




Follows the adventures of Meg, Jo, Beth, and Amy as they grew into young ladies in mid-nineteenth-century New England.

I Know Why The Caged Bird Sings


This autobiography covers the childhood of Maya Angelo, a woman who has been a professional dancer, actress, poet, journalist, and television producer.

Martian Chronicles


The tranquility of Mars is disrupted by humans who want to conquer space, colonize the planet, and escape a doomed Earth.

The Good Earth


This is the story of a Chinese peasant and his passionate, dogged accumulation of land during famine, drought, and revolution.

In Cold Blood



O Pioneers!



Collected Poems of Emily Dickinson


A selection of poems by nineteenth-century American writer Emily Dickinson, arranged chronologically, with illustrations from the special collections of the New York Public Library.



F. Scott Fitzgerald


The Great Gatsby

Robert Frost




Malcolm X, the Black Muslim leader, firebrand, and anti-integrationist, tells his life story to veteran writer and journalist Alex Haley.

A Raisin In The Sun


A three-act play is concerned with the tensions in a middle-class African American family living on Chicago's Southside in the 1950s.

The Old Man and The Sea


An old fisherman battles the sea and sharks to bring home the giant marlin he caught.

The Collected Poems of Langston Hughes


This complete collection of Hughes's poetry spans five decades, from the 1920s through the 1960s.

To Kill A Mockingbird


Eight-year-old "Scout" Finch tells of life in a small Alabama town where her father is a lawyer.

White Fang



Death of a Salesman



The Bluest Eye


An eleven-year-old African-American girl in Ohio, in the early 1940s, prays for her eyes to turn blue so that she will be beautiful.

The Chosen



The Collected Stories



East of Eden


This is the story of Cal and Aron, twin brothers in early twentieth-century California, who act out a modern-day version of the biblical story of Cain and Abel.



Henry David Thoreau


Walden

inhabitants.




