on the ground
- Fast tracked multi-agency working set up and established 8 neighbourhood teams to support those that are most vulnerable or with particularly complex needs. Reestablished linked with wider Council services e.g, Housing, beneits, employment and skills, DAIS
- Next steps: building on multi agency teams, working with VCS to build and develop neighbourhood conversations

The support is immediate intervention, with initial work being over 3 months on a weekly basis (support can be longer is necessary).
