We'll get this program off to a great start with none other than our own official state song, "Texas, our Texas", by composer William J. Marsh. This song was adopted by the Texas Legislature in 1929 after being selected in a state-wide competition.

MASON H. (1) There has only been one change made to the lyrics of the song when Alaska became a state, and the original text, "Largest and grandest", were no longer true.

MORGAN W. (2) Well, even if it's no longer the largest state, at least we know it is the greatest!

Let's kick off our program as we sing our grandest state song, "Texas, our Texas"!

SONG 1: TEXAS, OUR TEXAS

AVANI B. (1) Did you know that Texas is the only state to have had the flags of six different nations fly over it? These nations are: Spain, France, Mexico, Republic of Texas, the Confederate States, and the United States!

ADDIE T. (2) First, the Spanish arrived in 1519, followed by the French in 1620. Their influence was short-lived, and the Spanish soon took over once again, establishing Catholic missions across the land.

OWEN L. (1) Texas had a total of 24 missions, each 30 miles apart. This "mission trail" covered 650 miles of Texas! Each mission had its own church, dorms, and strong defense walls for protection.

ADDISON H. (2) In 1718, San Antonio was established with the building of the Mission: San Antonio de Valero. The mission would later be known as the Alamo, which still stands today and is the most famous of all Texas missions.

DYLAN A. (1) Texas is known for so many things like our state mammal, the Longhorn, our state insect, the Monarch Butterfly, and our state flower, the Bluebonnet.

ROHIN G. (2)	Texas is also known for continuing the traditions of its culture that was influenced by the Spanish and Mexican colonization of the 1700s and 1800s.
RAPHAEL L. (1)	After Texas became an official part of the United States, it continued to welcome immigrants from Mexico who brought rich traditions of Mexican culture through music, food, and the Spanish language.
AVERY H. (2)	Our next song will feature a Spanish folk song that celebrates a popular Spanish musical style called <i>Mariachi</i> .
